<p>Socio-economic inclusion</p>	<p>R1. # of individuals who benefitted from livelihoods and economic inclusion interventions</p>	<p>Description: Socio-economic inclusion is a process that supports refugees, stateless persons, third country nationals and other forcibly displaced persons moving from Ukraine, in integrating into the economies and social fabric of host countries and communities. The indicator should count the total number of persons supported in their socio-economic inclusion process. The indicator may be disaggregated by the different sub-sectors as per the RIWG working definition on socioeconomic inclusion. <p>Education</p>	<p>R5. # of children and youth supported with education programming (includes support to enrol in formal and non-formal)</p>	<p>Education means programmes supervised by national authorities including early childhood education, primary, secondary, tertiary, technical and vocational education and training (TVET) and non-formal education that leads to academic or professional certification as well as connected education.</p> <p>For this indicator, education support primarily is defined as including: 1) financial assistance to facilitate enrolment (in the form of scholarships, grants, CBIs, transportation vouchers to reach school), 2) material assistance necessary to attend school (such as school kits / uniforms or other school supplies), 3) documentation or certification assistance for documents necessary to attend school</p> <p>Non-formal education (NFE) is programming that (i) supports catching up on lost learning with clear pathways to transition to, or support in, the continuation of formal education and/or ii) leads to accreditation. NFE includes participation in Accelerated Education Programmes (AEP) and other non-formal support, including remedial, catch-up and bridging programmes.</p> <p>To avoid double counting individuals, it is recommended to identify and report the greatest common denominator.
