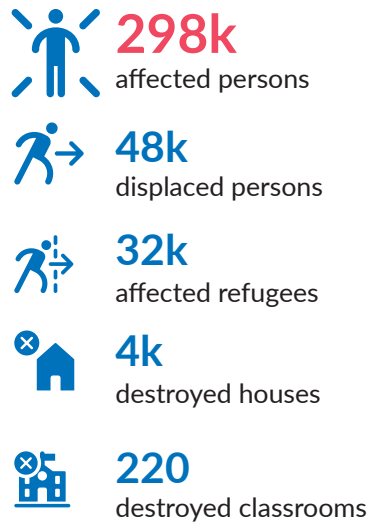


Context

Since the beginning of the rainy season in September 2023 to September 2024, more than 298,000 people (54% are women) were affected by torrential rains, floods, landslides and the overflowing of Lake Tanganyika due to the El Niño phenomenon. These disasters destroyed or partially damaged homes, classrooms, health facilities, roads, crops, water networks and electrical installations.

Actions taken

- Public validation and physical checks of people identified as extremely vulnerable for Shelter, CBI/NFI and multipurpose cash assistance (MPC). This activity was carried out in all affected areas, distinguishing between refugees, asylum seekers, IDPs and others affected by the floods.
- Distribution of different modalities according to the categories, vulnerabilities and needs of people affected by El Niño floods.
