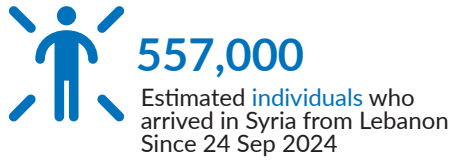


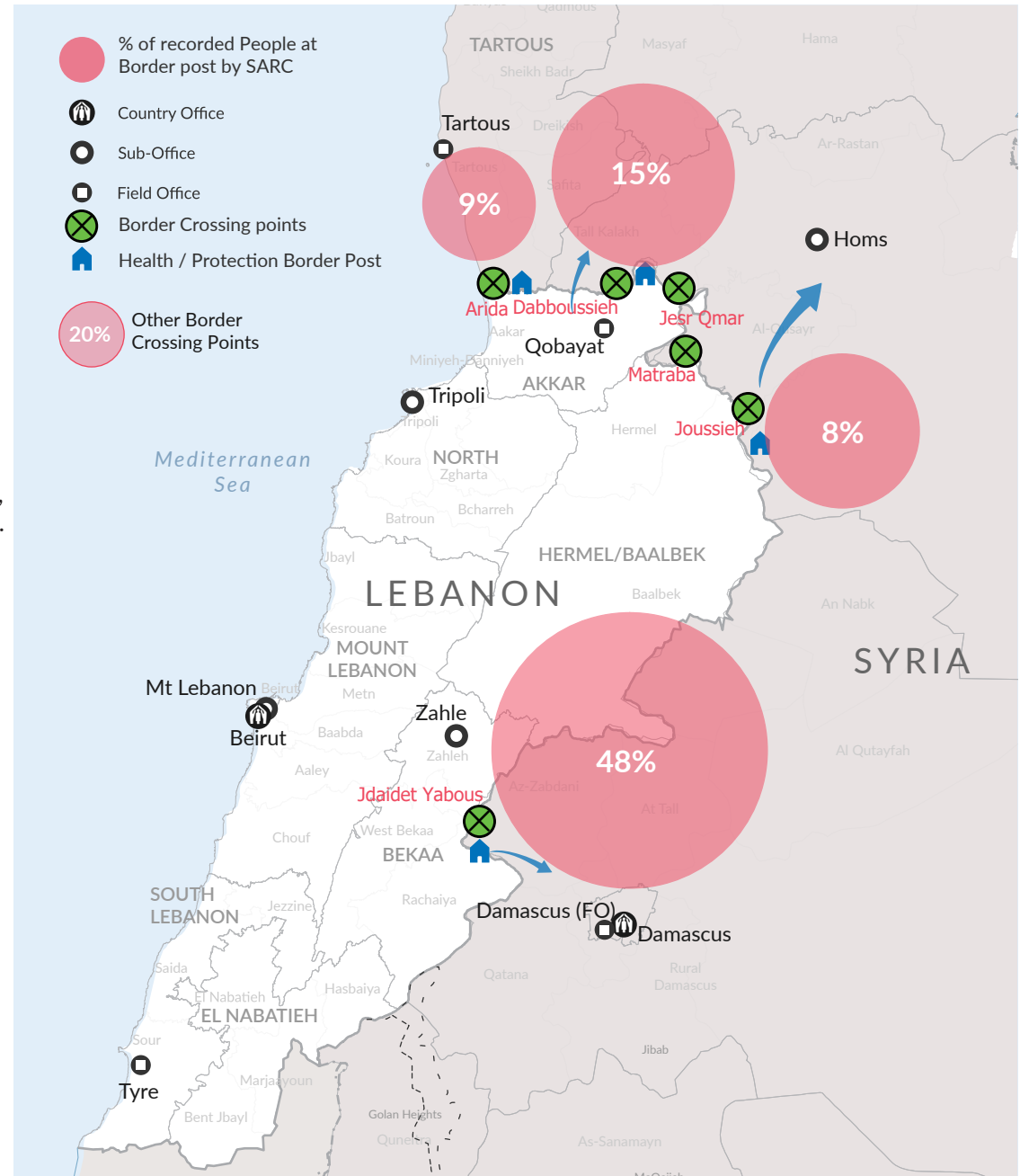
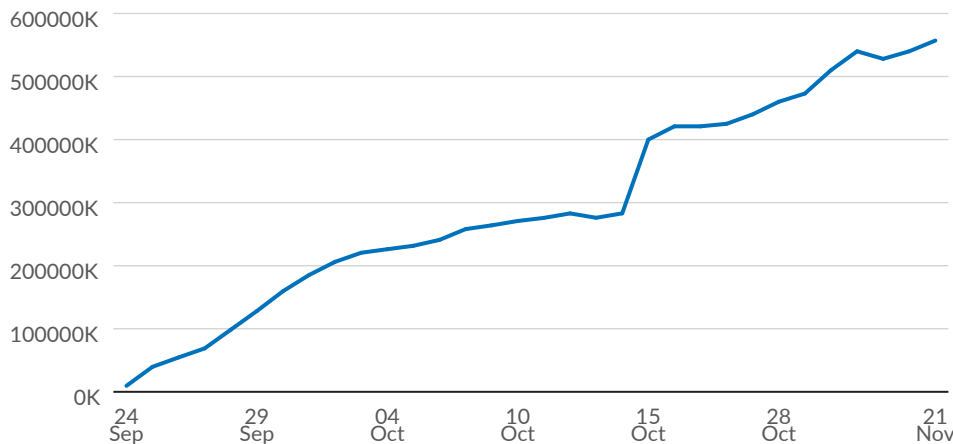
Key Figures



Since the escalation of hostilities in Lebanon, an estimated number of individuals, including both Lebanese and Syrians, have crossed the border from Lebanon into Syria.

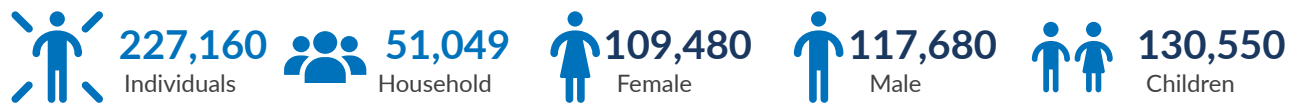


Cumulative arrivals trend since 24 Sep 2024

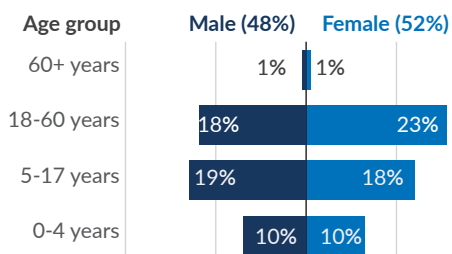

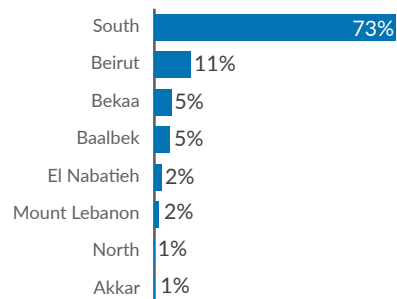

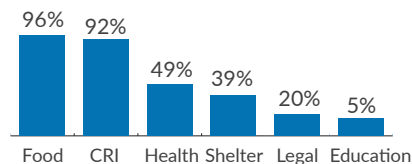
Age and gender breakdown

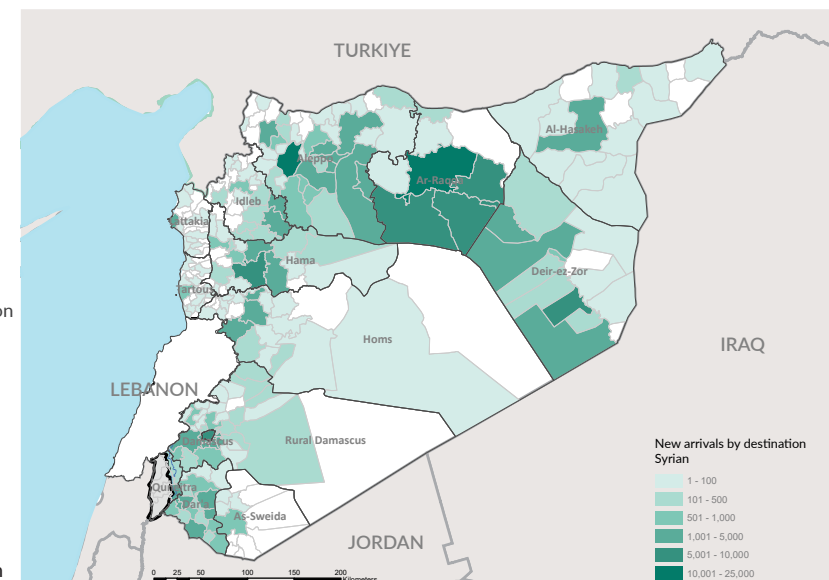

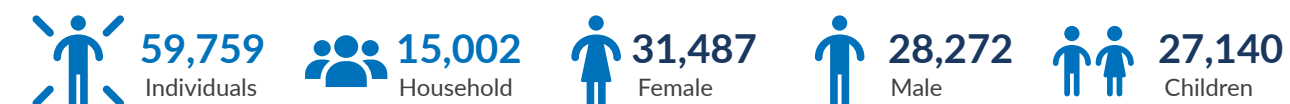
Persons with specific needs

 - 3% are unaccompanied and separated children

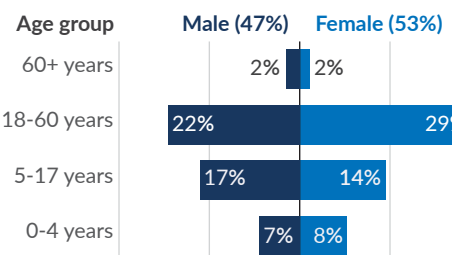
Syrian returnees by sub-district As of 19 November



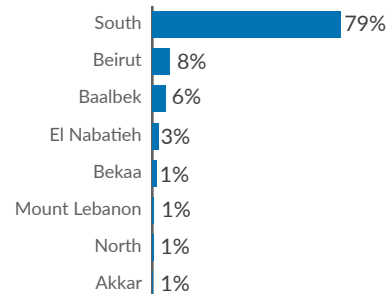
Lebanese Refugees



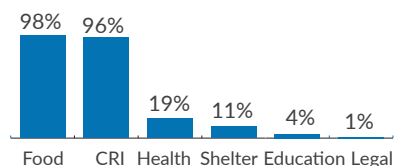
Age and gender breakdown
