Strategic Objectives:

1. **Ensure refugees' access to protection, legal status and rights**, focusing on vulnerable groups.
2. **Promote refugee inclusion** in key national systems.
3. **Strengthen social cohesion** between refugees and host communities.
4. **Advance localization** by supporting Polish civil society, local authorities, and sustainable programming.



Protection, Gender Based Violence (GBV) and Child Protection (CP)



2025-2026 Funding needed: US\$ 141,6M

In coordination with the Government of Poland, ensure refugee's access to protection, legal status, fundamental rights and services and social inclusion in Poland

- **Advocacy for legislative and policy front:** Aligning Polish legal provisions with EU Council decisions to ensure refugee rights and protection.
- **Legal Support:** Assisting refugees with legal status issues, documentation, accessing social protection and other services.
- **Prevention, mitigation and response to GBV:** Enhancing national capacities for survivor centred GBV response and building refugees' awareness and knowledge of GBV risks.
- **Child Protection and Alternative Care:** Improving care and protection provided to refugee children by the national systems preventing family separation, violence against children and ensuring mental health support.





Livelihoods and Economic Inclusion



2025-2026 Funding needed: US\$ 94M

In Coordination with the Ministry of Family Labour and Social Policy, enhance Employment and Financial Access for Refugees

- **Investing in human capital for development:** Enhance language training, certification, and skills recognition to align refugee and vulnerable populations' capabilities with labour market demands. Support upskilling, reskilling, and career readiness through targeted coaching, mentoring, and job placement initiatives.
- **Strengthening Legal and Institutional Support for Workforce Inclusion:** Advocate for fair employment policies that promote decent work, prevent labour exploitation, and support flexible working arrangements. Strengthen job fairs, workforce integration programs, and skills-based hiring practices to create equitable opportunities for all.
- **Expanding Private Sector Partnerships for economic growth:** Foster collaboration between businesses, development organizations, and government stakeholders to promote inclusive recruitment, enhance access to financial services (savings and loans), and drive investment in human capital.





Education



2025-2026 Funding needed: US\$ 68,7M

In coordination with the Ministry of Education and local authorities, support the inclusion of refugee children to the Polish education system

- **Full enrolment as a priority:** Ensuring all refugee children are enrolled at and attend school regularly to promote their social inclusion and learning.
- **Tailored learning support & retention strategies:** Strengthening specialized programmes (Polish language acquisition, catch-up lessons, psycho-social support) to encourage children to stay at school and support their parents and teachers. Specific attention should be paid to specific needs of adolescents and youth.
- **Outreach to adolescents:** Strengthening the key role of teachers and community members to reach out to adolescents for their full participation in education, including through provision of multiple learning pathways.





Public Health and Mental Health



2025-2026 Funding needed: US\$ 47,2M

In coordination with the Ministry of Health, strengthen national public health systems to be able to respond to the needs of refugees

- Building a **resilient mental health system** capable of effectively addressing current and future humanitarian needs, **by embedding MHPSS into Poland's preparedness framework**
- Ensuring **immediate and sustainable access to mental health interventions for the most vulnerable Ukrainian refugees with mental health problems** by supporting CSO-led delivery of mental health programmes and **establishing integrated, community-based mental health care pathways** within the Polish health system
- Supporting **most vulnerable refugees** (people with disabilities, elderly, residents of collective centres) in **accessing essential and specialized health care services**
- Strengthening **national response to the infectious diseases** by closing the gap in immunization coverage, TB active case finding and case management using novel TB drugs and treatment models), expanding testing for HIV, viral hepatitis, STI and linkage to care





Shelter, Housing and Accommodation



2025-2026 Funding needed: US\$ 29,6 M

In coordination with the Ministry of Interior and Administration, address the refugee housing challenges in Poland

- **Promote independent living:** In cooperation with other Sectors and local authorities, support refugees in collective accommodation centres with no acute or chronic vulnerabilities to become economically active and to live independently outside collective shelters through job fairs, upskilling, complementary services, and social behaviour change initiatives.
- **Support dignified accommodation for vulnerable groups:** With support of central and local authorities, provide targeted support to the most vulnerable (e.g., seniors, people with disabilities, and minority groups) to secure dignified and sustainable housing solutions outside collective centres, where possible.
- **Enhance coordination and policy:** Strengthen collaboration with central and local authorities and other actors to maintain common standards, ensure preparedness, and promote medium-term policies to expand access to affordable housing and social rental schemes for refugees and other vulnerable groups, including host community members.
