Overview



Overall Objective of the Child Protection Sector

The Uganda Inter-Agency Child Protection Strategy (2023-2025) focuses on three key objectives: strengthening the national child protection system; providing essential services such as case management and alternative care; and supporting children, families, and communities in safeguarding children. In support of this strategy, the Uganda Country Refugee Response Plan (UCRRP) involves partners in a coordinated effort to protect refugee children from abuse, neglect, exploitation, violence, and separation, including GBV, child labour, while ensuring access to quality child protection services.

Child Protection programming is severely affected by funding cuts, impacting over **115,131** children with Child Protection-related specific needs and 57,444 needing case management. Staff reductions have compromised service quality, with the average caseworker-to-child-at-risk ratio at **1:201**. These figures far exceed the global standard of **1:25**, highlighting critical capacity gaps.

The Result Analysis:

As of Q2, comprehensive case management services continued to **25,767 active child protection cases**, of which **13,568 cases** were for children at risk and **12,199 cases** for unaccompanied and separated children (UASC). with this **79% of the annual target was achieved**. A total of **4,035 cases were successfully closed** after resolving protection concerns. However, open cases have increased since the end of 2024, mainly due to new arrivals from Sudan and the DRC.

In Q2, **924** unaccompanied and separated children were placed in alternative care (**557 achieved in Q2, 15% of the target**). **13,002 parents** participated in positive parenting sessions under the family strengthening program (**60% of the annual target**).

In Q2, **74,419 children** aged 5–17 joined community-based play and recreation activities, totaling **103,248** since January this year. representing 39% of the annual target. **27,977 adolescents** engaged in targeted programs aimed at skill development (45% of the annual target). Currently, **47 Child Friendly Spaces (CFS) remain operational**, offering basic services, which represents **45% reduction** compared to the same period last year. **Four** child-friendly spaces are currently inactive due to funding cuts. In total, **299** tracing services were initiated, of which **121 (40%)** were successfully linked with their families.

The Key Challenges/Opportunities:

The ongoing aid funding reduction is reducing humanitarian support, worsening socio-economic vulnerabilities, and increasing protection risks among refugees, especially children, who face heightened threats of neglect, labor, and separation with **4,327 children** engaged in worst form of child labour, whereas **4,084 are children** engaged in other forms of child labour. Totalling to **8,411 cases of child labour** reported by mid-2025.

Despite these challenges, Uganda’s strong legal and policy framework for refugee child protection has enabled continued collaboration between the child protection sector and key ministries, notably the Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development (MGLSD), to strengthen national systems and integrate refugee children.

Child-Friendly Space (CFS) activities have been affected by current funding gaps and are not delivering the full range of planned services, which may hinder the achievement of the annual targets. To address this challenge, the Child Protection sector is exploring ways to strengthen community engagement in the management of CFSs and has established a task force to guide this process.


The Sector Priorities:

Aligned with the Inter-Agency child protection strategy and Child Protection Sub-Working Group (CPSWG) workplan for 2025, the sector will continue to prioritize the strengthening of an inclusive child protection system. As part of the localization agenda, the CP case management services efforts will aim at onboarding and working with locally based Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), Refugee-Led Organizations (RLOs), etc, to implement CP case management.






No of Children at Heightened Risks who Received Quality Case Management Services, **Target: 37,500**




Best Interests Procedure(BIP)








Open Child Protection Cases Age, Gender Breakdown




Best Interests Assessments (BIAs) Age, Gender Breakdown






Children Participating in Community-Based Support Activities Age, Gender Breakdown
