Assistance

In **White Nile State**, a mobile clinic supported by the Ministry of Health (MoH), WHO, and UNICEF continues to operate at the Joda border, providing health and nutrition services to new arrivals and the surrounding host community. Health screening for all new arrivals remains ongoing.

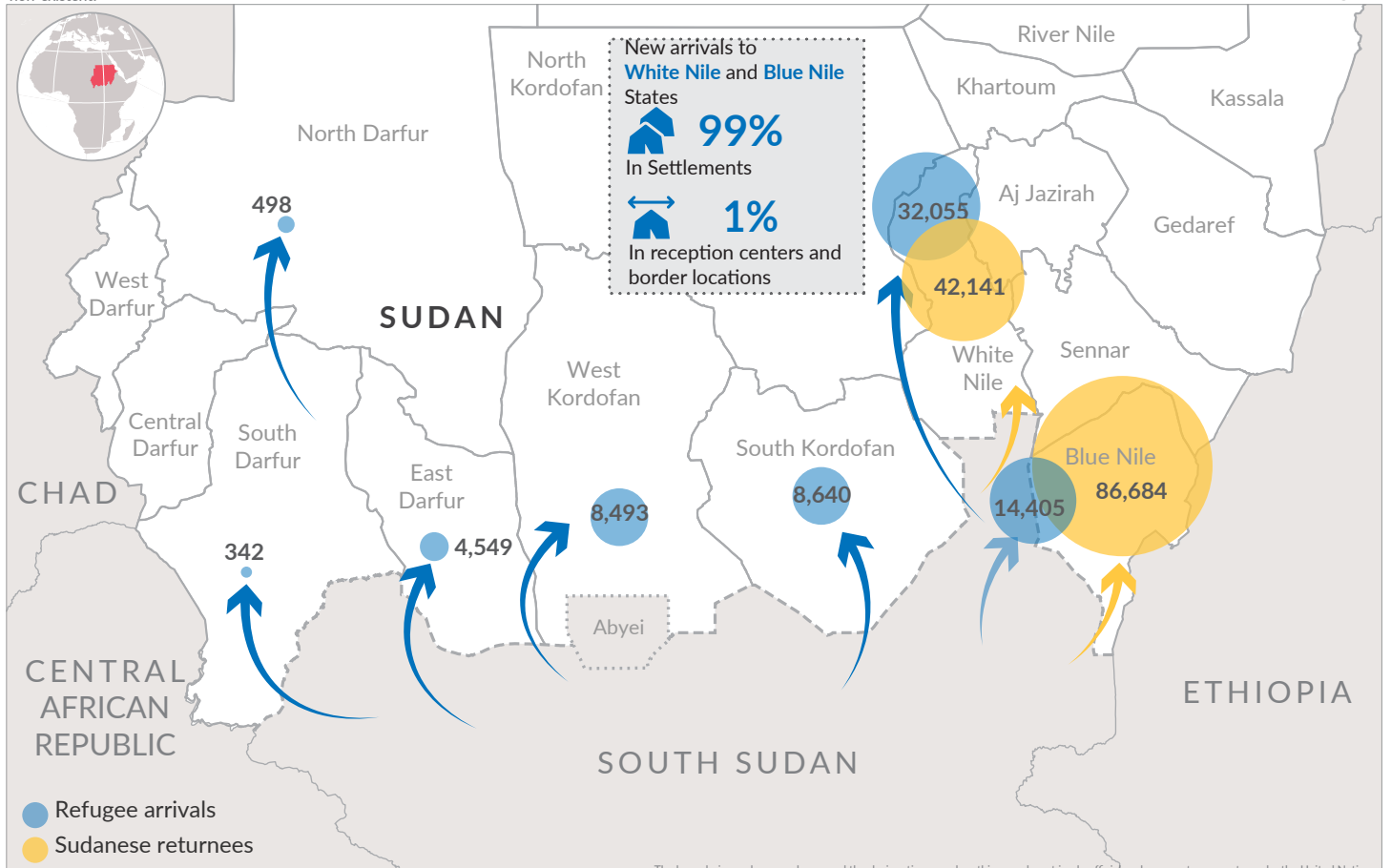
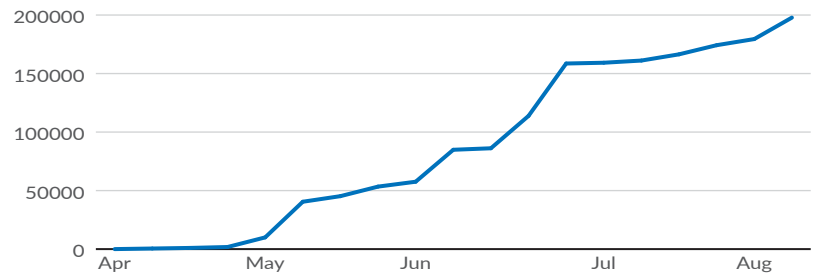
In **Blue Nile State**, existing health facilities are overstretched, with no delivery services available on-site. No night health services are provided, and prenatal care is currently non-existent.

Context

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. More than **197,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **69,000 South Sudanese**, most of whom (46%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (21%), South Kordofan (12%), West Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (7%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages. Trained SRCS and COR border monitoring staff are now deployed at the two remaining official border points, Al Megenis and Um Jalala, where they have begun applying the updated Border Monitoring household survey tool. This expands the consistent monitoring already underway at Joda border.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **86,000 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile State and more than **42,000 Sudanese returnees** to White Nile State. UNHCR's activities at Joda focus primarily on protection monitoring and movement tracking, while movement assistance is provided at final destinations in Blue Nile through interagency coordination. The household registration/verification activities are currently ongoing at all Al-Karama sites, led by BMDO/UNHCR. A recent joint meeting between HAC, BMDO, and CCCM committees confirmed that Al Karama 6 and Al Karama 7 will be administratively merged under Al Karama 6 moving forward.
