



## National Cluster Updates

### 2025 Response Overview:

In 2025, the Cluster targeted approximately **744,000 people** out of **1.9 million People in Need (PiN)**. However, due to significant funding shortfalls, the Cluster was only able to reach around **302,000 individuals**, representing approximately **41% of the target**. Financially, the Cluster received only **USD 10 million** against a total requirement of **USD 55 million**, which considerably constrained the scale and scope of response activities.

### 2026 HNRP Planning Process:

The Cluster successfully finalized the **2026 Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan (HNRP)** cycle, applying the same calculation methodology used in previous years and aligned with the global Cluster guidance.

### People in Need (PiN) Analysis for 2026:

The analysis identified approximately **1.9 million internally displaced persons (IDPs) and affected host community members** residing in displacement sites across **201 districts** in Yemen.

- **56 districts** were classified under **Severity Level 4**,
- The remaining districts were classified under **Severity Level 3**.  
Notably, **86% of the total People in Need** were reported in Severity 4 districts, highlighting the acute humanitarian conditions and the critical need for sustained CCCM interventions in these high-severity areas.

### Targeting Methodology for 2026:

The Cluster adopted a targeting approach based on:

- District severity classification,
- Population density within displacement sites,
- Partner operational capacity and continuity of presence,
- Security and access constraints,
- Prioritization of districts with relatively fewer access impediments to ensure feasible and effective implementation.

This methodology ensures that limited resources are directed toward the most vulnerable populations while maintaining realistic operational planning.

### 2026 Target and Financial Requirements:

For 2026, the Cluster plans to target approximately **614,000 of the most vulnerable IDPs** in 60 districts residing in displacement sites. The total financial requirement to implement the planned response is estimated at **USD 46.5 million**

### Site Monitoring Tool (SMT) – Comparative analysis

the cluster, with support from YDR consortium and ECHO, worked with REACH to produce a comparative analysis of the SMT to assess changes in site conditions and service availability between Round 6 (November–December 2024) and Round 1 (April–May 2025). The analysis aims to support CCCM strategic planning and prioritization by identifying trends in sectoral performance, persistent gaps, and areas requiring urgent follow-up. Findings represent data collected from 165 managed sites across Abyan, Ad Dali', Aden, Al Hodeidah, Lahj, Marib, and Ta'iz governorates.


#### Key highlights:

- **Sectoral Trends:** Data indicate a decline in reported conditions across several sectors in the assessed governorates. Limited improvements were observed in Nutrition in (Aden and Al Hodeidah governorates), Safety & Security in (Al Hodeidah, Lahj, and Abyan governorates), and Site Maintenance in (Marib and Ad-Dali' governorates). Reported conditions in core assistance sectors, including Cash, Food, Livelihoods, and Sanitation, deteriorated in multiple governorates.
- **Geographic focus:** Abyan, Ad-Dali', Ta'iz, and Aden recorded deterioration across a wide range of sectors, suggesting these governorates may benefit from targeted follow-up and deeper analysis.
- **Most critical gaps:** findings indicate challenges related to NFI access and affordability (particularly in Abyan, Lahj, and Ta'iz), limitations in water and sanitation response capacity, and Protection & HLP-related concerns, including insecure tenure and eviction risks in Abyan, Al Hodeidah, Lahj; as well as an increase in reported fire-related incidents in Marib and Al Hodeidah.

### Multi-Hazard Analysis (MHA) – district-level analysis

To support preparedness and continuity of operations in IDP sites, the cluster, with support from ECHO and YDR consortium developed the Multi-Hazard Analysis (MHA): a district-level composite risk framework for CCCM Cluster's operational areas that combines hazard, exposure, and vulnerability to show where IDPs face the highest risks. It draws on secondary sources (including SMT, flood hazard analysis, conflict events, IPC, HeRAMS, and MEACAM) and fills remaining gaps through structured consultations with CCCM partners and subnational coordinators. The resulting district risk scores inform preparedness planning, prioritization, coordination, and advocacy. The MHA also served as the primary evidence base for CCCM People in Need (PiN) estimates in this year's Humanitarian Needs Overview (HNO).

### Key highlights:

- **Overview:** Of the 125 assessed districts, 44 districts (~35%) are classified as High or Very High risk, driven by the combined effects of flood/drought hazards, conflict exposure, and high vulnerability, highlighting areas where preparedness and response are critical.
- **Very High-risk districts:** Twelve districts (~10%) fall under Very High risk, primarily in Al Jawf, Marib, Abyan, Al Bayda, Amran, and Dhamar. These areas are affected by overlapping risks, including conflict exposure, climate hazards, and limited coping capacity, leaving displaced populations exceptionally vulnerable to shocks.

## International Organization for Migration (IOM)

### General Information:

The International Organization for Migration continued providing CCCM Site Management and Coordination support across 17 displacement sites in Marib, Ibb, and the West Coast, hosting 25,967 displaced households (132,163 individuals). In addition, IOM extended technical support and monitoring to 74 phased-out sites affected by funding constraints. During the reporting period, insecurity in Hadramout Governorate resulted in a new influx of displaced families, with 518 households received into IOM-managed sites in Marib, increasing pressure on services, shelter, and infrastructure.

### Key Achievements:

- Conducted flood risk reduction activities in 18 sites across Marib, Ibb, and the West Coast
- Constructed internal drainage channels, stone embankments, and gabion walls to mitigate flooding risks
- Protected 106,922 households from seasonal flooding impacts
- Installed solar-powered streetlights in five sites to improve night-time safety and mobility
- Improved protection conditions for 6,283 individuals, particularly women and children
- Delivered life skills and income-generating training for 141 vulnerable women
- Conducted CCCM, Housing, Land and Property (HLP) rights, and durable solutions trainings for 287 participants from authorities, partners, and communities
- Strengthened site coordination structures, service mapping, and response planning

## Generation Without Qat Organization (GWQ)

### General Information:

Generation Without Qat Organization led Area-Based CCCM coordination in Maqbanah District, Taiz Governorate, covering six IDP sites hosting 3,830 displaced individuals, while responding to both long-term displacement and sudden emergency influxes.

### Key Achievements:

- Rapidly registered 53 newly displaced households (348 individuals) within 72 hours following November clashes
- Coordinated emergency assistance with Shelter, WASH, and Health partners for new arrivals
- Conducted four area-based coordination meetings with humanitarian actors
- Maintained updated site master lists, population figures, and service mapping tools
- Established five functional community committees with 30 representatives including women and persons with disabilities
- Operated Complaint and Feedback Mechanisms receiving 374 cases and resolving 370 (99% resolution)
- Conducted 300 awareness sessions on hygiene, protection, fire safety, DRR, and community participation

- Reached 5,621 individuals through awareness activities
- Launched site maintenance works, flood mitigation structures, and community-led infrastructure projects

## Jeel Al Bena Association for Human Development (JAAHD)

### General Information:

Jeel Al Bena Association for Human Development continued CCCM supervision and coordination across 60 IDP sites in Al Hudaydah and Ibb Governorates, covering eight districts and serving 47,042 displaced persons through structured coordination and community engagement mechanisms. **Key Achievements:**

- Conducted 63 coordination meetings with humanitarian partners across operational districts
- Monitored partner activities and service delivery in all supported sites
- Referred 367 vulnerable individuals including GBV survivors, elderly persons, and persons with disabilities to specialized services
- Achieved 99% referral follow-up rate
- Delivered 111 awareness sessions on hygiene promotion, protection, disaster risk reduction, and accountability
- Reached 1,015 community members through awareness campaigns
- Implemented three flood mitigation and drainage improvement projects benefiting 989 individuals
- Conducted multi-sector needs assessments to identify priority site maintenance and community-led projects

## Life Makers Meeting Place Organization (LMMPO)

### General Information:

Life Makers Meeting Place Organization Organization managed CCCM operations across six IDP sites in Dhamar City, focusing on coordination, community participation, service monitoring, and referral systems.

### Key Achievements:

- Distributed unconditional cash assistance to 370 households across three monthly rounds
- Improved food security and reduced negative coping strategies among beneficiary families
- Conducted 67 awareness sessions covering nutrition, hygiene, DRR, livelihoods, and accountability
- Reached more than 1,000 displaced individuals
- Coordinated winter assistance distributing 2,980 blankets to 511 vulnerable households
- Conducted technical site assessments and finalized designs for upcoming infrastructure improvement projects

## Tamdeen Youth Foundation (TYF)

### General Information:

Tamdeen Youth Foundation continued CCCM site management in Ainama and Al Dhuri IDP sites in Yarim District, Ibb Governorate, strengthening community governance and improving living conditions.

### Key Achievements:

- Managed sites hosting 80 displaced families with routine population tracking and coordination
- Elected and trained community committees to support site governance, awareness, and CFM
- Constructed 250 m<sup>2</sup> of drainage channels to mitigate flood risks
- Built 50 m<sup>2</sup> of internal concrete pathways improving accessibility
- Installed eight bathrooms to improve sanitation
- Installed six water storage tanks to strengthen water availability
- Installed eight solar streetlights to enhance site safety
- Distributed 66 solar-powered oven kits to support household energy needs

## Human Access for Partnership and Relief (Human Access)

### General Information:

Human Access for Partnership and Relief implemented CCCM activities across six IDP sites in Marib Governorate, coordinating emergency response, service delivery, and early recovery interventions in collaboration with humanitarian partners.

### Key Achievements:

- Responded to displacement influx from Hadramout through coordinated cash assistance, NFIs, shelter support, and winterization kits
- Conducted 29 awareness sessions on protection, hygiene, and safety
- Reached 409 individuals through awareness activities
- Installed firefighting points and distributed fire extinguishers across sites
- Conducted electrical safety upgrades in 119 shelters
- Delivered fire safety training for 40 community members and site focal points
- Implemented Quick Impact Projects improving water networks, sanitation facilities, and electrical systems
- Supported vocational training and livelihoods initiatives for early recovery

Mona Relief and Development Organization maintained CCCM engagement across five IDP sites in Sana'a Governorate, focusing on population monitoring, seasonal response, and coordination of essential services despite funding limitations.

### Key Achievements:

- Distributed winter assistance kits to vulnerable households
- Reduced cold-related health risks among children and elderly persons
- Improved access to water in targeted sites
- Enhanced hygiene practices and reduced water collection burden

### Key Achievements:

- Updated beneficiary databases, population figures, and service mapping tools
- Maintained coordination with humanitarian partners across all sites
- Implemented cash-for-work activities benefiting over 900 workers
- Conducted regular solid waste removal and cleaning campaigns
- Installed solar-powered lighting systems improving safety and night mobility
- Rehabilitated internal access roads and leveled camp grounds
- Repaired and constructed water points and pipelines
- Built flood protection walls and drainage channels
- Improved overall hygiene, safety, and access within IDP sites

- Established 21 inclusive community committees representing women, men, elderly, and persons with disabilities

- Implemented site maintenance works and community-led projects

## Benea Charity for Human Development (BCFHD)

### General Information:

Benea Charity for Human Development led Area-Based CCCM coordination across five districts in Taiz Governorate, ensuring aligned humanitarian response for displaced populations in formal and informal sites.

### Key Achievements:

- Coordinated humanitarian services for more than 57,000 displaced individuals
- Conducted regular ABAC partner coordination meetings
- Activated community self-management teams and site committees
- Strengthened service monitoring and gap identification mechanisms
- Conducted field monitoring visits to follow up on partner interventions

## Building Foundation for Development (BFD)

### General Information:

Building Foundation for Development continued CCCM site management in Misharafah and Al-Jallah IDP sites in Dhamar Governorate, focusing on coordination, population tracking, and infrastructure improvements.

### Key Achievements:

- Supported 2,763 displaced individuals across two IDP sites
- Conducted monthly population tracking and service mapping
- Delivered 23 awareness campaigns on health, hygiene, accountability, and protection
- Reached 1,637 beneficiaries through awareness activities
- Delivered CCCM capacity-building trainings for community actors
- Managed emergency referrals through cluster mechanisms
- Implemented road rehabilitation, leveling works, and site maintenance through cash-for-work

## Agency for Technical Cooperation and Development (ACTED)

### Al Dhalee Governorate

### General Information:

ACTED's CCCM operations continued across 35 IDP sites in Al-Dhalee Governorate during the reporting period. The context was marked by continued displacement, new arrivals and departures, flood risks, and critical humanitarian need

- Community structures were strengthened, the Site Management Tool (SMT) was rolled out, and flood preparedness and response activities were sustained.
- New arrivals were recorded in As-Sawda'a, Habel Al-Minzar, Habel Al-Tha'alia, Habel Al-Mohafadhah, Assaqa, and Ghawl Mohaisen, while departures were recorded in As-Sawda'a Camp.
- CRC operations began in October and were temporarily paused in November due to issues with EXU.

## Key Achievements

- Re-established and selected 129 Community Committee members (75 males, 54 females) across 17 IDP sites, including the formation and activation of flood committees to strengthen community-based disaster preparedness.
- Trained 17 Community Mobilizers (10 males, 7 females) on the Site Management Tool (SMT), enabling systematic real-time reporting on population movements, urgent needs, service gaps, and partner activities.
- Recorded, followed up, and closed 86 complaints and feedback cases through the CFM system in October, ensuring accountability and timely response to community concerns.
- Provided phone credit to 94 Community Committee members and 10 flood committee members to strengthen communication channels, coordination with partners, and rapid emergency response.
- Referred urgent medical and protection cases, including burn injuries, pregnancy complications, and child injury cases, to DEEM for specialized services.
- Referred 100 households across multiple sites for NFI assistance to ACTED WASH and Shelter teams to address urgent basic needs.
- Shared updated IDP master lists with IRC and other humanitarian partners to support proposal development and coordinated response planning.
- Maintained continuous coordination with EXU and UNHCR regarding new arrivals and the relocation process of families exposed to high-voltage electricity line risks.
- Handed over the Community Resource Centre (CRC) to EXU and the Community Committee on 9 October 2025 to enhance sustainability and community ownership.
- Registered 310 referral cases in October through the CRC (171 host community members and 139 IDPs), facilitating access to multi-sectoral services.
- Distributed stationery kits to 10 CRC committee members in December to support operational continuity of the center.
- Completed and handed over shading umbrellas at Bagah School to improve learning conditions for students.
- Installed solar street lighting systems in Bagah and Al-A'dae'n camps to enhance safety, reduce protection risks, and improve night-time mobility.
- Selected Assaqa and As-Sakaniah sites under MR3 for Community-Led Projects (CLP) following FGDs with 39 participants representing IDPs, host community members, and EXU.
- Activated 15 flood committee members (6 women, 9 men) across five high-risk sites to lead preparedness and response activities.
- Supported 318 flood-affected households with cash assistance provided by Diversity in November.
- Conducted flood awareness sessions reaching 81 community members in Ghawl Mohaisen and Habel Al-Dawhagah.
- Updated flood preparedness and contingency plans for five sites on 6 October 2025 to strengthen site-level readiness.

## Marib Governorate

### General Information:

- Marib continues to experience protracted displacement, infrastructure gaps, protection risks, and limited access to basic services.
- Heavy rains and floods damaged shelters and increased vulnerabilities during the quarter.
- IDPs face safety risks due to unsafe electricity networks, lack of street lighting, frequent fire incidents, and severe water shortages.
- ACTED monitored newly displaced households arriving from Hadhramout and responded to urgent humanitarian needs.



## Key Achievements

- Conducted electricity network maintenance in Al-Mumallah and Al-Hadba sites under DRR activities to reduce fire hazards and electrocution risks.
- Implemented a Community-Led Project in Al-Hami site, including construction of a water tower tank, installation of a water network, and establishment of four water points to improve safe water access.
- Rehabilitated Abo Bakr Al-Sedeeq School in Al-Hani IDP site, including rehabilitation of 6 classrooms, repair of sanitation and water networks, provision of double desks for students and administrative furniture, and installation of a water cooler.
- Installed an additional water cooler in Al-Kola site to improve access to safe drinking water for residents.
- Trained ACTED CCCM staff on the Area-Based Site Management (ABSM) approach and launched CRC operations aligned with the new modality.
- Trained CRC Community Committee members on roles, responsibilities, and implementation procedures under the ABSM approach.
- Conducted electricity network maintenance and installed 2 transformers and street lighting in Al-Khushaishat to enhance site safety.
- Maintained electricity networks and installed one transformer with street lighting in Al-Kola and Wehshan Al-Garbi.
- Conducted electricity network maintenance and street lighting improvements in Al-Mumallah, Al-Kuwait, and Aal Harmal sites.
- Assessed 90 newly displaced households from Hadhramout under Crisis Modifier activities.

- Provided \$400 cash for shelter assistance to 90 newly displaced households.
- Distributed 90 NFI kits and 90 hygiene kits to the same households, ensuring integrated emergency support.

## Aden Governorate

### General Information:

- ACTED continued CCCM operations across managed IDP sites in Aden, focusing on coordination, community engagement, infrastructure support, and protection advocacy.
- A major milestone during the quarter was the successful re-formation of Community Committees across 16 IDP sites.

### Key Achievements

- Coordinated with Nahda Makers Organization (NMO) to facilitate implementation of Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) targeting flood-affected households in Dar Saad District camps, including sharing detailed beneficiary data, providing technical targeting recommendations, supporting prioritization of fully and partially damaged shelters, and guiding verification processes.
- Coordinated with UNHCR, IOM, NRC, OCHA, and relevant clusters regarding the eviction threat at As-Sawame'a IDP Camp and supported the relocation of 67 households to As-Salam site through field monitoring, gap identification (Shelter, WASH, Food, Protection, MPCA), and participation in joint advocacy efforts.
- Coordinated with Save the Children International (SCI) on flood response interventions at Al-Hofra site targeting 278 households, monitored progress, shared updated flood impact reports, and confirmed completion of NFI distribution by the end of September with continued follow-up in October.
- Successfully re-formed Community Committees across 16 IDP sites between 2–20 October 2025, reaching 122 members (66 males, 56 females) and strengthening site-level governance, representation, and coordination mechanisms across Beer Fadhl collections, Ga'wala Collection, Ash-Shorouq Square, Beer Abdullah, Hosh Al-Jinn, Hosh Othman, Jawlat Ad-Dar, Hosh Derhim, Masbala Collection, As-Sau'di Institute, Ammar Bin Yasser Site, Ash-Sha'b Camps 1 & 2, and Ar-Rawdha Camp.

## Danish Refugee Council (DRC)

### General Information:

The Danish Refugee Council continued implementing shelter, CCCM-linked site maintenance, flood response, and community-based infrastructure projects across Lahj and Hodeidah Governorates. During the quarter, DRC focused on emergency assistance for flood-affected households, rehabilitation of critical WASH and education infrastructure, shelter risk mitigation, and transition planning for site management through partnership with national actors.

## Lahj Governorate

### Key Achievements

- Distributed tarpaulin sheets with thermal insulators to **63 households** at Al-Khadhra Site as part of flood risk mitigation activities
- Distributed partial NFIs from the Shelter Cluster pipeline, including **731 mattresses and 731 blankets**, to flood-affected households at Al-Garad Site following heavy rains in August and September 2025
- Provided **four Emergency Earthquake Shelter Kits (EESKs)** to four households affected by flooding at Rebat Site
- Completed **one Community-Based Project** in Tuban District through installation of **two additional classrooms** at Al-Rebat Al-Gharbi, improving access to education
- Implemented **two major latrine rehabilitation projects**, restoring:
  - **50 latrines at Al-Garad Site**
  - **14 latrines at Al-Kandam Site**
 significantly improving hygiene conditions and dignity for displaced communities
- Conducted **desludging for three pits with 13 separate operations** at Rebat Site to address sanitation risks
- Repaired the **main water pipeline at Ateera Site** and a damaged **branch pipeline at Rebat Site**, restoring reliable water access
- Constructed **12 covers for open pits** at Al-Rebat Site to reduce health and safety hazards
- Installed the **main 4-inch borehole pump valve** at Rebat Site to strengthen water system functionality
- Supported **maintenance of classroom windows** at Ateera Site through site maintenance committees in preparation for the new academic year

## Yemeni General Union of Sociologists, Social Workers, and Psychologists (YGUSSWP)

### General Information:

During Q4 2025, YGUSSWP implemented multi-sectoral humanitarian interventions targeting IDPs and host communities across **Hajjah, Marib, Sana'a, Dhamar, Taiz, Ibb, Al Bayda, Al Mahwit, Amran, Al-Jawf, and Amanat Al Asimah**.

Interventions covered CCCM, Shelter, Protection, WASH, Health, Nutrition, FSAC, Livelihoods, flood risk mitigation, winterization, infrastructure rehabilitation, and community-led projects.

Activities focused on life-saving assistance, disaster risk reduction, resilience building, service access improvement, and protection-sensitive programming.

Projects were implemented in coordination with clusters and partners including UNHCR, UNFPA, and relevant sector coordination mechanisms

### Key Achievements:

#### Hajjah Governorate

- Implemented 6 flood risk mitigation projects in **Khayran Al Muharaq and Ku'aydinah Districts**, including gabion walls (up to 130m), drainage systems, road paving, well protection, emergency preparedness kits, and Cash-for-Work activities benefiting over 1,448 households.
- Installed 7 solar streetlighting systems across IDP sites, benefiting over 1,471 households and improving safety and mobility.
- Distributed and installed solar home lighting kits for 60 households in **Atabah and Tajamo' Al-Juma'a Al Thulth** sites.
- Implemented 5 road paving and access improvement projects in **Washhah and Khayran Al Muharaq**, benefiting 607 households through durable stone paving and drainage systems.
- Completed 8 Community-Led Projects (CLPs), including livelihood support for 60 women (sewing training and machines), 30 men (weaving skills), road improvements (60 Cash-for-Work laborers), flood mitigation works, and disability inclusion support for 120 persons with disabilities.
- Provided HLP case management for 16 households and legal identity support for 100 individuals.
- Distributed NFIs and energy kits to 228 households and constructed 250 transitional shelters (50 in Ku'aydinah, 200 in Khayran Al Muharraq).



## Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC)

### Abyan Governorate

#### General Information

##### Al-Moeh Site – Community-Based Project

Al-Moeh site experienced significant challenges due to heavy rainfall in 2024, resulting in serious damage to non-food items (NFI) and food supplies. Continuous water flow and flooding led to substantial losses and negatively affected residents' well-being. The situation highlighted the urgent need for mitigation measures to reduce the impact of future weather-related shocks and support community recovery.

##### Al-Baqar Block – Musameer IDP Site (Site Improvement)

Households in Al-Baqar block face limited access to essential water resources due to insufficient water points and inadequate storage capacity. High water prices further restrict access. Residents spend between 30 minutes to one hour fetching water from boreholes or water points, underscoring the need for improved water management and infrastructure solutions.



33 in Al-Baqar block households received a 1,000-liter water tank

#### Key Achievements

- NRC launched targeted community-based flood mitigation interventions at Al-Moeh site to reduce the risk of further damage during upcoming rainy seasons and to stabilize affected areas.
- Distributed essential construction materials, including cement at Al-Moeh site, enabling households to reinforce vulnerable structures and improve site durability against water flow and flooding.
- In Khanfer district, NRC provided integrated hybrid support (cash and in-kind assistance) to 33 IDP households in Al-Baqar block to directly address water access challenges.
- Each of the 33 households received a 1,000-liter water tank to significantly enhance water storage capacity at the household level and reduce reliance on frequent water collection.
- Through a structured Cash-for-Work (CfW) modality, households received both technical guidance and financial assistance to construct proper bases for the tanks and securely connect them to their shelters.
- Each participating household received \$20 under the CfW scheme, ensuring community ownership, active participation in installation works, and improved sustainability of the intervention.

- The combined intervention reduced the time and physical burden associated with water collection while strengthening household-level water management systems.

## Lahj Governorate

### General Information

#### Tur Al-Baha Site – Community-Based Project

Tur Al-Baha site is located on a steep slope within a flood-prone area and frequently faces drainage challenges following heavy rainfall. Water accumulation, combined with rapid growth of Sesbania trees, causes blockages that hinder proper drainage and increase flood risks. Addressing these issues is essential to improve site livability and reduce future flooding impacts.

### Key Achievements

- NRC implemented site-level flood mitigation measures at Tur Al-Baha by distributing gravel and site leveling tools to improve ground elevation and facilitate better surface water drainage.
- Community members were supported to clear blocked drainage pathways and address water accumulation points, reducing flood-related risks to shelters and communal infrastructure.
- A tailored cash distribution plan was developed based on site-specific vulnerabilities, ensuring assistance was responsive to the unique topography and drainage constraints of Tur Al-Baha and Al-Moeh sites.
- Preventive actions were prioritized ahead of the rainy season to minimize potential damage to shelters, NFIs, and communal assets.
- The intervention strengthened community resilience by improving site infrastructure, enhancing water flow management, and reducing the likelihood of recurrent flooding impacts.

## Marib Governorate:

### General Information

- Updated trackers for incidents, evictions, and movement.
- Conducted coordination meetings for service providers/partners working across the 11 NRC-managed sites.
- Conducted monthly coordination meetings with Community Committees across the 11 sites.
- Prepared for SMT Round 6 CCCM Cluster data collection for 11 sites.
- Coordinated and arranged with CARE organization for distribution of 120 units of 1,000-liter water tanks in **Menin Al-Haddad IDP site**, and supported the final stages of implementing the concrete tower water tank project with water network in the same site.

- Conducted site infrastructure maintenance and rehabilitation of internal roads in **Al Maneen Al Qebli site**, including rehabilitation of the water distribution system in **Al Diman site**.
- Distributed cash for 209 NFIs (winterization kits) in **Aal Haimed, Aal Mosalal, Al Rboh, Al Maneen Al Qebli, Al Yusufi, Hajibah, Maneen Al-Hadad, Ar Rajw**.
- Constructed 130 T-shelters in **Aal Haimed, Aal Mosalal, Al Rboh, Ar Rajw, Al Diman, Al Yusufi, Hajibah, Maneen Al-Hadad, Wahshan Al Sharqi**.

- Distributed cash for 1,489 hygiene kits in **Aal Haimed, Wahshan Al Sharqi, Ar Rabwa, Al Diman.**
- Rehabilitated water network in **Aal Haimed site.**
- Constructed 143 bathrooms with 300-liter tanks.
- Implemented Education interventions including:
  - Distribution of 1,505 school bags and 664 educational materials.
  - Training of 172 school administrators and 233 teachers.
  - Construction of 18 bathrooms and 20 classrooms.
  - Renovation of 14 schools in **Aal Haimed, Aal Mosalal, Al Jboul, Ar Rajw, Al Maneen Al Qebli, Al\_Rboh.**
- Implemented ICLA interventions including 350 LCD assistances, 311 cash for post-evacuation assistance, and 658 HLP & LCD awareness sessions.
- Implemented Protection interventions including 87 protection cash assistances, 50 PCM cases, and 5 referrals.

## CHALLENGES

- Escalating HLP issues and eviction threats across multiple governorates (including urban-adjacent sites), driven by landowners reclaiming, selling, or investing in land, placing hundreds of households at risk of forced displacement and suspending site improvement investments in high-risk locations such as Al Shat and Hosh Al Jamea'a.
- Widespread funding shortages and reduction/suspension of grants, leading to partner withdrawal (including site management actors), suspension of activities (e.g., CRC operations), closure of community centers, and inability to implement planned infrastructure and maintenance works.
- Severe multi-sectoral service gaps across IDP sites, including food insecurity (exacerbated by WFP suspension), lack of shelter support, shortages of NFIs and hygiene kits, limited health and nutrition services, and insufficient WASH coverage.
- Overwhelming unmet needs compared to limited available resources, including thousands of households requiring food, NFIs, hygiene kits, shelter maintenance, and water infrastructure support.
- Absence or very limited presence of humanitarian partners in several locations, leaving some sites without active service providers or government support and relying on single actors with limited funding.
- New displacement influxes (including arrivals from Hadramout and other conflict-affected areas) placing additional strain on already overstretched sites without contingency funding or rapid response mechanisms.
- Logistical and access constraints, including poor road conditions, seasonal rains, flooding risks, dispersed sites, and security concerns delaying service delivery and supply transport.
- Delays in procurement, tendering, land agreements, and complex approval processes involving clusters, donors, local authorities, and line ministries, slowing implementation of site maintenance and CLPs.
- Infrastructure fragility in displacement sites, including unsafe electricity networks, fire risks, inadequate drainage, limited water storage, insufficient lighting, and deteriorating WASH facilities requiring frequent maintenance.
- Weak inter-agency coordination and delays in information sharing, affecting timely emergency responses, referrals, and equitable service distribution.
- Limited partner response capacity to referrals due to overstretched resources, particularly in food assistance and protection services.
- Inadequate capacity and training of community committees, unfamiliarity with CLP methodologies among stakeholders, and limited understanding of implementation procedures within finance and partner teams.
- Restrictions imposed by authorities in yarim district on awareness activities related to complaints and accountability mechanisms, weakening communication with beneficiaries.
- Weak community awareness and overreliance on humanitarian actors, alongside increasing vulnerability cases (widows, persons with disabilities, complex households).
- Growing economic deterioration and increasing movement of IDPs from rented housing to camps, intensifying pressure on site services and infrastructure.
- Seasonal and climate-related risks, including floods, extreme weather, and fire incidents, without adequate preparedness or emergency stocks.
- The ABSM workshop was delivered in a hybrid format, combining in-person and online participation due to significant travel and access constraints affecting both participants and facilitators. Mobility restrictions for participants traveling to Aden from northern governorates, along with limited flight availability from Marib, made full in-person attendance impractical and required alternative participation arrangements. This approach demanded intensive coordination between remotely based facilitators and the on-site training team to maintain smooth facilitation, effective time management, and participant engagement. Logistical challenges—including connectivity issues, scheduling alignment, and the dynamics of remote facilitation—posed risks to interaction and learning continuity. However, through proactive mitigation measures, close coordination, and structured session management, the workshop was successfully delivered with positive learning outcomes despite these constraints.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

- Intensify advocacy with donors, clusters, OCHA, FSAC, Shelter/NFI, Protection, and HLP actors to mobilize urgent and flexible funding for site management, food assistance, infrastructure rehabilitation, and emergency preparedness.
- Establish or expand contingency and rapid response funding mechanisms to address new displacement influxes, eviction risks, floods, and fire incidents.
- Prioritize relocation processes for sites facing imminent eviction by expediting land agreements and ensuring safe, planned alternatives for affected households.
- Launch rapid and integrated shelter responses in newly affected or underserved sites to enable multi-sector service delivery (WASH, Health, Protection).
- Strengthen inter-agency coordination through regular multi-stakeholder meetings, streamlined reporting systems, and improved referral pathways to ensure timely and harmonized responses.
- Advocate for the return and expansion of humanitarian partners in underserved districts and unmanaged IDP hosting sites to restore sectoral coverage.
- Streamline approval and procurement processes by enhancing coordination with authorities and donors, preparing parallel documentation, and simplifying supply chain procedures.
- Scale up disaster risk reduction (DRR) and preparedness measures, including early warning systems, flood mitigation works, fire safety interventions, and pre-positioning of emergency stocks.
- Invest in sustainable infrastructure improvements, including water networks, electricity safety upgrades, drainage systems, site lighting, and WASH rehabilitation.
- Expand livelihood and economic empowerment interventions to reduce dependency on aid and enhance household self-reliance.
- Strengthen capacity-building for community committees through training, monitoring tools, and inclusive participation strategies, with particular focus on increasing female representation.
- Enhance accountability and community engagement mechanisms, including advocacy to lift restrictions on complaint awareness activities and reinforcing CRC functionality.
- Improve data collection, monitoring systems, and evidence-based reporting to support advocacy, resource mobilization, and equitable service planning.
- Prioritize low-cost, high-impact interventions (e.g., heating supplies, water access support, seasonal maintenance) while scaling coverage to reach the most vulnerable households.
- It is recommended to institutionalize a lighter ABSM training package for induction and stakeholder orientation, responding to requests from participating organizations. The simplified ABSM module—jointly developed by the YDR Capacity Building team and the CCCM Cluster and shared with partners on 12 January 2026—should be adopted as a standardized tool for onboarding, stakeholder briefings, and coordination meetings to ensure a common understanding of ABSM principles. Future capacity-building efforts should continue utilizing blended and flexible learning modalities (hybrid or remote) to address access and travel constraints, while maintaining strong coordination mechanisms between remote facilitators and in-country training teams to safeguard training quality in challenging operational contexts.
