27-Mar-2026	ISCG to finalize and share the Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) on convoy coordination to clarify roles, prioritization process, and communication channels in consultation with a small group including one representative from Logistics, AWG, OCG, and national sector coordination.	Ongoing
6-Mar-2026	Sectors to provide inputs on Flash Updates on Mondays and Thursday by 7:00 PM.	Ongoing
6-Mar-2026	Sectors to closely follow-up with their partners to report their activities DAILY through ActivityInfo by 16:00, covering assistance provided both inside and outside collective shelters.	Ongoing

LRP & Flash Appeal Update

Way Forward

Recommended Way Forward by HCT: FA Extension + Sequential LRP Addendum

- Extend the Flash Appeal (June-August 2026), informed by ERNA findings, response monitoring, and sectoral analysis, while maintaining a primary focus on urgent life-saving assistance including emergency Livelihoods.
- Following the expiry of the FA, develop a targeted LRP Addendum to address residual life-sustaining needs resulting from the escalation that fall outside the LRP scope.
- The Addendum would focus on vulnerable populations and affected areas requiring continued support beyond emergency response, including essential services, shelter solutions, and livelihoods,.
- This approach maintains operational continuity while avoiding a heavy mid-year revision process for the LRP.
- Detailed guidance on all processes will be shared by ISCG co-chairs to sector coordination teams.

This is being recommended as the way forward by the HCT to balance immediate humanitarian priorities with the reality of sustained residual needs following the escalation, while avoiding a heavy planning process and maintaining alignment with the broader humanitarian reset discussions.

Immediate: FA extension process (suggested timeline) *publication 1 June, work back from there*

- 13/14 May: ISCG planning / working session (proposed agenda / prep will be shared in advance)
- 13/14 May: Input templates (a numbers template and a guided short narrative template)
- 19 May: Deadline for Sector Inputs (revised figures and narrative)
- **21 May: HCT review and endorsement** of proposed figures and key changes
- 26 May: MoSA review and greenlight of the FA extension.
- **1 June: Publication** of the Flash Appeal Extension
- Week of 1 June: Flash Appeal Launch Event – MoSA and UN RC/HC

- *Message for ISCG: tight timeline – can we work towards this? It's a light extension but collective effort required in availing data in time from sector and multi-sector assessments.*

Flash Updates

Frequency

- **Reducing the frequency may signal a lower level of emergency severity**, which could undermine advocacy efforts and negatively affect resource mobilization and funding prospects.
- **Refocus content on key humanitarian priorities**, specifically:
 - **Needs:** Highlight evolving humanitarian needs and emerging priorities.
 - **Response:** Provide concise updates on operational activities and achievements.
 - **Gaps:** Identify critical response shortfalls, with particular emphasis on **pipeline breaks and key operational thresholds**.
- **Strengthen response monitoring components** by integrating more systematic tracking of implementation progress and operational bottlenecks.
- **Increase emphasis on International Humanitarian Law (IHL) concerns**, highlighting humanitarian protection needs and systematically showcasing reported violations and their impact on affected populations.
- **Prioritize needs-based messaging**, ensuring updates clearly emphasize urgent requirements, protection concerns, and areas requiring immediate attention.

Recommended to Maintain the Flash Update frequency at twice weekly to ensure timely situational awareness and sustained operational visibility.

LAT Reporting (Jan – Apr 2026)

Background & Current Status

- The **Lebanon Aid Tracking (LAT)** exercise was launched to monitor funding mobilized under:
 - Lebanon Response Plan (LRP)**
 - Flash Appeal**
 - Return-related interventions**
 - Other funding streams**

Key Objective

Ensure:

- Accurate sector-level data & funding analysis
 - Improved visibility on funding coverage and gaps
 - Better alignment between reported achievements and mobilized funding
-
- Organizations were requested to report on **funds received as first recipient** through the LAT ActivityInfo reporting platform.
 - The reporting deadline has been **extended until Friday, 15 May 2026** to allow remaining partners to finalize submissions.
-
- Current Status:**
 - 65 partners** have submitted reports
 - USD 460,441,023** reported so far
 - Current figures remain **preliminary**, as submissions are still being received and reviewed.

LAT Reporting (Jan – Apr 2026)

LAT Online Dashboard Overview

Dashboard Structure & Main Pages

The LAT online dashboard was developed to support sector-level monitoring, follow-up, and analysis of reported funding data.

The dashboard consists of **3 main pages**:

1. LRP Funding Page

Provides a sector-level overview of:

Funds received in 2026, Carry-over funding from 2025, 2026 sector requirements, Percentage funded

2. Flash Appeal Funding Page

Provides the same structure and analysis for:

Flash Appeal funding received, Carry-over figures, Sector requirements, Percentage funded

3. Detailed Funding & Project-Level Page

Provides more granular information, including:

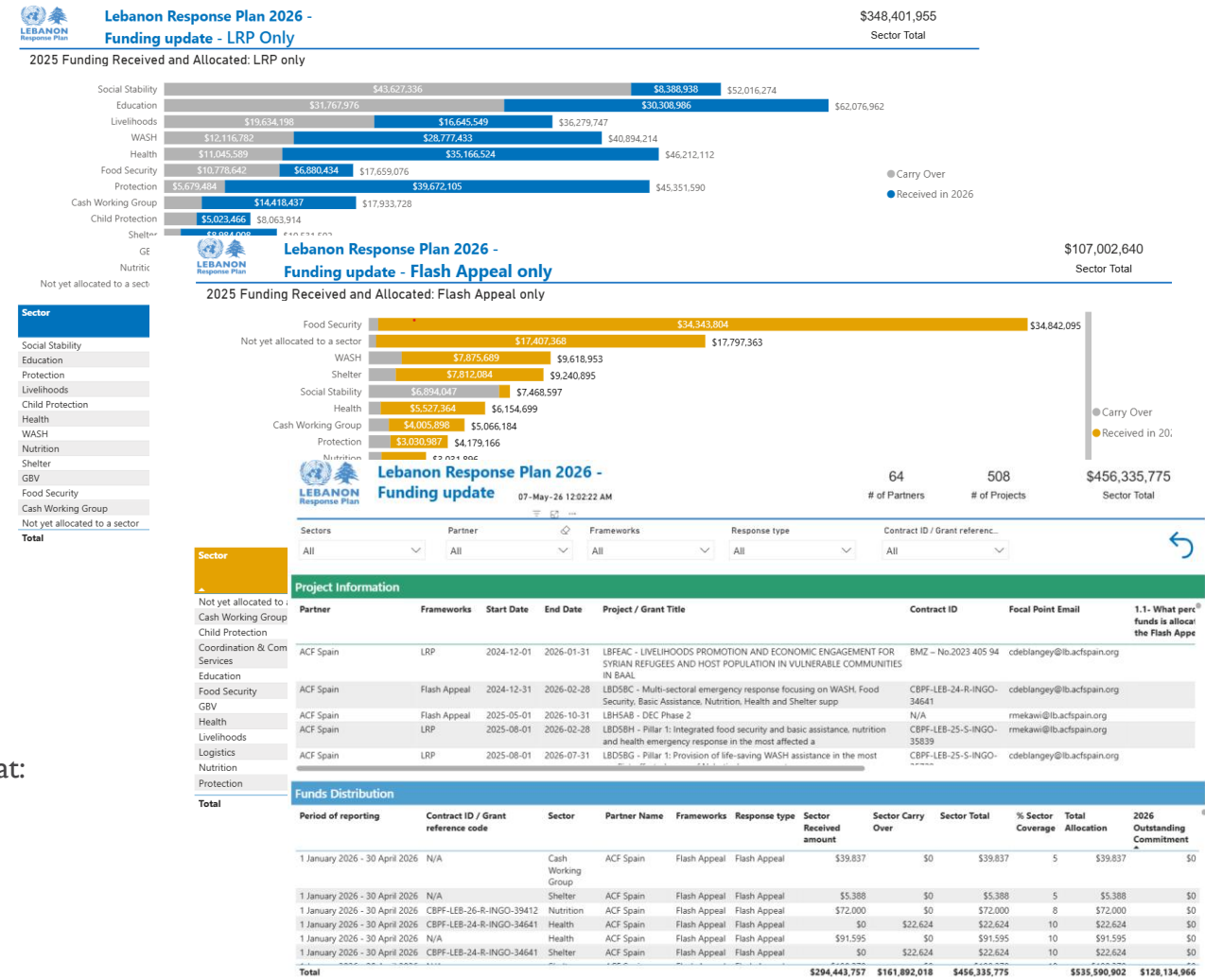
Organization-level funding, Project-level reporting, Funding streams and donor information, Detailed funding breakdowns

Expected support from sectors:

Regularly monitor sector funding data through the dashboard and identify partners that:

- Have not yet reported
- May have underreported funding
- Report interventions under the LRP and/or Flash Appeal but no funding reported
- Follow up with partners to ensure timely and complete reporting

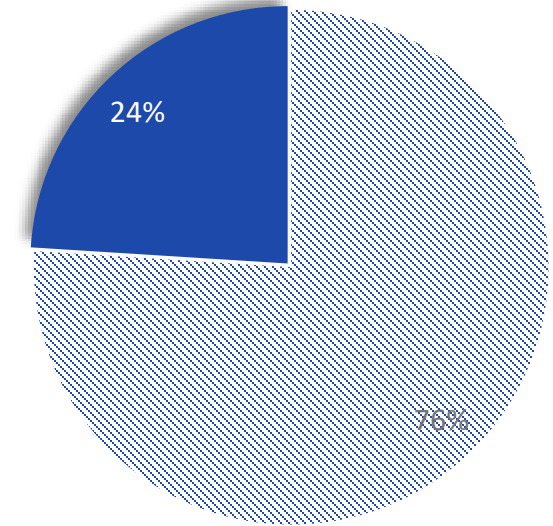
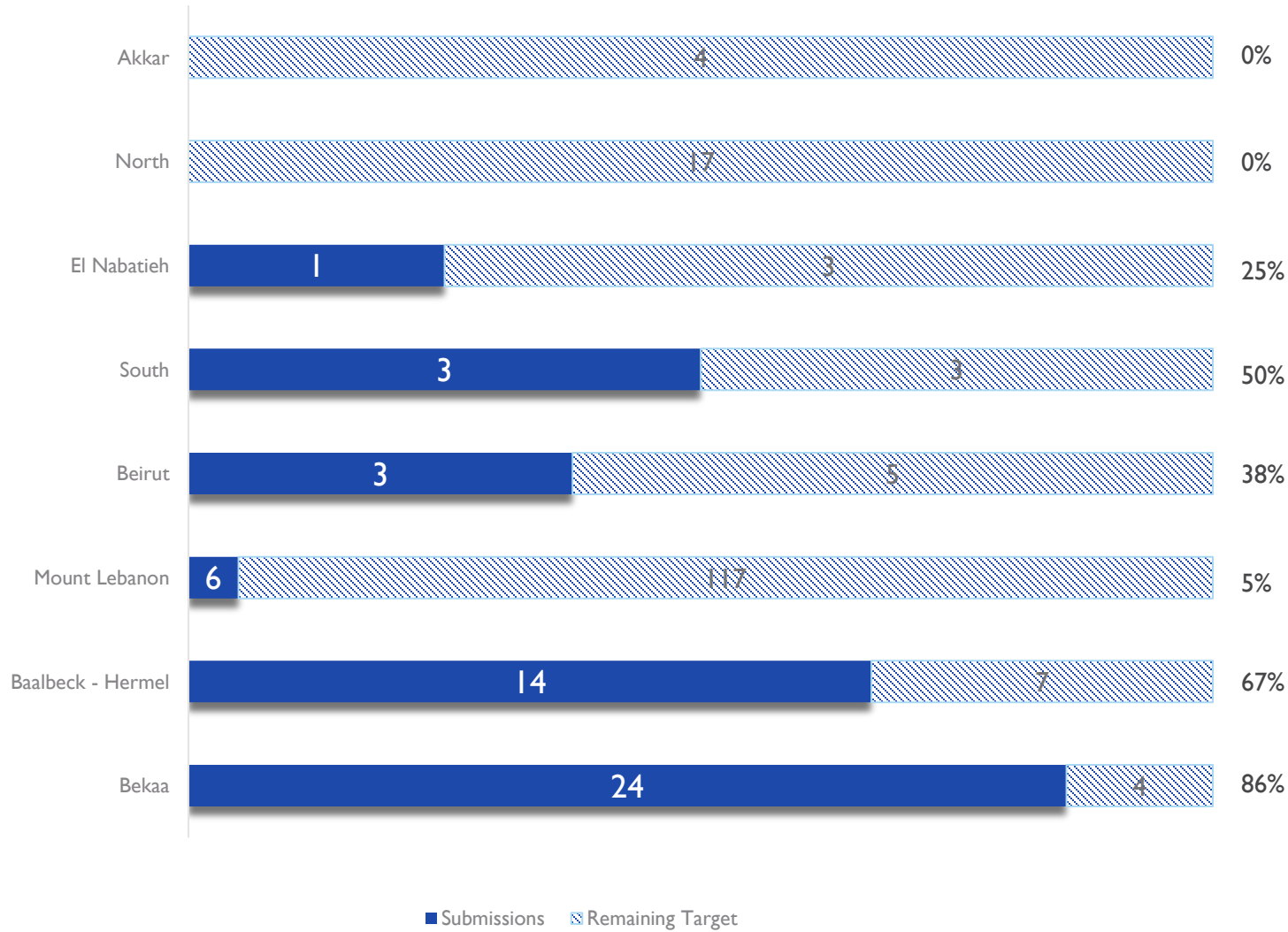

Operational Challenges

- What are the main operational challenges currently affecting the delivery of assistance to displaced populations, both inside and outside collective shelters?
- What tensions are you monitoring?

Response Coverage (Outside vs Inside CS)

- What is the current overview of response coverage outside collective shelters compared to inside?
- Are there gaps in visibility, coordination, or delivery outside collective shelters?

Prioritization

- How is response delivery and request prioritization currently being managed at OCG level?

Operational Coordination

- How is real-time delivery coordinated across sector partners?
- Are there agreed approaches (e.g. minimum assistance packages per convoy) to maximize impact per movement?

Pipeline & Gaps

- Are there any imminent critical pipeline breaks being flagged by partners or sectors? If so, by when?
