



Achievements

- Construction of the first primary school at 75% completed;
- 3 GBV basic training conducted including two sessions to SSPS;
- 186 women in reproductive age received sanitary materials;
- Refugee democratic election led by SSRCA are ongoing;
- 100% of refugees received NFIs and emergency shelter kits;
- 10 SC-UC have been successfully fostered.

Challenges

- Lack of textbooks and unavailability of English teachers;
- Lack of capacity to address mental issues;
- Limited safety, security and legal structures result to impunity of the perpetrators;
- Delay in the distribution of water system, as per camp layout due to logistical constraints.



Ajuong Thok Monthly Updates

Protection

Favorable protection environment conditions have enhanced protection response and guaranteed the rights of refugees. - Individual case management systems are in place resulting to effective response, capacity building including material support to law enforcement agency to ensure safety and security of refugees in the camp, protection monitoring and systematic collection as well as analysis of protection information have enabled UNHCR and partners to identify the needs of refugees including adequate information about services, access to legal and Judiciary system of South Sudan. Refugees including women are also able to elect their representatives in a free, fair and democratic manner. The major challenge however is the limited capacity and presence of SSPS as well as the Justice system in the County

Construction of the first primary school is near completion. Through the initiative of the PTA for the primary and secondary schools, 33 school benches were produced from used timbers to enable a conducive learning environment pending the delivery of school desks. The PTA also constructed two water stands in the primary school. The key challenges are the lack of textbooks, limited English Teachers and logistics

- 332 U5 and Pregnant and Lactating Women out of 350 were each assisted with 840kcal/32g of supplementary food ration in July. Distribution to these targeted population are conducted bi-weekly.
- Access to health services to refugee community : 100% of refugees had access to PHCC services (OPD, IPD, maternity), with physical access of walking distance to the health facility less than 1 Km;
- Referral system established and functioning: 100% of patients who required secondary referral was referred and no patient required tertiary referral;
- Establishment of community structures in refugee community i.e community health committees in eight blocks of the Ajuong Thok camp , two school health committees and the 8 Bomas of surrounding host community for implementation of community based care program.
