



## Highlights

- **Insecurity continues to affect WFP operations.** Two commercial contracted trucks departed Wunrok on 5 June carrying non-food items for WFP to Bentiu. One of these trucks hit a land mine on 6 June, some 3 km west of Mayom Junction (about 25 km from Bentiu). No deaths or injuries were reported.
- In another incident, a WFP contracted truck delivering food from Juba to Wunrok was looted by defected soldiers on 7 June, about 40 km outside of Wau. No injuries were reported though the driver's personal belongings and cash were stolen. The exact amount of food taken has not yet been confirmed.

• While reports are still being finalized and reconciled, during the month of May, WFP operations continued to scale up, reaching an estimated 600,000 beneficiaries with about 8,700 mt of commodities through the EMOP (not yet reflected in the table) and another 590,000 estimated beneficiaries with 6,800 mt through the PRRO.

- Through the Integrated Rapid Response Mechanism, WFP, UNICEF and FAO deployed two field teams to assist over 38,000 people in Wau Shiluk (Upper Nile) and 15,000 people in Jiech (Jonglei) during the period of 1-9 June. WFP mobile food distribution teams are also on the ground in Nyal and Mayendit HQ (Unity) and Akobo (Jonglei) to finalize the second round of food distributions for over 70,000 conflict affected residents and internally displaced people.
- During the reporting period, WFP worked closely with ICRC to ensure coverage for targeted populations in Leer county, particularly linking ICRC's food distributions with WFP's blanket supplementary feeding programmes, while avoiding duplication.
- WFP held a meeting with key nutrition partners, the Nutrition Cluster, UNICEF and the Ministry of Health to review coverage of targeted supplementary feeding programmes in order to develop concrete plans to scale up. It is expected that this scale up will begin immediately as in several cases WFP's partners for these programmes are supporting additional outpatient therapeutic programme sites where screening and complementary interventions are ongoing. A second phase to the scale up will include expansion of geographic coverage of both programmes in coordination with UNICEF and the Nutrition Cluster, with a focus on priority areas.

### Logistics

- Since 1 January WFP Logistics has dispatched 83,725 mt, of which a total of 8,831 mt has been airlifted and airdropped both from Ethiopia and within South Sudan.

# Special Operations

## Food Security & Livelihoods Cluster

- FSLC partners are sharing their plans to produce a comprehensive analysis of partners' targeted interventions that will take place from June to December 2014 with the FSLC secretariat. More than 30 organizations have shared their plans with the FSLC and analysis is ongoing.
- During this week selected partners are being invited to submit proposals for the ongoing CHF reserve allocation. Partners are selected based on the following criteria: capacity in at least two of the three most-affected states (Jonglei, Unity and Upper Nile), presence in at least three of the 30 hardest to reach areas, performance index and whether they had received previous allocations.
- Major challenges for the FSLC this week include: Difficult road transportation for distributions due to the ongoing rainy season and access and implementation constraints due to inter-clan fighting in Rumbek North.

## Logistics Cluster

- Between 1-9 June, over 150 mt of humanitarian supplies was airlifted on behalf of six humanitarian organizations to Malakal, Jiech, Lankien, Waat, Ganyiel, and Akobo.
- On 9 June, the Logistics Cluster conducted a training on how to accurately calculate weights and measures for inclusion on all Service Request Forms. The training was well received, with 50 Cluster partners in attendance.
- The Logistics Cluster has secured three rotations on a larger aircraft from Juba to Malakal to deliver more humanitarian cargo.

## Emergency Telecommunications Cluster (ETC)

- Between 4-9 June, the ETC carried out a mission in Mingkaman and successfully resolved issues linked to the voucher-based user system, which manages wireless internet access at the humanitarian hub, and also provided ICT support. This is expected to improve coordination amongst the humanitarian organizations operating in Mingkaman.
- On 04 June, the ETC travelled to Malakal and re-established VHF connectivity on Channel 9, providing better security telecommunications for aid workers located in Malakal.

## UN Humanitarian Air Service

- One Mi-8MTV helicopter arrived in Juba on 2 June and the second arrived on 6 June. These will reinforce the existing fleet of 22 aircraft already operating in country.
- Last week, UNHAS transported 439 mt of cargo and 1,692 passengers, including 3 medical

evacuations.
