• Approximately 13,731 individuals received hygiene key messages on cholera disease outbreaks, symptom and signs as well as awareness on the transmission routes.

• About 33,081 water containers cleaned in July as part of cholera sensitization, preparedness and response in the camp.



• Hygiene messages have been intensified to boost the level of cholera disease awareness in the community. WASH team is ready to respond in Kaya in any event of cholera disease outbreak. Knowledge Attitude and Practice (KAP) survey was conducted in Kaya to assess the understanding level (capacity) of the community regarding the messages disseminated.

• Much as water data shows below standard, the capacity to produce water exist. Due to the rainy season and avaliability of alternative watser sources, refugee families water needs from the network decreased.

• As part of the camp level cholera preparedness and response activities, health care providers and community health workers were trained on cholera prevention and management courses.

• MSF-H has completed the setting up of a 20 bed CTU for the treatment of cholera cases. In addition, health nd WASH partners organized sensitization workshops for community leaders including sheikhs, women and youth groups. Cholera outbreak control task force was established.

• The community level health, hygiene and sanitation activities have been intensified through community awareness and surveillance activities to facilitate timely reporting of any suspected case of cholera.

MUAC screening was performed in Kaya in the July. However, according to the proxy Global Acute Malnutrition rates (7.3%), the nutrition situation dropped continuously and is within standards.

• SAM (1%) is also within standards. This is consistent with the decrease of SAM numbers in Gentil clinic. TSFP under 5 with Plumpy Sup, BSFP under 2 with CSB++ and TSFP PLW with Cereal, oil and pulses were performed by IMC as well as IYCF Mother Support Group Activities.
