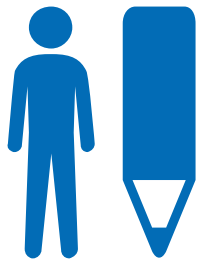

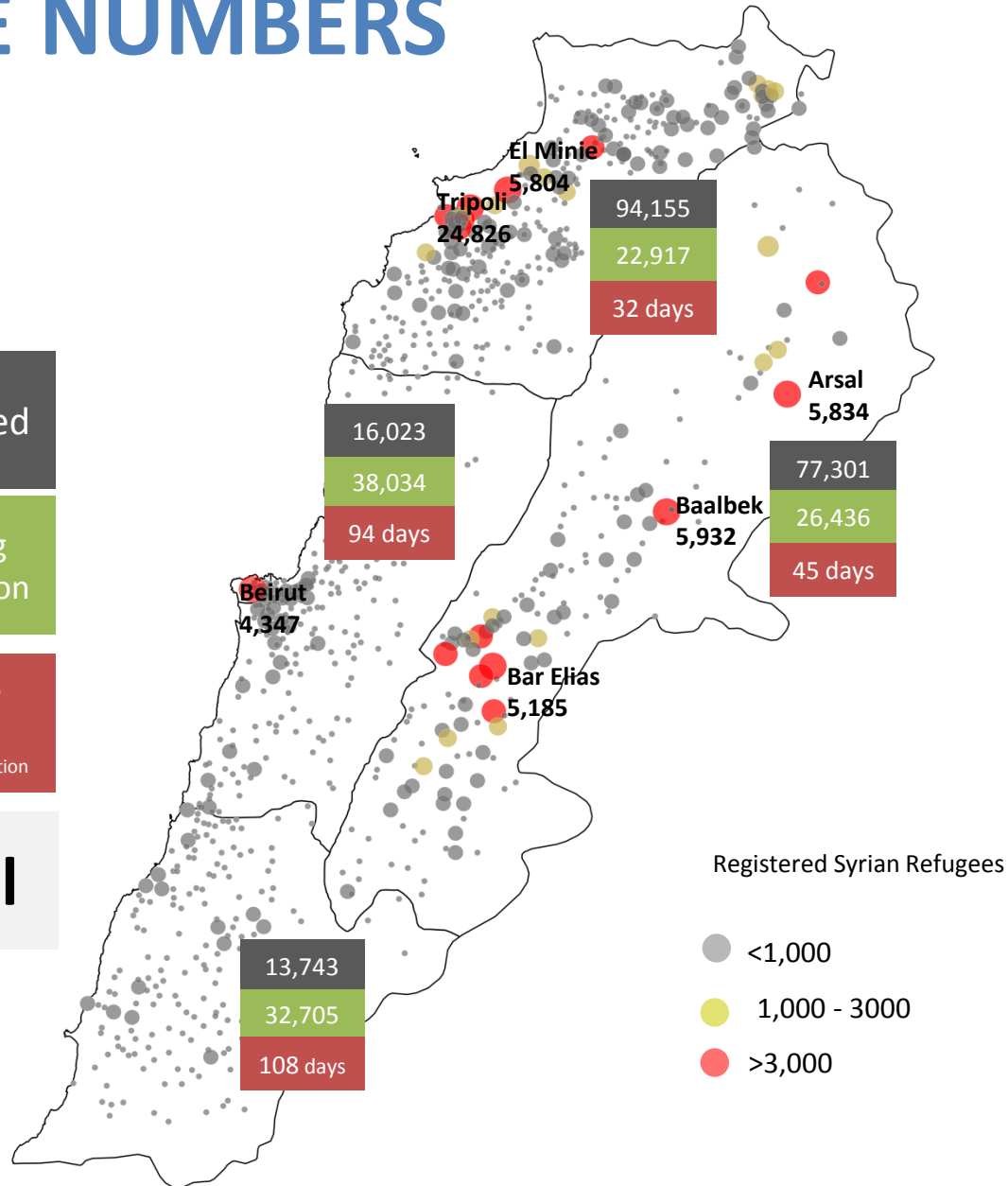

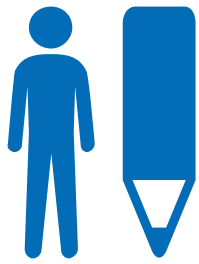

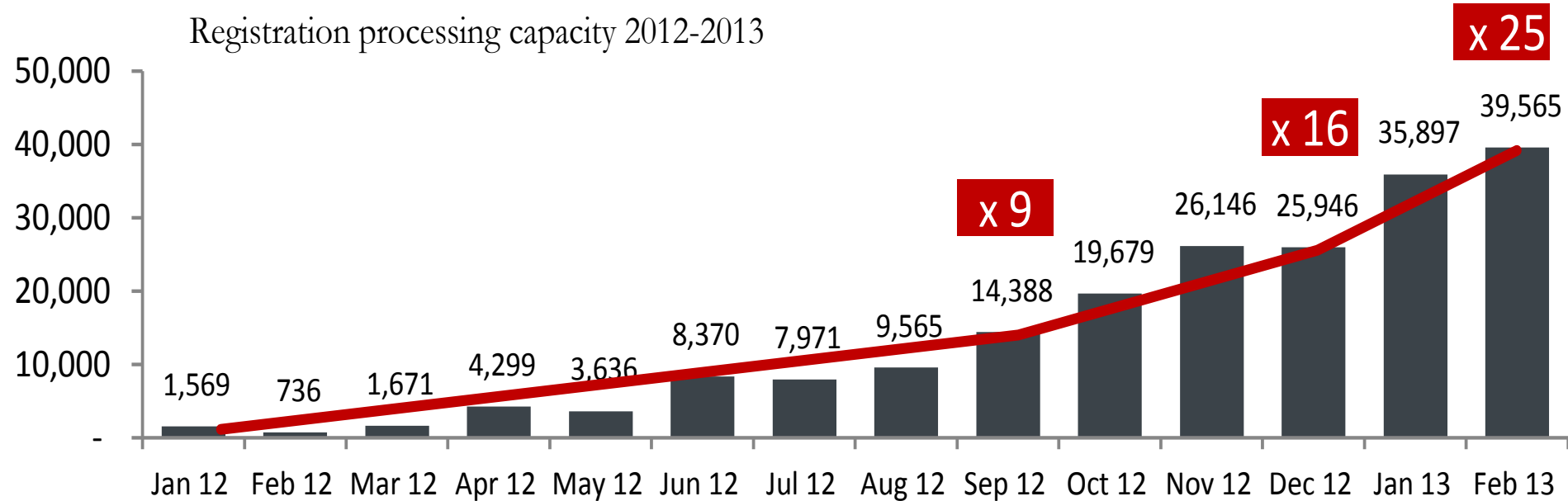


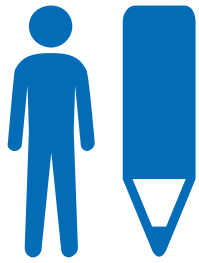

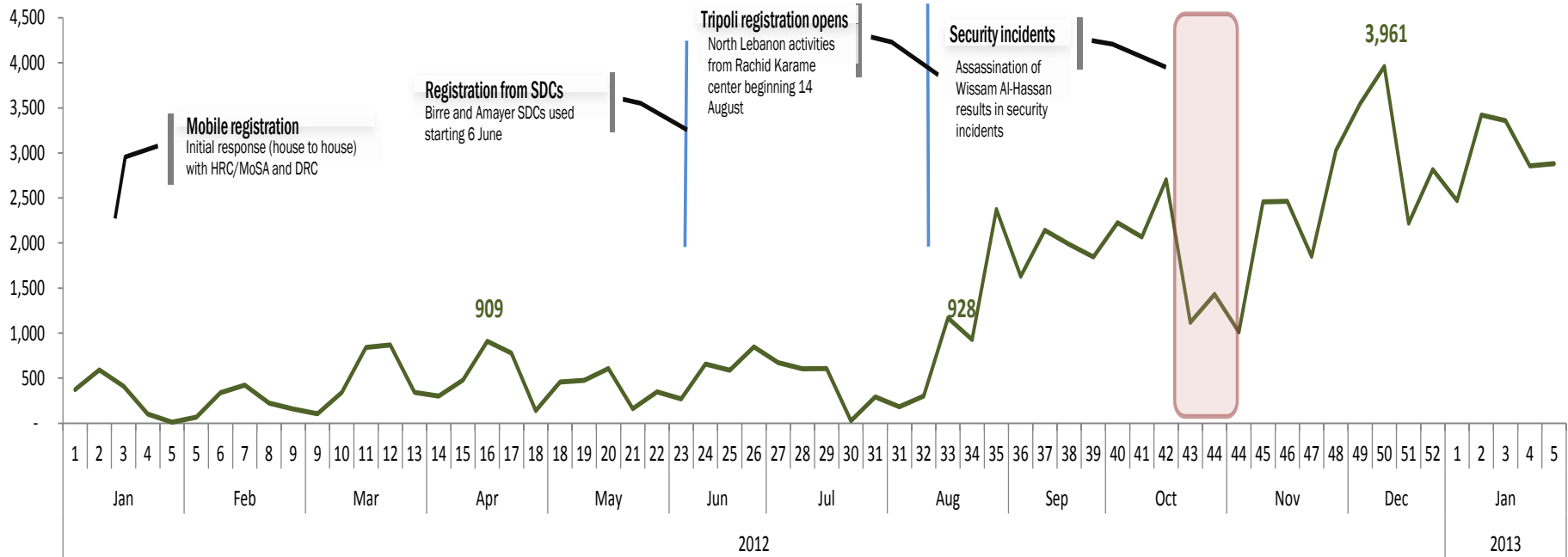
REGISTRATION PROCESSING CAPACITY 2012-2013

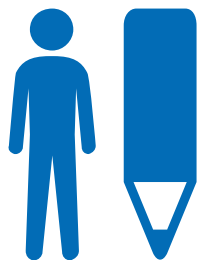
Registration processing capacity 2012-2013





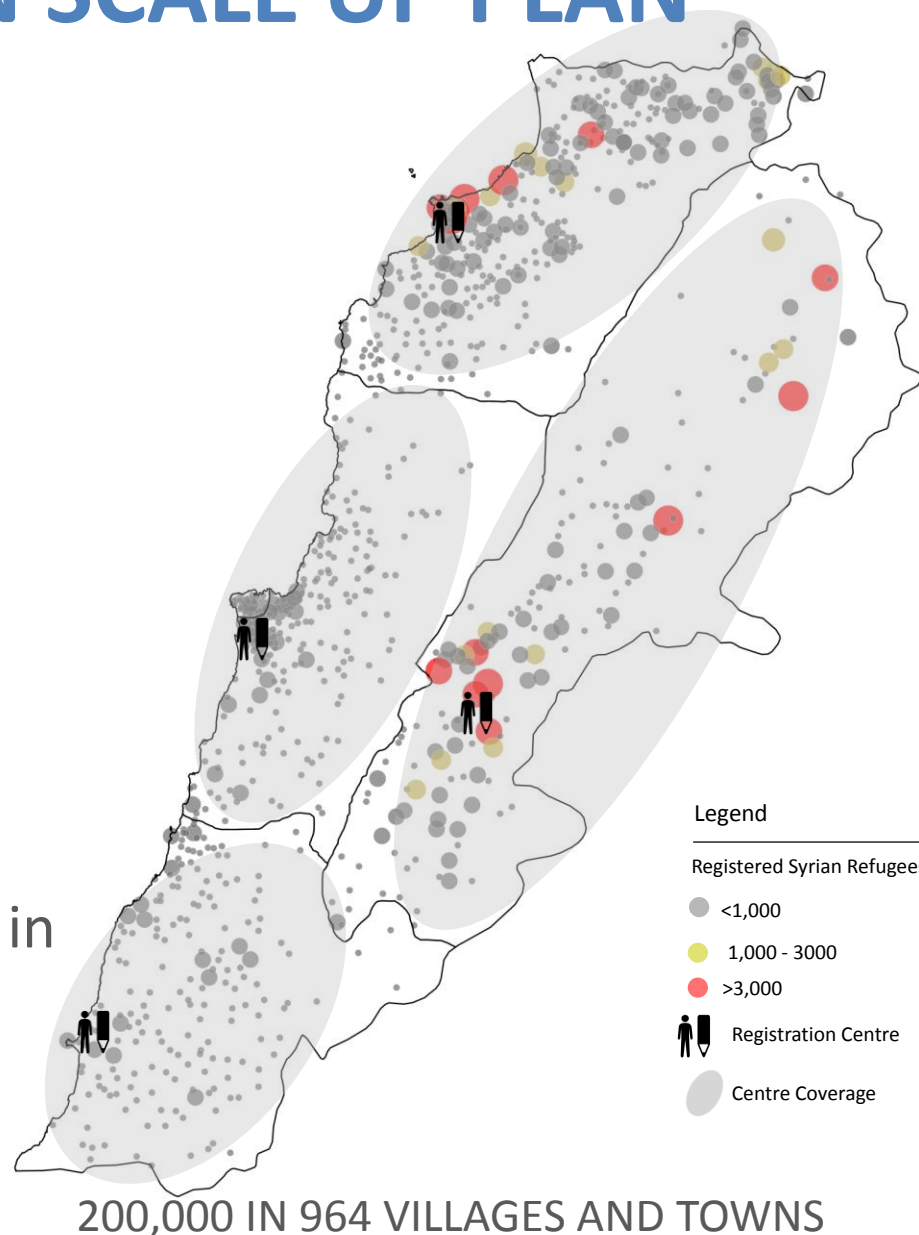
REGISTRATION PROCESSING MODEL





REGISTRATION SCALE UP PLAN

- the shift to a UNHCR standard rapid registration database
- the introduction of the use of bar code readers for refugee documentation;
- implementation of a multiple shifts system and
- expansion of the three centres in Zahle, Tyre, Beirut and Mount Lebanon.

- GoL authorization to establish transit sites is still pending
- Number of informal tented settlements continuous to grow
- UNHCR is reviewing the shelter strategy, to increase presence in the field and the involvement of the authorities.

WASH

- Oxfam rapid needs assessment report (WASH, EFSL and Shelter) was shared with partners.
- More than 30% households need support on improving access to toilet and about 35% households need support on improving water storage/access.
- Assessment framework workshop will be held on 6th March to discuss and agree on standard WASH assessment framework.
- Steps on getting approval for drilling of new wells have been worked out and presented in last WASH Sector Coordination meeting.
- WASH team collecting inputs for the contingency plan.



HEALTH

- UNHCR reviewing existing referral procedures for SHC, establishing an ECC , under light of very costly SHC and encouraging PHC through ongoing assessment of existing gaps in PHC
- Support for management of non communicable diseases (chronic diseases) remains a challenge
- Partners continue to monitor closely any outbreaks of communicable diseases through MOPH/WHO EWARN system (measles in particular)
- Enhanced immunization activity MOP/UNICEF/ WHO was a success and to be rolled out further
- UNICEF/ MOPH to enhance vaccination at registration centers.
- Attention needed to coverage in the South specially children with disabilities.



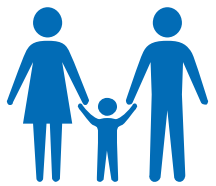
EDUCATION - UPDATES

- Joint Education Needs Assessment (JENA) training completed and assessment to start at the 6th March 2013
- MEHE, UNHCR and SCI attended a strategy workshop arranged by UNHCR in Senegal and will start the work on contextualizing it to the Lebanese context
- Formal second shifts opened in public school in Ersal and fully funded by the MEHE



PROTECTION - SGBV Task Force

- Priority remains the roll-out of the SOPs and the development of very localized mapping of services to improve referral pathway between service providers.
- Sub-national coordination mechanisms on SGBV are now established for the North (Tripoli /Qobayat) and in the Bekka and needs to be established for Beirut/Mount Lebanon and the South.
- Members of the Task Force developed a plan to engage with other sectors to prevent and better address SGBV. Focus so far has been on collective centres managers and registration staff (for Tripoli).

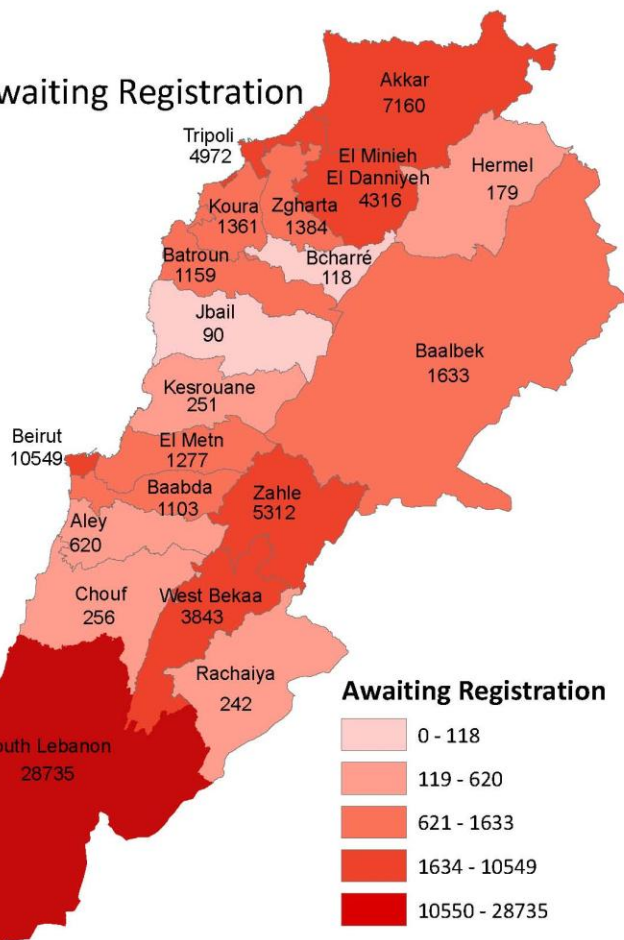


UNHCR Support to Host Communities

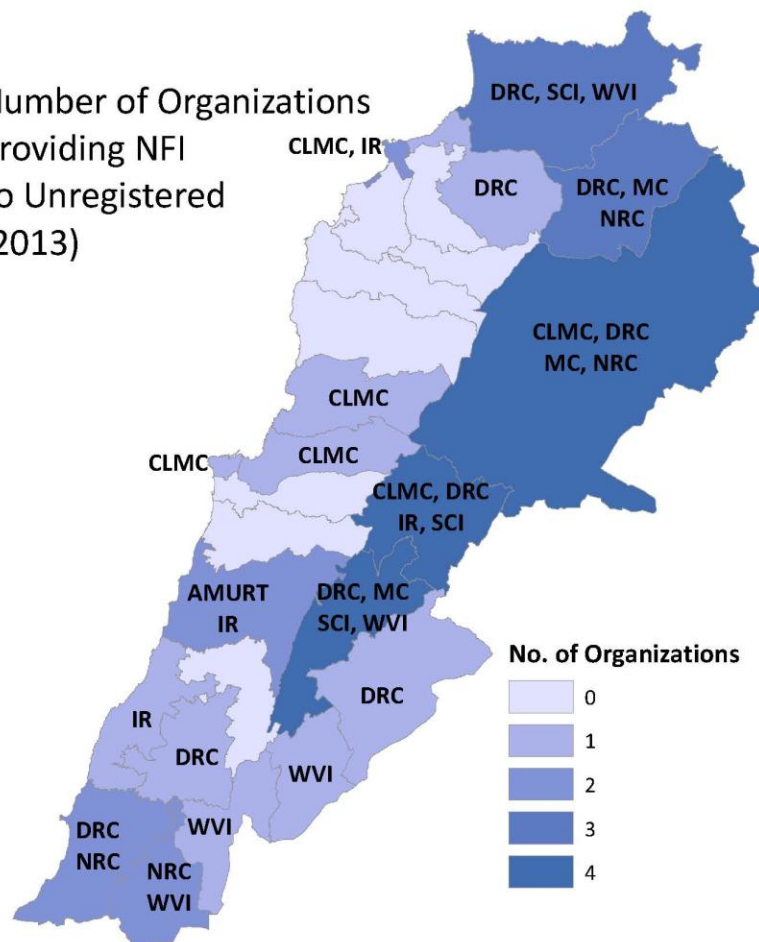
- Funding for the support to Lebanese communities through QIPS was received from the EU and Switzerland
- Negotiations with the EU and Italy for further funding for up to 2 M USD are ongoing.
- WASH and Shelter sectors also benefit Lebanese communities received funding from ECHO, Germany, Japan and Italy.
- In **2012**, a total of **19 QIPs** benefiting Lebanese host communities and Syrian refugees have been completed (North Lebanon and Bekaa).
- **Currently**, more than **17 QIPs** in North Lebanon and the Bekaa are being implemented.
- UNHCR and UNDP jointly established a Task Force on Support to Lebanese Communities Affected by the Syrian Crisis in 2012.

REVISED SYRIAN REFUGEES RESPONSE PLAN

For Lebanon, compiled a total of 23 project sheets with a prioritized requirement of \$125,100,031 over 5 sectors for Lebanon against an RRP funding gap of \$154,946,423.

Regionally, more than 75 project sheets were produced/compiled totaling \$510,110,715 USD against unmet needs of \$653,266,200.

HC will be presenting the final document to Valerie Amos on Friday and OCHA will transmit officially to the GCC donors.
