


## Age & Gender of Registered Syrian Refugees



## Highlights

- On 16 September 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 21 camps in 10 provinces was 200,023, including 651 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the 24 hrs of 15-16 Sep 2013, a total of 360 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 364 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- AFAD reported that since the beginning of the crisis, the total number of Syrians registered and accommodated in the camps exceeded 375,000. More than 175,000 of them have reportedly returned to Syria voluntarily. According to information released by AFAD, since the beginning of the crisis, more than 1,5 million medical interventions/services were provided to Syrians through the Field Hospitals in the camps of including about 273,000 referrals to hospitals and more than 27,000 surgeries. Reportedly 5,882 births in the camps were recorded.
- UNHCR Field Teams observed that the number of non-camp Syrians living in public parks and mosques is increasing. In some locations Syrians are living in makeshift tents with no sanitation facilities. During the field visits, UNHCR Field Team witnessed that in one park across the AFAD Provincial Directorate office in Kilis there are more than 1,000 Syrians living in challenging conditions. During talks with the Syrians, while some stated they are new-arrivals, some also said they have been living in Turkey for a while and came to Kilis with the expectation to be placed in a camp. UNHCR is following up with the local authorities to see how they plan to find a proper solution for the refugees
- In Hatay, Yayladagi camps the officials informed UNHCR Field Team that while registering the children in the two camps to the school in the camp, they also included the children of non-camp Syrians living in Yayladagi town. The camp officials also informed the UNHCR Team that last year they have provided a one time cash assistance to some 20 University students through SASF- Social Assistance and Solidarity Foundation of the sub-governorate to cover their basic needs and is planning to do the same for this year.
