NEEDS

Clinics and hospitals in the most affected Governorates require urgent support to continue to provide services to Syrians as well as affected Jordanian communities. The establishment of a new camp requires construction of new clinics, equipment, drugs and other medical supplies, hiring of staff and establishment of referral mechanisms.

There is a need to continue to strengthen primary health care in camp settings and in UNHCR supported clinics including harmonizing protocols and integration into the national system, rational drug use, integration of nutrition into primary health care and reproductive health services, strengthen management of chronic diseases, and building capacity to prevent and respond to diseases of outbreak potential.

OBJECTIVES (as per RRP5)

To ensure access of Syrians in most affected Governorates in Jordan to quality primary health, reproductive health, mental health and nutrition services and to life-saving secondary and tertiary care by end of 2013 while minimizing the negative effects on national health systems through strengthening the MoH's capacity and filling key health sector gaps.

ACTION/OUTPUTS

- 1 Emphnet conducted a five-day workshop on Outbreak Investigation and Response funded by WHO for 21 Public Health Officials of Ministry of Health
- 2 UNICEF supported Ministry of Health with 1,606,190 doses of Measles-Rubella vaccine for upcoming National Immunization Campaign
- 3 19 JHAS and Medair health staff trained on community-based management of acute malnutrition (CMAM)
- 4 Perinatal death audit introduced in Zaatri by MoH, UNHCR and UNFPA
- 5 89 medical and para-medical personnel from MoH and IFH trained in MISP of RH services

KEY SEPTEMBER DEVELOPMENTS


- Royal Health Awareness Society received funding through ERF to support MoH facilities to improve the management of Non Communicable Diseases in Al-Ramtha
- ICRC signed agreement with Ministry of Health to deploy a surgical team focusing on war wounded to Mafraq Government Hospital.
- Departure of Gynécologie Sans Frontières obstetric services from Zaatri
- Management for Moderate Acute Malnutrition started in Zaatri by SCF Jordan with micronutrient fortified porridge
- MSF downsized their inpatient activities in Zaatri camp down to 14 beds

ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE

-  **150,655** children (6 month to <15 years) received vaccinations against measles
-  **749** received life-saving and essential tertiary health care (370 in camps and 379 in urban areas)
-  **213** health workers trained on Quality of Care, MISP, clinical management of sexual violence and RH standards of care
-  **7.0** average number of medical consultations per refugee per year (Zaatri only)
-  **88%** of total deliveries in presence of skilled attendant (Zaatri only)
-  **600** service providers trained on various aspects of Mental Health and Psycho-social Support
