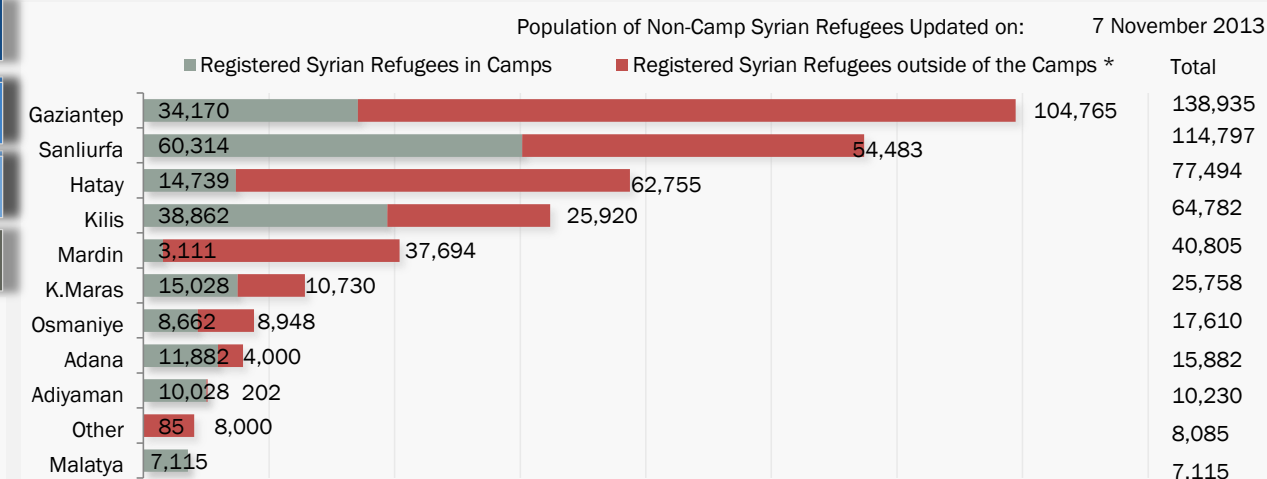
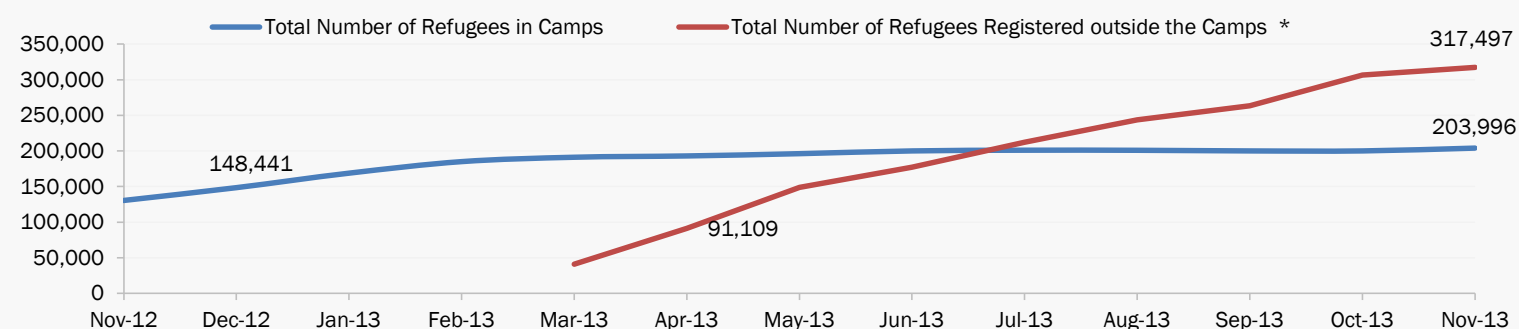


Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	521,493

Highlights

- On 19 November 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 21 camps in 10 provinces was 203,996 including 85 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the 24 hrs. of 18-19 Nov. 2013 a total of 562 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 249 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria. No new numbers received from AFAD on 20 Nov. 2013.
- In Mardin, the Social Assistance and Solidarity Foundation of the Governorate provided assistance in kind to the non-Camp Syrians living in Mardin province. Officials informed that they have provided food packages (98 TL each) to 350 families. In addition, they will also provide blankets (2 per family) and coal (1,000 tons) to up to 650 families as well as cash assistance to some families. Reportedly the SASF works with AFAD to identify vulnerable families and the assistance packages are provided by NGOs and individuals.
- Local officials of the Directorate of Education in Mardin informed UNHCR Field Team that land (8,000 m sq2) has been allocated to build a school for the children of non-camp Syrians. Officials of the Directorate of Education stated that the capacity of the planned school will be about 800 children, with 3 shifts to serve up to 2,400 children. Reportedly about 220 Syrian children with ikamets (Temporary Residence Permit) are attending Turkish schools, while about 400 children are attending schools as guests, as they have no official documents.
- A national rights-based NGO reported that they have conducted a survey among some 30 Syrian women living in Mardin province to assess and identify their immediate needs and to understand their protection concerns. Reportedly, the women's main concerns regard basic needs such as accommodation and food. Some bi-lingual women expressed their wish to work. Another national NGO also reported that they will be conducting a project for a 4 months period for 30 Syrians (15 men and 15 women) to learn Turkish and English, as well as orientation training on where to apply for legal counseling.
- In Mardin Midyat camp officials informed that they admit vulnerable families/individuals to the camp. The camp officials requested additional heaters for these families. UNHCR already provided 700 electrical heaters distributed to the beneficiaries in the camp.
