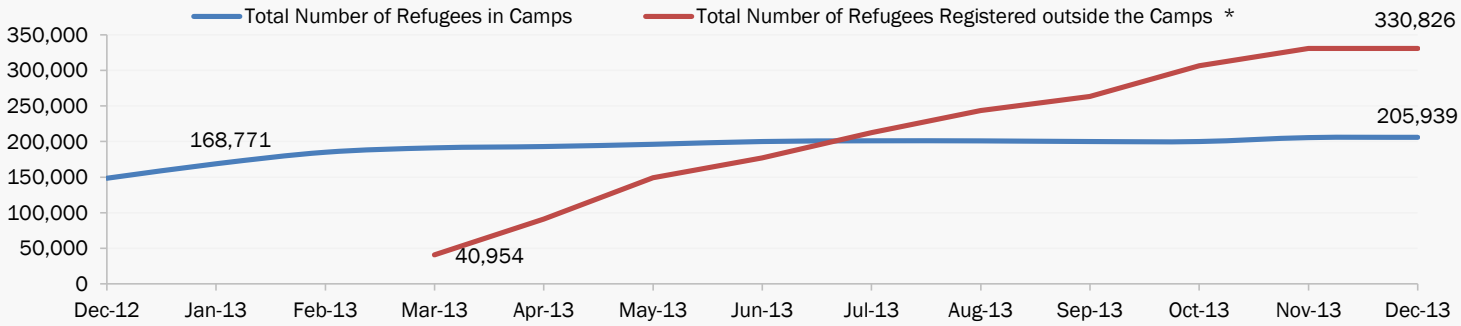

Highlights

- On 04 December 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 21 camps in 10 provinces was 205,939 including 158 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the 24hrs of (03-04 Dec. 2013) 586 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 484 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- In Akcakale Camp, IMC established a rehabilitation center in a tent next to the existing one run by the Syrian refugee volunteers. While the refugee volunteers are providing physiotherapy rehabilitation services to those wounded in the war, IMC will provide medical services three days a week to the disabled and the handicapped.
- The camp officials in Akcakale informed UNHCR that they will establish a women's committee and asked UNHCR for advice. UNHCR will provide SOPs, guidelines and further advice on roles and responsibilities of such committees and share the best practices in other camps with the management.
- In Hatay Yayladagi camp UNHCR team met with the Syrian Refugee Director of the school and the representatives of the Syrian Education Commission and was informed that out of the many students who took the graduation examination about 800 Syrian children will receive their diplomas under the Libyan curriculum, certified by the Libyan Ministry of Education. Reportedly of those who succeeded 115 are from the Yayladagi camps in Hatay. The representatives of the Education Commission informed that they have agreed to leave the decision to the principals of the schools whether to use the Libyan or the amended Syrian (recognized by the Education Commission) curriculum for the 12th grades this year.
- In Mardin Midyat town UNHCR visited a new school for non-camp Syrian children. Reportedly more than 400 children are registered in the school from the first to ninth grade. The school is financially supported by local and international NGOs. Reportedly another school is planned for the Kizilatepe urban area. Kizilatepe SASF (Social Assistance and Solidarity Foundation) provided clothes and shoes to some 650 children while there are 850 children registered in the school. The SASF will also provide transportation to children.
