NEEDS

- * Increased registration capacity, including the establishment of new registration centres and biometrics.
- * Establishment of decentralized shelter facilities for SGBV survivors, children at risk or vulnerable Syrians in need of shelter for other protection reasons.
- * Increased establishment of community centres/spaces benefitting host and refugee communities.
- * Increased information dissemination, awareness-raising & community outreach activities in urban areas & camps.

OBJECTIVES

The Inter-Agency Protection Strategy in Jordan is centred on (i) ensuring access to basic rights, including asylum and timely access to registration and documentation as a prerequisite for proper protection delivery; (ii) expanding community outreach and development of community-based protection mechanisms; (iii) mitigating and reducing the risks and consequences of SGBV; (iv) ensuring that emergency child protection interventions are strengthened and harmonized; (v) responding to the needs of Syrians and vulnerable host community populations through provision of social, psycho-social and economic support; and (vi) exploring third country resettlement options as a protection response to cases with special needs of vulnerabilities.

ACTION/OUTPUTS

- 1 Syrians are able to access the territory, to seek asylum and be protected from refoulement.
- 2 Syrian protection needs are addressed through targeted protection interventions (including Child Protection and SGBV), community mobilization and capacity building.
- 3 Respond to the needs of Syrians and vulnerable host community populations with an emphasis on women and children through provision of social, psychosocial and economic support.
- 4 Refugees, host communities and organizations involved in the refugee response are provided with adequate information and take part in awareness-raising activities.
- 5 Third country resettlement options are explored as a protection response to cases with special needs.

KEY DECEMBER DEVELOPMENTS

- As part of the roll-out of the Inter-Agency Emergency SOPs on Child Protection and GBV, in 2013, 307 GBV and child protection staff were trained on the SOPs, including 178 women and 129 men.
- On 29 December, the joint GoJ-UNHCR registration centre in Rabaa Al Sarhan became operational. From this date, original Syrian documents are now no longer collected by the authorities, but remain with the refugees. The GoJ also began issuing an enhanced service card to refugees passing through Rabaa Al Sarhan.
- Members of the Protection Sector organized a series of activities in camp and non-camp settings in connection with the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence campaign. The GBV SWG developed an event calendar including the activities of more than 20 organizations in collaboration with the UN communications team. Protection actors organized a large number of community-based events including art exhibitions, focus group discussions, puppet shows and sports events.
- On 10 December, IRC and UNFPA opened a 4th safe space in Zaatai where women, girls, boys and men can access comprehensive GBV and reproductive health services. .

ACHIEVEMENTS TO DATE



4,670 UAC/SC and children at risk received multi-sectoral services (2,438 girls and 2,232 boys)



2,944 SGBV survivors referred to or supported with multi-sectoral services (1,763 women, 804 girls, 180 men and 197 boys)



9,429 Government officials, civil society and humanitarian workers (4,706 women and 4,723 men) trained on refugee protection, child protection and SGBV



128,693 children (73,616 girls and 55,189 boys) and 45,546 adults (34,494 women and 11,052 men) benefitted from psychosocial support



86 child and youth friendly spaces and 24 women safe spaces operational



122,648 community members reached with awareness-raising activities



13,315 Syrian refugees received legal counselling and legal advice



7,893 individuals with specific needs received special support (2,961 women, 1,076 girls, 2,333 men and 1,523 boys)



18,458 Syrian refugees registered in Dec 2013 (9,294 women and 9,164 men). 6,120 asylum-seeker certificate renewals in Dec 2013.
