



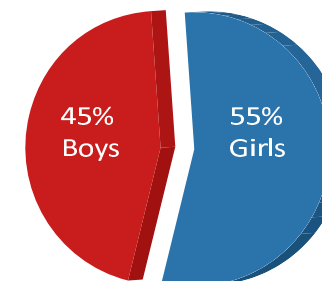

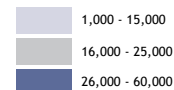
Gender

Gender equity was incorporated into planning and implementing activities under the WASH in schools program. Considering the need in Jordan to safeguard girls' continued access to education and reduce drop-out rates, WASH facility assessments and renovations have included girls' sanitation facilities specifically. WASH renovations in assessed schools to benefit 176,557 girls and 145,197 boys, of which 8,889 girls and 8,379 are Syrians.

% of Boys and Girls in 474 assessed schools (Jordanians & Syrians)

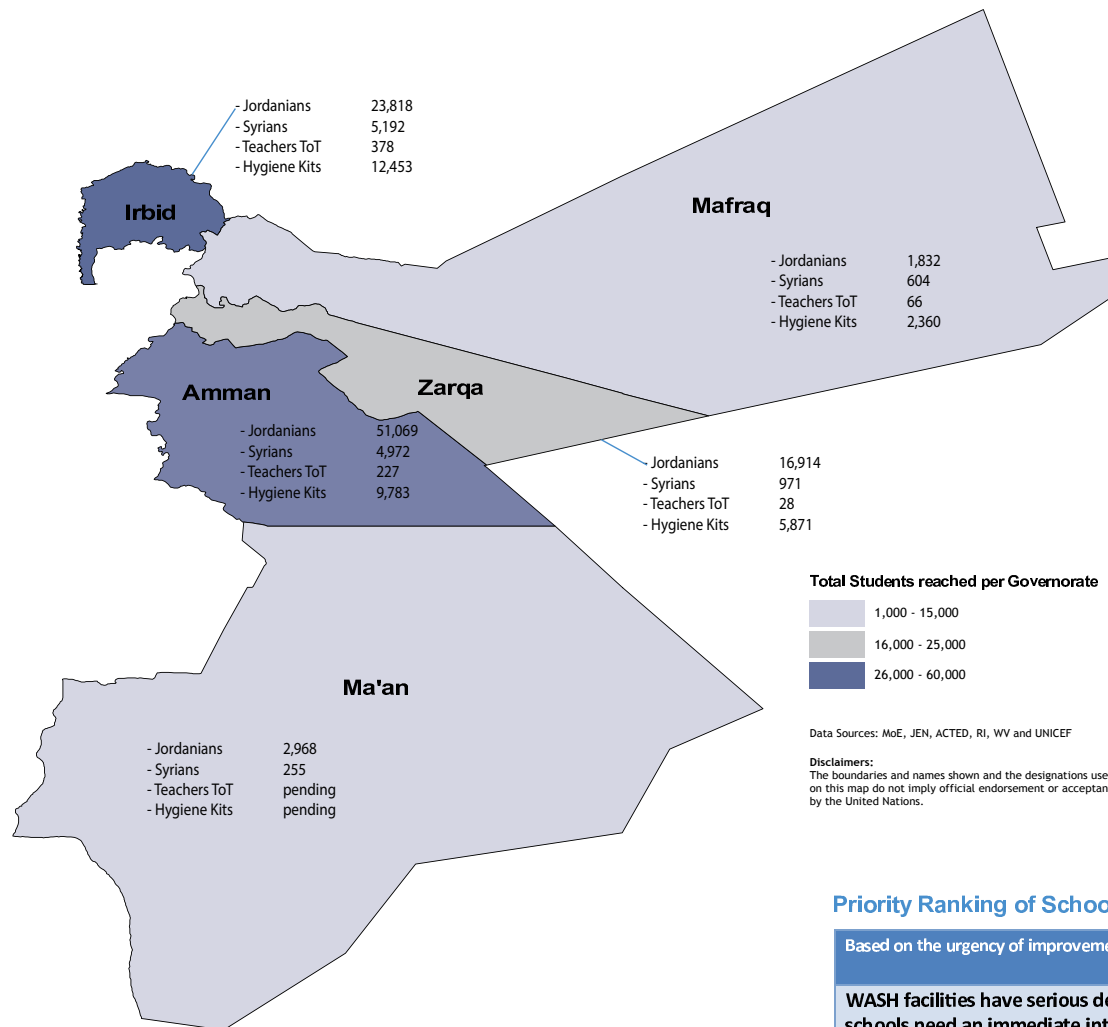


Total Students reached per Governorate



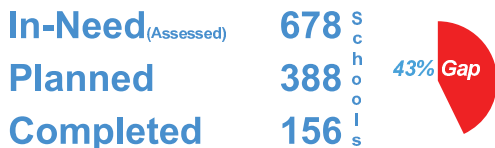

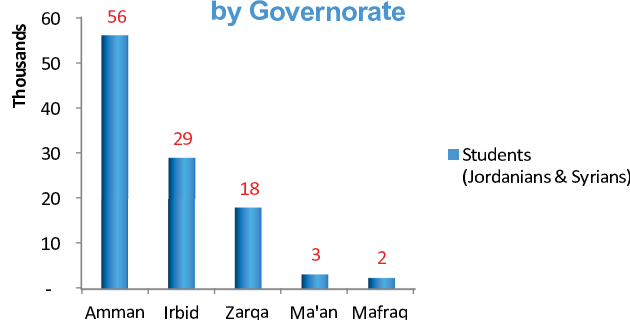
Prior to the Syrian refugee influx, many host communities already were struggling to accommodate increased student enrollment with existing school space.

The two levels of the WASH intervention strategy included the technical intervention and the soft component. The technical intervention included the renovation of existing WASH facilities to ensure access and functionality. The soft component consisted mainly of hygiene promotion activities.

In 2013, UNICEF supported the WASH renovations in some 150 schools. Based on the success of this programme, UNICEF & Partners in 2014 are considering a second phase of interventions to further assess schools in the remaining 7 governorates as well as increasing the capacity of existing WASH facilities at schools.

Priority Ranking of Schools

Based on the urgency of improvements, the schools were classified into 4 classes as below:	Priority Level
WASH facilities have serious defects that affect the safety of the user, these schools need an immediate intervention to rebuild the latrine facilities	1
WASH facilities have considerable defects affecting water, sanitation and hygiene environment of the school and need immediate intervention to rehabilitate or maintain the latrine facilities.	2
WASH facilities have defects requiring minor repairs and maintenance that can be handled by the school	3
WASH facilities are in acceptable condition with minimal need for improvement	4
