3.) Minutes

Item	Discussion
Update on Zaatari WW supply scheme	A topographic survey has been conducted in the cam with 0.3m control levels established. A smaller group will soon to meet to discuss funding availability, timelines and reevaluate risks since last assessment of the Zaatari underground aquifer in January 2013.
UNICEF intervention in the host community	Saeed (UNICEF) presented UNICEF interventions in the host communities. An Excel sheet was presented to the group which highlighted 10 projects being executed in partnership with ACTED under RRP6. 60% of these projects are sanitation focused. The priority areas of the projects are Mafraq, Irbid and Zaraqa due to density of the Syrian refugee population.
Information Management – Joint RRP-NRP mapping	Ghazi (UNICEF/MWI) was welcomed to the WASH WG. He has joined MWI to work on 3 main assignments. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Vulnerability mapping and corresponding water needs of Syrian refugees in Jordan 2) Assess the GIS mapping capacities of the MoWI 3) Develop a GIS database map of all WASH projects in Jordan To help his work the WASH WG needs to establish an understanding on the geographic boundaries and areas of refugee populations. WASH partners will need to ensure that projects are reported on the mapping system. The Activity Info database will also be used to help the project. Ghazi will present updates on the mapping at future WASH WG meetings.
Lessons learnt from RRP6	There is now a realisation that RRP6 targets will not be achieved by the end of the year. Financial tracking indicates that only around 23% of the WASH sector is funded and the mid-year review process indicates that agencies are struggling to with funds. WASH agencies need to discuss future guidelines and targets for the RRP and standardise briefings to donors before the process is launched again next year. This can be discussed during the meeting organised after Eid.
