



# FOOD SECURITY Sector Achievements

January to September 2014

## ACHIEVEMENTS

- 98% of registered Syrian refugee population in communities, and 100% of registered Syrian refugee population in camps, received food vouchers on a monthly basis.
- More than 100,000 Syrian and Jordanian families reached by other food assistance distributions (food parcels, food coupons and date parcels).
- 90% of Syrian refugee households in communities, and 94% of Syrian refugee households in camps, with an acceptable food consumption score.
- Every registered Syrian refugee household in communities has had the opportunity to attend an e-voucher distribution.

## NEEDS

- WFP/REACH Comprehensive Food Security Monitoring Exercise (CFSME) found that 74% of households cited the WFP voucher as their main source of income, underlining the heavy reliance of the refugee households on regular food assistance.
- According to the CFSME, households headed by widows are far more likely to be food insecure than any other demographic.
- Poor dietary diversity among children aged 6-23 months, with 75% not meeting the minimum standard. Without adequate nutritional support, children's mental and physical development risks compromise.

## CHALLENGES

- Continuing to refine multi-sectoral, gender-mainstreamed targeting and selection criteria to move from blanket assistance of registered refugees to targeted distributions with identification of, and outreach to, the most vulnerable populations in communities.
- Identifying and incorporating sustainable, mid-term solutions aimed at decreasing refugee dependency on direct humanitarian food assistance while concurrently supporting opportunities within vulnerable host communities.
- Mitigating the impact of prolonged displacement on the vulnerability of refugees who are adopting more severe coping strategies as well as the effect on vulnerable host communities of the competition between refugees and local populations for resources and services.
- Implementing programmes effectively and efficiently when resource mobilisation is becoming increasingly difficult given the protracted nature of the Syria crisis and diminishing global interest.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

There is a clear need for the continuation of food assistance due to the heavy reliance of the refugee community on food assistance combined with the high likelihood of increased food insecurity if this safety net was removed.

While noting that 85% of all registered refugees will struggle to meet their food needs if they do not receive monthly food assistance, given the likely funding restrictions agencies will work to improve the targeting of food assistance to those most at risk of food insecurity.

With the prevalence of micronutrient deficiencies and poor dietary diversity particularly in girls and boys, the sector will promote the nutritional support to the most vulnerable through raised awareness of good nutritional practices, including training, communication and sensitisation targeting women, girls, boys and men.








#### 2.1 food vouchers or other forms of food assistance in urban and rural areas
