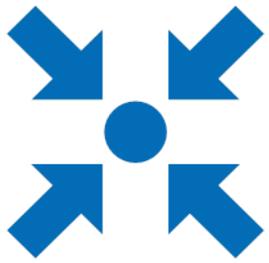


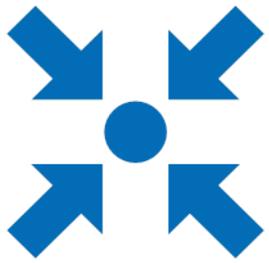



# December-Syrians

## ❑ Registration

- 13,400 individuals registered vs. 12,000 in November
- Slight increase mainly due to increased capacity of staff

## ❑ Renewal-Verification

- Close to 22,500 individuals verified.
- In 2014, approximately 470,000 individuals have been verified.

## ❑ Appointments Requested

- 19,500 appointments requested vs. 14,000 requests in November; an unexpected increase possibly due to the temporary lift in border restrictions for few days.

## ❑ Inactivations

- 4,800 individuals inactivated through the five verification methodologies.



# Registration Analysis 2013 vs. 2014

**Trend: 37% decrease in new registration per month**

# Registration Analysis 2014

**Pre Border Restrictions: January-July**

**48,000 individuals/month**

**Post Border Restrictions: August-December**

**21,200 individuals/month**

**Trend: 56% decrease in new registration per month due to border restrictions**



# Registration Analysis 2014

■ Syrians Registration by Month



- **Projected new registration: 52,500 individuals per month.**  
**Actual: 37,000 per month.**
  - **Major decline first noted in August.**
  - **30% less than projections.**
- **Projected new appointments: 63,000 appointments per month.**  
**Actual: 46,150 per month.**
  - **Major decline first noted in September.**
  - **28% less than projections.**
- **Projections for 2015: to consider last 3 months of 2014, i.e. approx. 15,000 per month**

To obtain information on refugee's actual access to education in Lebanon after the MEHE acceptance of Syrian children in school



**To obtain baseline information on shelter conditions of Syrians in Lebanon**



# Verification

- Core UNHCR activity for on-going registration.
- Information checked and updated to reflect significant changes affecting protection and assistance.
- Checks if individual is in fact, or continues to be, a person of concern in Lebanon.
  
- Leads to individuals remaining active or inactivated based on 5 methodologies:
  1. Refugee did not collect/redeem WFP E-card for 3 consecutive months.
  2. Refugee did not renew his/her registration certificate at the appointed time nor within 3 months thereafter.
  3. Refugee has left Lebanon as reported by nuclear family member.
  4. Refugee did not show up to the scheduled Renewal-Verification interview.
  5. Refugee re-settled/re-established in Syria and no longer requires protection in Lebanon.

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## ➤ Pre-storm preparations

- Coordination in all areas between agencies and partners on a response plan
- Winterization activities: Cash for winter – weatherproofing – NFIs – etc.

## ➤ Storm


- Wind: Damage to shelters
- Flooding and mud (informal settlements)
- Roads closed
- Temperatures low

## ➤ Immediate response

- Additional distribution of sealing off kits, plastic sheeting, weather-proofing kits, floor-raising kits, blankets, mattresses, stoves, winter clothes, etc.
- UNHCR stocks of shelter material and NFIs are made available for partners who request them (many agencies including LRC).
- Municipalities have been distributing the items that were on hand (bread in Shebaa and hot meals by DAF in Aarsal).

## ➤ Post-storm

- Assessment of damaged (shelters)
- Advising people in informal settlements on how to prepare drainage channels to reduce water



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# Host Community Tracking

Support to Lebanese Host Communities  
and Public Institutions under RRP6

- Overview of direct and indirect support provided to Lebanese individual, communities and public institutions as part of the RRP6.
- Showcase that a lot was done for Lebanon under RRP6.
- Second edition launched with the LCRP (first one with the RRP6 MTR).
- Facilitated by UNDP as sector lead for SC-LH / Focal point for Host Communities, with input from information managers, sector leads, and main UN Agencies.
- Agency-neutral document – to be used by all partners.

# Key findings


- Estimated USD 171.2 million direct to institutional and host community support or 19.6% of RRP6 mobilized funding (conservative estimate)
  - USD 77.9 million for support to public institutions.
  - USD 93.3 million for community support.
  - 33% of the LCRP or USD 726 million will target the stabilization priorities of Lebanon.
- UNDP study on the impact of humanitarian aid flows on the Lebanese economy (preliminary results):
  - 800 million worth of international assistance in 2014
  - 1.28 growth generated (multiplier value of 1.6).

# Overview – support to public institutions

- USD 27.9 million to assist the Ministry of Education and Higher Education.
- USD 27.7 million to the Ministry of Public Health to strengthen the public health system.
- USD 11.1 million to support the Ministry of Water and Energy through assistance to Water Establishments and Municipalities.
- USD 4.9 million to strengthen the capacity of the Ministry of Social Affairs.
- USD 1.8 million to the Presidency of the Council of Ministers.
- USD 1.5 million to support the most affected Lebanese by contributing to the new food component of the National Poverty Targeting Programme.
- USD 1.5 million to the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities and the General Directorate of General Security.

# WASH – key num

- 468,000 vulnerable Lebanese benefitting from increased access to solid waste disposal
- 525,000 Lebanese benefitting from improved access to safe and clean water
- 130,000 vulnerable Lebanese benefitting from improved access to waste water facility
- USD 112.2 million requested by the WASH Sector for stabilization activities in 2015.



# Health - Key num


- 180 Primary Health Care Centers provided medical supplies and equipment
- Polio campaigns maintained coverage above 95% helping Lebanon to remain polio free
- USD 6 million in pharmaceuticals and supplies procured
- USD 92 million requested by the Health Sector for stabilization activities in 2015

*Primary Health Care centres and hospitals rehabilitated and equipped in 2014.*



# Education - Key numbers


- 2,675 teachers and education staff trained
- 93 schools rehabilitated
- 29,961 Lebanese children accessed formal and non-formal learning programmes
- USD 67.5 million requested by the Education sector for stabilization activities in 2015.

Qaza*


# Municipal and Community Support and Livelihoods – Key numbers

- 244 municipal and community support projects implemented in 2014
- USD 20.2 million invested to meet priority needs of host communities.
- USD 284.3 million requested by the sector for stabilization activities in 2015.
- 145,000 Lebanese targeted for Livelihoods programmes in 2015.




# Protection, Child Protection and Sexual and Gender-Based Violence – Key numbers

- 66 Social Development Centres received support to provide social services to Lebanese and refugees.
- 6,000 Lebanese women and girls used SGBV services
- 25,500 Lebanese children participated in psychosocial activities
- USD 48 million requested by the Protection sector for stabilization activities in 2015.



# Food security – key numbers

- 1,300 jobs created in stores participating in food assistance
- National Poverty Targeting Programme reached 27,200 Lebanese beneficiaries
- 95 percent of all cattle in Lebanon vaccinated
- USD 62.4 million requested by the Food Security sector for stabilization activities in 2015.




# Shelter – key numbers

- USD 9.3 million invested in the rehabilitation of 11,000 private houses
- USD 32.5 million – estimated average rent paid by Syrians each month
- USD 32.2 million requested by the Shelter sector for stabilization activities in 2015

# Conclusion

The host community tracking:

- will be updated with final 2014 numbers
- shows that a lot has already been done
- provides credibility to the LCRP, which aims to strengthen the capacity of institutions and service delivery systems and to address the need of vulnerable Lebanese.
- Provides a basis to monitor stabilization activities and results under the LCRP.



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# Regulations for the entry of Syrians to Lebanon

- 1) Tourism** - Written hotel reservation and \$1,000 in cash. Entry Permit valid for the duration of the hotel reservation (can be renewed).
- 2) Work visit** - Given only to professionals, business or religious persons etc. Maximum 1 month.
- 3) Property owner** - Temporary residency permit for 6 months.
- 4) Students** - 7 days permit initially. Student entry permit issued after proof of registration at a university.

# Regulations for the entry of Syrians to Lebanon

- 5) **Travelling to another country** - Valid passport, visa to 3<sup>rd</sup> country and ticket. Entry Permit: by air 48 hours and by sea 24 hours
- 6) **Medical visits** - 72 hours entry permit (can be renewed once).
- 7) **Appointment with foreign embassy** - 48 hours entry permit.
- 8) **Visit with Lebanese national sponsorship** - 4 days and possibility to be renewed for a maximum of 6 months.






