



Daily Report

Arrivals and Departures



Following the EU-Turkey agreement, the number of arrivals through the Aegean Sea has dropped significantly. Greece received 3,462 people in April. Last year in April, 13,556 people arrived in Greece.

This year, 8,490 people arrived to the Italian shores in April. As compared to the same month in 2015 (16,063), the total number of arrivals to Italy has dropped by more than half. Those making their way through the Mediterranean continue to be primarily from Nigeria, Gambia, Somalia and other Sub-Saharan African nationalities.

Condition of People

Yesterday, according to the Italian Coast Guard, some 1,000 refugees and migrants were [rescued](#) off the coast of Italy, including refugee families and unaccompanied children. In one operation, some 500 people travelling in two fishing boats that had departed several days earlier from Egypt were rescued off Sicily, south east of Cape Passero. Apart from the two fishing boats that sailed from Egypt, it is believed that there were other smaller boats that came from Libya. Disembarkation of the 1,000 people rescued yesterday is taking place today at four different locations in southern Italy: Catania, Palermo, Augusta and Crotone, and will probably last the whole day. UNHCR staff will be present and will be giving information and assistance to the persons rescued.

UNHCR continues to advocate for legal pathways for refugees to reach Europe through resettlement and humanitarian admission programmes, family reunification, private sponsorship, humanitarian and refugee student or work visas, etc, as a way to help put an end to the smuggling of human beings.

Key Developments

A proposal was made in the German Parliament to determine the status of Morocco, Tunisia and Algeria as safe countries of origin. Federal Minister of the Interior, Thomas de Maizière, stated that there are “good reasons” for declaring these states as safe countries of origin. The government hopes that the proposal will lead to accelerated asylum procedures, faster returns for rejected asylum seekers originating from these countries and a “deterrent effect” for people from “safe counters” intending to come travel to Germany. A final decision will be made on the 10 June by the Bundesrat. Many federal states have not yet taken a final position.

On 12 May, the Steering Committee of the Facility for Refugees in Turkey (composed of representatives of EU Member States and Turkey, under the chairmanship of the European Commission) met to fast-track and agree on the practicalities of the disbursement of the first EUR 1 billion under the Facility. The Committee notably agreed on the main priorities for the allocation of funds, which will be humanitarian assistance, migration management, education, health, municipal infrastructure, and socio-economic support. In addition, through the so-called “Emergency Social Safety Net”, to be rolled out in the second half of 2016, direct financial assistance will be improved for as many as 1 million vulnerable refugees, and will be coupled with protective and humanitarian services. The Facility for Refugees in Turkey was created to answer the European Council’s call for significant additional funding to support refugees in Turkey. It is funded through EU budget and contributions of EU Member States, and represents so far a total of EUR 3 billion over 2016 and 2017. It aims at improving conditions for refugees in Turkey, notably by ensuring that the needs of refugees and host communities are addressed in a comprehensive and coordinated manner.

Response

As part of the commitment undertaken by UNHCR at the EU Leaders' Summit on 25 October 2015, with a view to supporting Greece to increase its reception capacity for asylum seekers, UNHCR launched in late 2015 a reception scheme aimed at the gradual creation of 20,000 reception places in Greece by the end of 2016 with support from the European Union, for relocation candidates to other EU Member States and some vulnerable asylum seekers in Greece.

Lagkadikia site, which is part of this scheme, is co-managed by the Alternate Ministry of Migration Policy and UNHCR. The NGO Danish Refugee Council (DRC) will be supporting in the site management starting from mid-May, as UNHCR's implementing partner. The first 64 people were transferred to the new site from Eidomeni and EKO gas station informal sites on 21 April as part of a joint effort of the Alternate Ministry for Migration Policy and UNHCR to provide dignified accommodation and adequate assistance to refugees located on the mainland. As of 13 May, the site hosts 843 people of which 94% from Syria, 6% from Iraq and, as a temporary shelter solution, 31 unaccompanied minors including 4 Afghans.

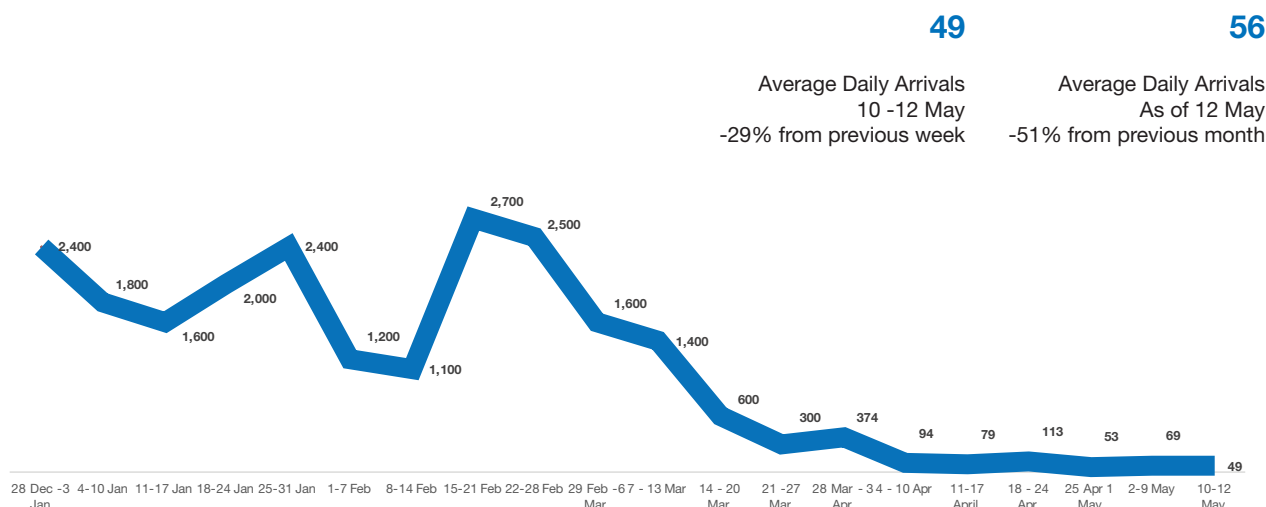
So far, UNHCR provided support through the deployment of camp management experts, site planners and field/protection staff, provision of transitional shelter solutions, basic relief items, and protection assistance, including information provisions on asylum procedures. All residents have expressed intention to seek asylum.

In Lagkadikia, medical services are provided through and will also be made available to the host community. Community mobilization has proven successful at a high rate as residents are organizing most aspects of the life. Volunteers from the Greek host community are also regularly visiting the site to undertake recreational activities with the refugees and offer donations.

The Mayor of Lagadas Municipality, Yannis Karagiannis, who is also the Vice President of the Union of the Greek Mayors (KEDE), visited on 9 May and noted the satisfactory living standards, the adequate healthcare and the good cooperation of UNHCR with local authorities. He specified that authorities will enhance garbage collection and staff presence.

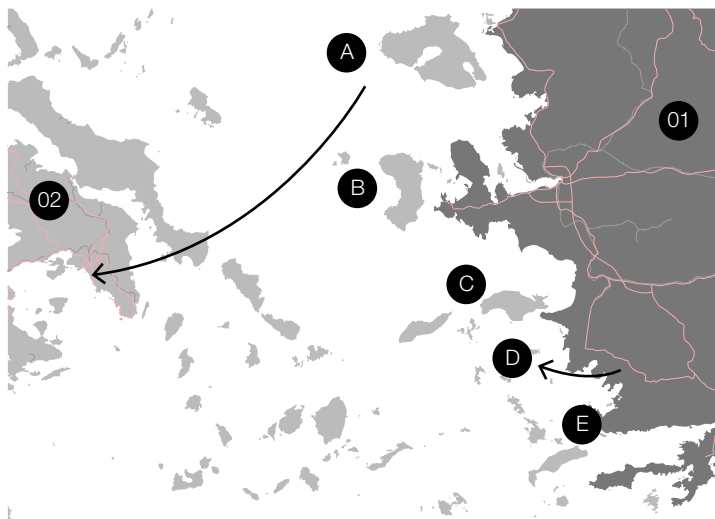

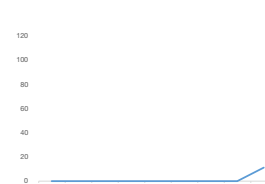

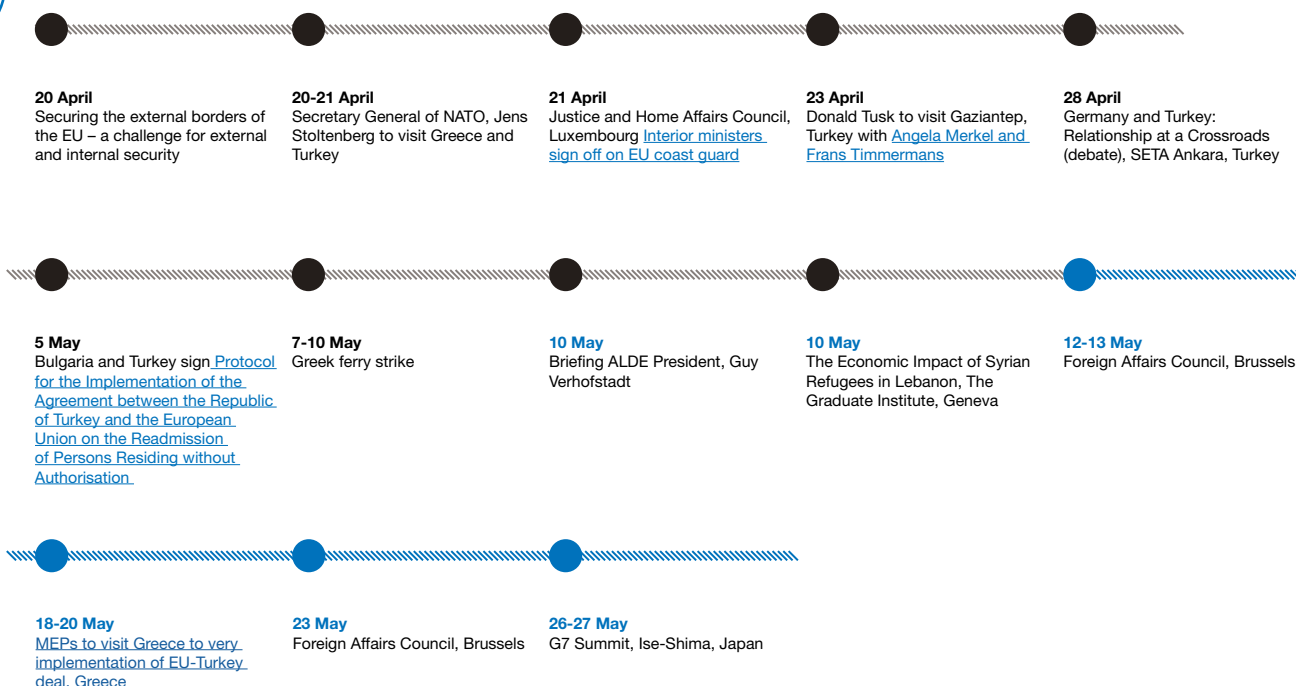

Media and Social Media

General Media:

The Italian coastguard (Guardia Costiera) reported on the assistance they provided to more than 800 refugees and migrants since Thursday 12 May. In a report by [Reuters](#), according to a statement given by a coastguard, the two boats which received assistance carried 515 and 286 people respectively, with the latter group having been assisted in collaboration with a Finnish naval vessel. Syrian refugees posed questions to UNHCR Chief Filippo Grandi, former UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan, and Elder and Conflict Mediator Lakhdar Brahimi concerning the stigma surrounding the reception of refugees and migrants into Europe.

[MSF Sea](#) have launched an appeal spearheaded by the hashtag #TakePeopleIn in reference to people applying for asylum in EU member states. In an [open letter](#) to European leaders, MSF International President Dr Joanne Liu reiterated MSF's 'profound concern' about the EU-Turkey Deal. She went on to add that the deal offers no safe method for refugees and migrants to apply for asylum within Europe and asked that European leaders "separate humanitarian aid from the political agreement" as the EU-Turkey deal could trigger the cessation of the term 'refugee' if it should be adopted and/replicated by many other nations.

Furthermore, the medical NGO is also concerned that there exists the possibility for an [EU-Libya](#) deal as more and more refugees and migrants opt to reach Europe through Italy via North Africa.

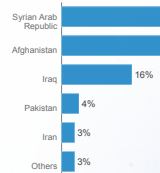

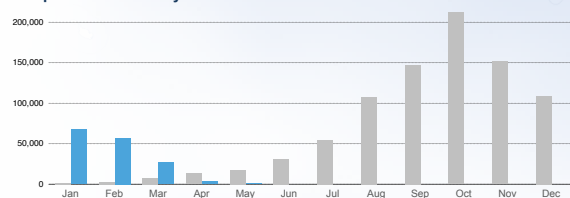

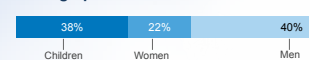

Demographics based on arrivals since 1 Jan 2016

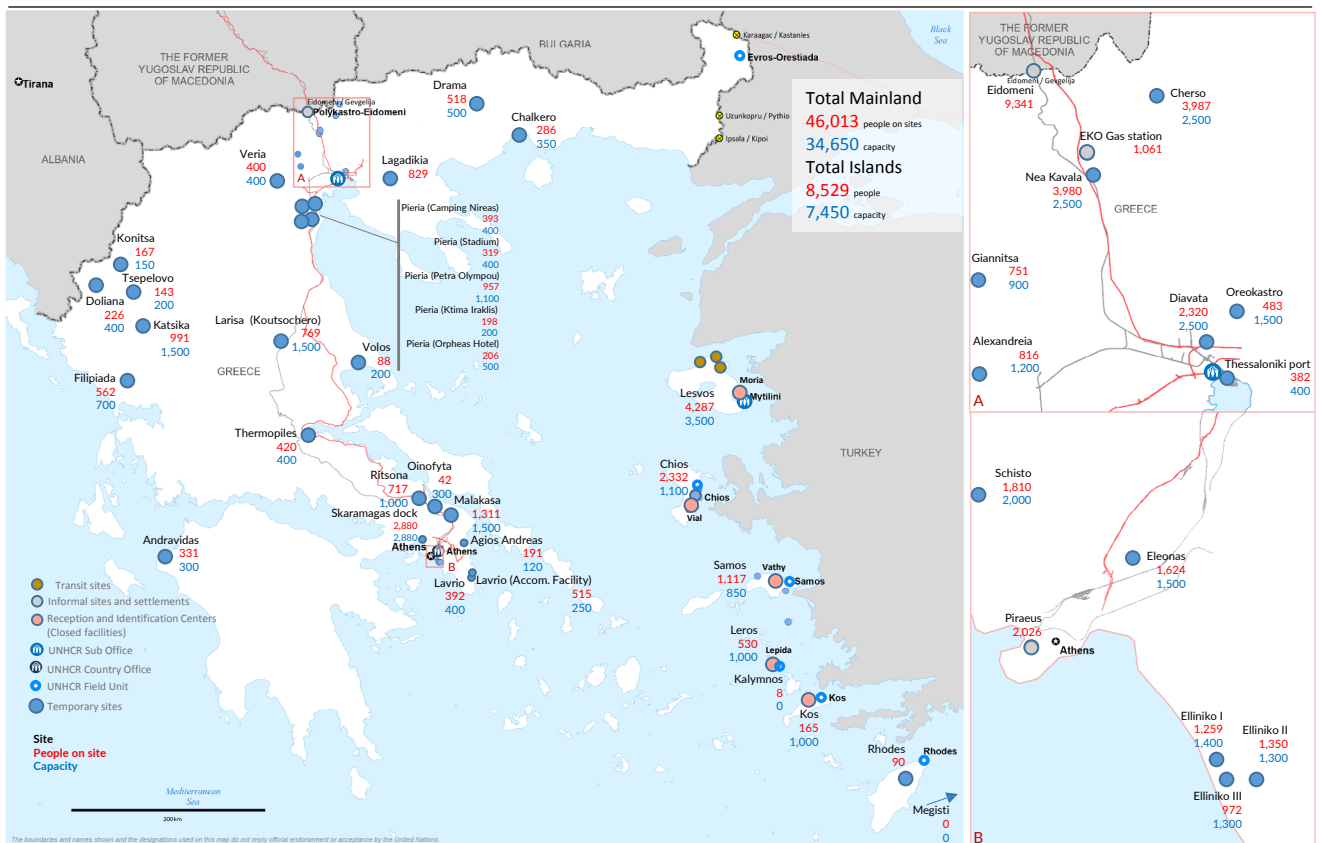
