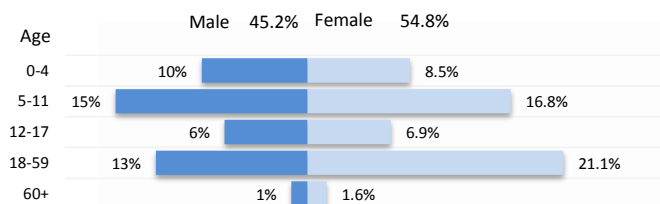
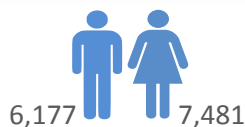
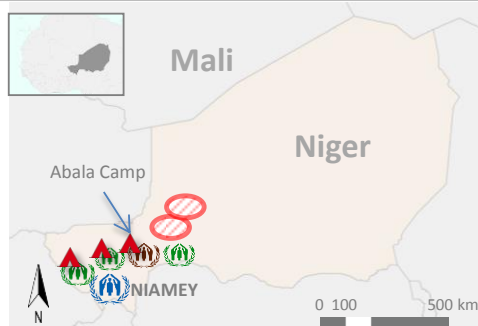

## Context

**History** In March 2012, Abala camp received refugees who were moved from spontaneous sites (Chinegodrar, Miel, Tigizefan, Kizamwe and others who settled in Abala town) situated at the Malian border. The camp has a capacity to host 10,000 people. In April 2013, UNHCR Niger launched the Gas project, to provide alternative domestic energy to refugee households.

Refugee women are under-represented in the community structures

Lack of birth certificates for newborns

A mobile court was introduced to issue birth certificates

Low enrolment rate of girls in school

Involvement of the of marabouts and communities leaders as key actors

Incidence of sexual violence

Prevention and response mechanisms with SOPs are established

Ethnic tension in camps

Co-existence and peace-building programmes are introduced

Conflict over resources with host communities

Host communities are included in the water and health assistance
