



ACHIEVEMENTS

Protection

- Mali situation: From 21st to 31st January 2017, the UNHCR office and the Niger authorities assisted the process of voluntary relocation of a total of 1,378 Malian refugees plus 43 asylum seekers from Tazalit to Intikane refugee hosting area in the region of Tahoua. A biometric verification process (BIMS Biometric Identity Management System) of all refugees in Intikane began in January and will be completed in February 2017. This process will be carried out in all of the Malian refugee camps.
- <u>Nigeria situation:</u> In January, training was provided to 48 partners regarding AGDM (Age, Gender, Diversity Mainstreaming) evaluations in 2017. 10 sites will be selected for the exercise, based on the presence of refugees, the mixture of populations at the site, the number of persons at the site, and sites with growing numbers of protection incidents. The aim in 2017 is to establish a referral mechanism at every site, provide training on case management, train FDS on the concept of SGBV, and establish a strong and effective coordination mechanism for the management of SGBV.

Urbanization

• Nigeria situation: In line with the vision to provide protection to the displaced population and facilitate their integration into the local community, the urbanization project has enabled the 7 target communes to respond to their needs in terms of increasing the value of land and in turn improving the local economy, whilst also providing sustainable access to durable shelter solutions to the vulnerable displaced and host population. In 2016, a total of 2,000 land parcels were developed through this project, 60% of which went to the local communes, and 40% to vulnerable beneficiaries in the communes of Diffa (400), Assaga/Gueskerou (500), Toumour (400) and Kabelawa (700). The Urbanization project will be exhibited in Geneva as part of 'Africa Shares' exhibition in March 2017.

Livelihoods

• In January, 60 youth Malian refugees were provided with livelihoods training in the areas of animal fattening techniques and breeding techniques. This is part of the overall UNHCR efforts to strengthen the resilience of the Malian refugee population and ensure their self-reliance.

WASH

• Nigeria situation: To respond to the need in terms of latrines and showers particularly with the newly arrived population, in 2017 in Kablewa, a major construction project to include showers and latrines will be carried out. This will be accompanied by major efforts in terms of community mobilization and engagement. In Sayam Forage, the action plan to cover the needsin terms of access to water is currently 85% completed and is expected to be finalized in the first trimester of 2017. This plan includes a new well / forage, and a 50m3 storage facility.

Access to Energy

• Nigeria situation: Throughout the Diffa region, 5 GPL gas provision centers have been established and are fully functional, as well as 27 individual gas selling points to facilitate the recharge and accessibility of gas for the population. In 2016, the gas project (SEED) has benefitted 20,000 households outside of the camps and over 3,050 households within the camps. Funding for distribution of gas bottles and accessories for an additional 5,000 households outside of the camps has been secured for 2017. Identification of vulnerable beneficiaries began in January 2017 and distributions will commence in the first trimester. The Gas distribution project will also be exhibited at the 'Africa Shares' exhibition in Geneva in March.
