



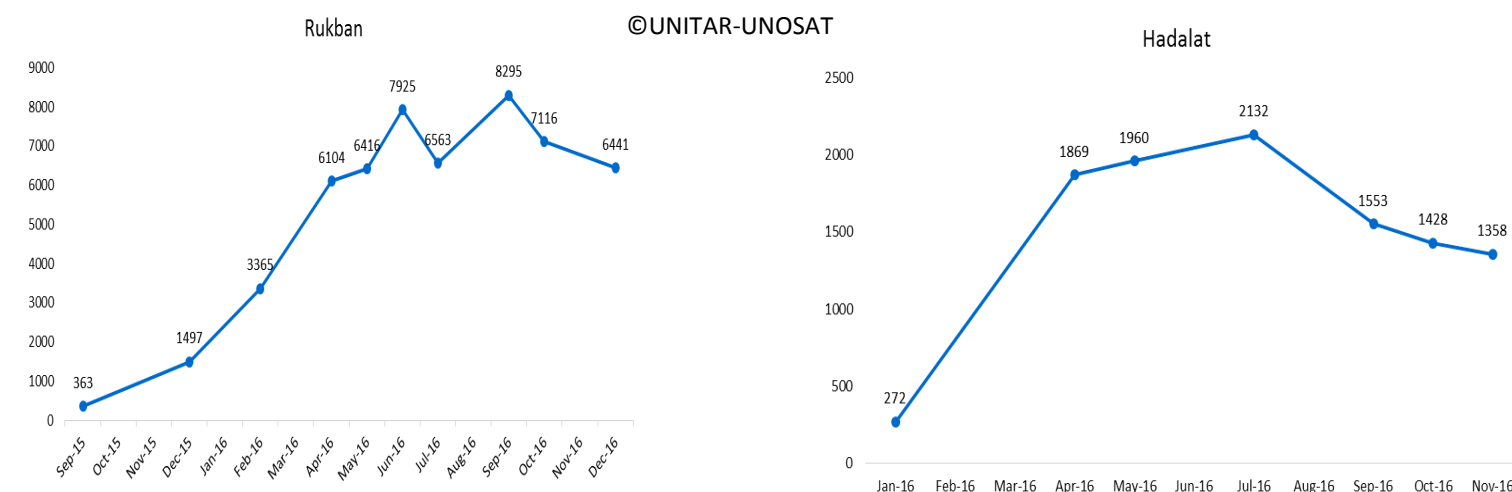

### Situation Overview

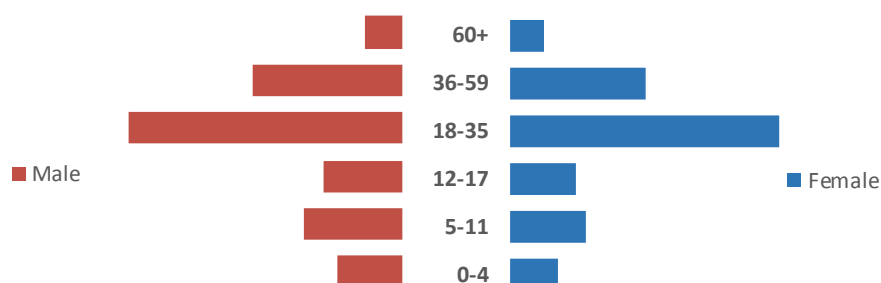
- The UN has now completed the first distribution cycle at the north-east border, assisting approximately 46,528 individuals, or 15,550 households, which commenced on 22 November 2016 and finished on 14 January 2017.
- The graphs below show the decrease in the number of shelters in recent months detected through UNITAR-UNOSAT satellite imagery at Rukban and Hadalat. The most recent imagery analysis from November and December 2016 shows a 9 and 5 per cent decrease at Rukban and Hadalat respectively.



### Demographics

# Operational developments

## Food and Non-Food Item distribution

- 46,528 individuals were provided with food, water, hygiene kits, sanitary pads, diapers, plastic sheets and blankets at both Hadalat and Rukban since the distribution resumed on 22 November.
- The second cycle is anticipated to start the week of 28 January. Items for the next distribution will include food, hygiene kits, children's clothing, baby kits, insulation kits, solar lamps, jerry cans, and sleeping mats.
- Significant challenges for the first distribution were noted in the areas of security, crowd control, community negotiations, access, weather conditions and a lack of qualitative post-distribution monitoring. Lessons learned exercises with all involved are in the process of being completed and suggested improvements will be factored into the next round of distributions.

## Health and Nutrition

- The opening of the clinic at the service area in Rukban took place on 15 December 2016. Partners involved in the clinic include UNHCR/JHAS, UNFPA/JHAS, UNICEF/ ESARSV along with ambulance support from RMS. To date 195 cases have been received and treated.
- Continued advocacy by UNHCR has led to an increase in the referral of cases (21) from Rukban and Hadalat to Ruwayshed Hospital, some including onward referral to other hospitals.
- UNICEF is screening pregnant and lactating women for malnutrition in the UNICEF clinic. Forty-nine children and ten pregnant or lactating women have been screened to date. One child with moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) and 12 with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) have been identified and are being treated. Sixteen mothers/ caretakers received counselling on best practices in infant and young child feeding (IYCF).

## Protection

- Efforts to facilitate birth certification are ongoing and UNHCR is working closely with the civil registry department who are making exceptional efforts to ensure babies have documentation. To date birth notifications have been provided to all babies born in the hospitals and in two cases birth certificates were provided as the mothers had all necessary documentation.
- Training materials for a 'do no harm/code of conduct' session for all health/protection staff from respective agencies have been designed and an initial training on same is being planned.
- UNHCR child protection leaflets have been distributed to all those coming to the clinic with key awareness messages; including messages on early marriage and ways to support child protection concerns.

## WASH






- UNICEF provides water to Rukban and Hadalat camps with 7.5 litres per person per day (l/p/d) provided at Rukban and 28.8 (l/p/d) in Hadalat in December respectively.
- The borehole in Rukban has been drilled to its final depth of 570 m with initial pumping tests showing a minimum yield of 50m<sup>3</sup>/h, similar to the main production boreholes in Zaatari.
- UNICEF will conduct additional pumping tests to determine its maximum yield capacity. Water quality testing is in process. Once completed, the borehole will be equipped with a treatment unit and connected through a 13 km pipeline to the water station at the service centre, and to water points in the berm.
- Construction of a new water network servicing Rukban is ongoing, with eight 95m<sup>3</sup> water storage tanks (T95s) installed and 4 km of trench for the pipeline to the Syrian berm completed. So far, 600 m of water pipeline has been installed.

- All borehole equipment, civil engineering and genset activities have been completed for the rehabilitation of the borehole in Hadalat. A Reverse Osmosis treatment unit is being assembled in Amman which will be installed in early February.
- UNICEF's partner ACF completed rehabilitation of WASH facilities in one school benefitting 500 students in Ruwayshed and has started rehabilitation at Ruwayshed Hospital.
- UNICEF trained volunteer facilitators and provided supplies to start informal education and psychosocial support activities at the Ruwayshed Transit Centre, which regularly involve 181 children. Additionally, a playground was installed for the use of the 232 children at the centre.

## Coordination

The operational border response is coordinated through the Inter-Agency Task Force (IATF), under the leadership of UNHCR, and supported by the UN and other humanitarian agencies. Operational agencies are coordinated through the inter-agency Border and Health groups.
