**Monthly Highlights**

- ❖ On 16<sup>th</sup> March, Camp Management Agency had discussed with Camp Management Committee and other respected person for Household Head Count Survey activities in Camp.
- ❖ On 24<sup>th</sup> March, CMC informed THE Camp Management Agency that most of the IDPs are worried that their household information collected during the proposed head count exercise will be shared to the government. As such, the CMA has postponed all data collection activities until May, pending review
- ❖ Government plans to collect the white cards from IDPs during the second week of April.
- ❖ SCI provided solar lighting for camp latrines.
- ❖ SCI and IRC organized International Women's Day activities on 9<sup>th</sup> March.
- ❖ WFP donor mission team observed the camp situation and SCI food distribution activities on 16<sup>th</sup> March

Negotiations continued but given discussions happening on the political level, the CMA has decided to postpone at least until next month for the head count data collection.</i></li> <li>• <b>Training activities</b> <i>On 23<sup>rd</sup> March, Camp Focal Point provided head count and personal special need training for CMC and other data collection field staffs.
