Camp Coordination and Camp Management	<ul style="list-style-type: none">LWF facilitated CMC meeting on 12th January. The meeting was participated by 30 (17 female) CMC members and representatives from social groups (Youth Development Group-YDG, Women Development Group-WDG and Children Development Group-CDG), Food Distribution Committee and Parent Teacher Association members (PTA).Inter-agency meeting was on 21st January and 32 (10 Female) representatives from CMC, Social Groups (WDG, YDG), ACF, CDN, SCI, LWF, women and youth group participated.3 (1female) new born babies born in the month.Government provided used/second hand 3 wheeler vehicles to CMC to serve camp population for school transportation and hospital/medical attention purposes. Similarly Department of Health provided MMK 150,000 for maintenance purpose.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Participation in CMC meeting by different interested social groups has been increased. Most of the group's representatives were asking for durable solution as well as livelihood support to the IDPs and host.Although, agency representation in the meeting is encouraging but information sharing system needs to be improved among agencies.
