- Through the PHC static clinics in both Urban and Camp settings and the secondary/tertiary life saving Referrals, JHAS has been able to support all vulnerable in need.

### I. JHAS/UNHCR Services

- JHAS under UNHCR is running 6 static clinics, that provide primary health services to the vulnerable of all nationalities (Syrians, Jordanians and others).
- The southern governorates are covered by JHAS/UNHCR medical mobile unit (MMU).








# JHAS/UNHCR primary healthcare services;

- NCD management
- Reproductive health services (In Amman clinic)
- Vaccination (EPI)
- Anemia screening program for pregnant and lactating women (PLWs)
- Nutrition program
- Health education
- Laboratory services (Main lab in Amman clinic and Zaatari Camp)



### **Urban Settings**;

• 5 static clinics in Amman, Ramtha, Zarqa, Mafraq and Irbid six days a week.



#### Camp Settings;

- 1 clinic in Zaatari Camp 24/7 (district 6)
- On-site laboratory diagnostic services for basic laboratory diagnostic tests for the JHAS/UNHCR clinic and other referred samples from the camp.
- Roving team; Consists of 7 vans, 5 ambulances.
  - The roving team secures transportation of patients referred from Zaatri camp to JHAS affiliated hospitals and back to camp after receiving needed treatment.

• Throughout 2016 in Urban Settings, JHAS primary medical consultations provided were 130,909 and RH services were 7,301.

• Within Zaatari JHAS/UNHCR clinic the total services were 242,218.







# JHAS/UNHCR secondary and tertiary healthcare services;

• The secondary and tertiary referral system depends on the vulnerability criteria of the patient.

 The Referral Hub in JHAS/HQ is responsible for classifying the cases either for the "Cash for health" project (in Urban Settings) or for secondary and tertiary referrals to JHAS affiliated hospitals; MoH, Military Hospital, University of Jordan Hospital and other private hospitals. • The secondary/tertiary referrals are all according to UNHCR/JHAS guidelines/referral SoPs and the patients' eligibility criteria, the referral Hub is available on call 24/7 for Urban, Zaatari and Azraq camp.

• The referral system benefits the vulnerable from all nationalities; Syrians, Iraqis, Somalis, Sudanese and Yemenis in addition to non insured Jordanians.



• Throughout 2016, the total number of referral cases from Urban and Camp settings were 23,383 case.



### JHAS/UNHCR MMU services

• The medical mobile unit team consists of one GP, Nurse, Pharmacist and a nutritionist, based in selected local Community Based Organizations (CBO's) known to the refugee population at a fixed weekly schedule.

• Provided services: basic primary healthcare, medication, therapeutic nutrition services and secondary referrals for advanced health services through JHAS affiliated Hospitals.

- Furthermore, the MMU team responds to both;
  - Hospital visits to vulnerable inpatients
  - Home visits to individual cases (patients in need of assistance but are unable to reach CBO's; SAM, MAM children and other bedridden PoC's)

• In addition to all supported health services within JHAS/UNHCR clinics, the clinics in Ramtha and Zarqa host UNHCR help desks to facilitate Syrian refugees' registration issues.

### II. JHAS UNFPA Services

• JHAS under UNFPA is running the Reproductive Health clinics in Zaatari in district 5 and 8, In addition to the RH services (gynecologist) in JHAS/UNHCR clinic in district 6.



• The RH clinics provide primary comprehensive RH services including; anemia screening for PLWs, TT vaccines, ANC, PNC, family planning, Infections (STIs management and counseling by the health education) and GBV (JHAS assigned a focal point to keep the cases confidential and provide the linkage with the protection unit).

• In addition to completing NVD in JHAS Zaatari clinic, obstetric emergencies and secondary referrals under JHAS/UNHCR referral Hub are conducted to JHAS affiliated hospitals.

# JHAS Nutrition program

- Primary services: JHAS/UNHCR is running Supplemental and Therapeutic feeding program under comprehensive CMAM program Outpatient Therapeutic Program (OTP/SAM patients in both Urban and Zaatari Camp) and Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP/MAM patients in Urban Settings).
- Targeting; children from 6-59 months and pregnant and lactating women (PLWs) by measuring the mid upper arm circumference MUAC.





• Secondary services: all SAM cases with complications are referred to JUH for treatment, and currently JHAS incoordination with the NWG is in the process of training Azraq hospital for future SAM cases referrals.

• The nutrition department is responsible for registering and following up with patients in need for milk formula in Urban Setting.

### During 2016 the total of new admissions were as follows;

- Under OTP program;
  - o 35 SAM Urban
  - 49 SAM Camp
- Under SFP program Urban setting;
  - o 128 MAM children under 5
  - 53 pregnant women
  - 42 lactating women.



### III. JHAS coordination

• JHAS is a participating in the Health coordination meeting, and the sub-group meetings (RH and nutrition meetings)

• JHAS nutritionists in both Mafraq and Irbid join IRC in their outreach program to assist and actively screen all; children under 5 and PLWs.

 JHAS in Zaatari is coordinating with both; IRD for facilitating home visits and SCJ for referring malnourished children to JHAS and malnourished PLWs to SCJ.
