





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1. DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL PROFILE

NB: Figures and values in the profile only represent the population surveyed in household survey, not the total Afghanistan population, unless stated otherwise.

Summary

Kas Aziz Khan Township is one of five Land Allocation Schemes (LAS) in the Eastern Region. Located 27 km to the west of Jalalabad City, the village is home to around 1,700 families (10,200 individuals) of which 665 families (3,990 individuals) returned from Pakistan in 2002.



Of the 678 households surveyed in Kas Aziz Khan, 335 (49%) were local community households, 284 (42%) were returnee households and 59 (9%) were IDP households. The households encompass a combined total of 6,328 individuals with a gender ratio of 1.1 males for every female.

The average household size was revealed by the survey to be 9.5 persons among returnees, 9.3 persons among the local community and 9.0 persons among IDPs. Children (0-17 years) represent 59% of the average household size across all three groups with a gender ratio of 1.1 boys for every girl.

The elderly (aged 60+) were found to constitute 6% of the IDP population, 4% of the local community population and 2% of the returnee population. Less than 2% of the population reported to be widowed with six times as many widows as widowers.

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2. MIGRATION PROFILE

Summary

Among the households surveyed, the year 1384 (2005/06) witnessed the largest number of returnee arrivals in HRA with 56 returnee households choosing to settle in Kas Aziz Khan. Also, the year 1384 (2005/06) witnessed the largest number of IDP arrivals with 10 IDP households choosing to settle in HRA. Since 1384 (2005/06), on average, approximately 24 returnee households per year have chosen to settle in the area. Since 1384 (2005/06), an average 5 IDP households per year have chosen to settle in Kas Aziz Khan.


Of returnee and IDP households that have settled in Afghanistan in the last two years, 97.4% of returnee and 80.0% of IDP households stated that they did so voluntarily. Of these, all of returnee and all of IDP households stated that they intend to remain in the area.

All returnee households had sought asylum in either Pakistan (99.3%) or Iran (0.4%) with 82.7% stating that they did so for safety reasons due to conflict. Over three-quarters also cited family reasons and three-fifths stated economic reasons. A further, 32.7% of returnee households stated that they sought asylum due to harassment/discrimination.


Among IDP households, 87.9% cited economic reasons and over two-thirds cited family reasons as the main reasons for having fled their districts of origin. Approximately two-quarter also cited safety reasons due to conflict reasons and over one-quarter stated access to services as having influenced their decision to move.

Four-fifths of households stated that legal difficulties and over two-quarter cited economic reasons were the main reasons of returning back to Afghanistan. Further, 49.5% stated family reasons as having influenced their decision to return. A further over one-quarter of households returned to Afghanistan because they say it is their place of origin.


2.1 Year households settled in current location






2.2 Percentage of HHs that settled in last 2 years and intend to remain



2.3 Countries of asylum from which HHs have returned



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



3. HOUSING STATUS PROFILE





Survey findings reveal that 77% of returnee households, 76% of local community households and 69% of IDP households currently occupy single family homes with the vast majority of remaining households across all three groups occupying part of a shared house. A further 3% of IDP households and 2% of returnee households were found to be living in temporary shelters or shacks. In the region of two-thirds of all dwellings were reported to be mud-brick or mud constructions with fired brick or stone being the main construction material of the vast majority of the remainder. Wood was reported to be the main construction material of the roofs of 95% of IDP dwellings, 90% of local community dwellings and 67% of returnee dwellings.

Two-room dwellings were revealed to be the most common dwelling type across the three groups with 42% of returnee households, 39% of IDP households and 33% of local community households occupying such dwellings. Single-room dwellings were the second most common dwelling type among local community households (22%) and returnee households (19%). Three-room dwellings were revealed to be the second most common dwelling type among IDP households (29%).

With regard to cooking facilities, 31% of local community households, 30% of returnee households and 24% of IDP households have a separate kitchen within the home. However, the majority of IDP households (69%), returnee households (66%) and local community households (65%) do their cooking in the open.



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4. WATER, ELECTRICITY, FUEL AND SANITATION

Summary

Water: Hand pump is the main source of water for 75.8% of local community households, 88.0% of returnee households and 72.9% of IDP households and it is located on average approximately 6 minutes away from local community and 7 minutes away from both returnee and IDP households. Open well also provides drinking water for 22.7% of local community households, 27.1% of returnee households and 23.7% of IDP households located on average 4 minutes away from both local community and returnee and 2 minutes away from IDP households. Small numbers of households have access to protected and unprotected springs also.

Electricity: Of the 678 households surveyed, a total of 527 (77.7%) reported to have had access to an electricity supply in the 30 days prior to being surveyed. Solar power was the most important source of electricity for over 90% of all three household types. Proportionally more returnee households (8.1%) have access to battery compared to local community households (1.1%) and IDP households (2.4%). A further 0.7% of local community households have access to government generator.






Fuel: During the winter months, bushes, twigs/branches and straw are more used by 55.9% of IDP households compared to 39.4% of returnee households and 40.4% of local community households. On the other hand, more returnee households (46.8%) have no heating in the house compared to local community households (32.6%) and IDP households (30.5%). A further 15.9% of local community households, 7.7% of returnee and 6.8% of IDP households use animal dung for heating. Furthermore, 7.8% of local community, 5.3% of returnee and 5.1% of IDP households use firewood for heating in the dwelling.

The main source of cooking fuel in past 30 days for local community (58.8%), returnee households (60.9%) and IDP households (76.3%) is bushes (ping), twigs/branches and straw. Proportionally, more local community households (22.1%) use animal dung for cooking compared to IDP households (6.8%) and returnee households (10.9%). A further, 11.5% of local community, 18.3% of returnee and 13.6% of IDP households use firewood. Gas is also used by 7.2% of local community, 9.9% of returnee and 3.4% of IDP households.

Sanitation: 74.3% of local community, 82.0% of returnee and 59.3% of IDP households have access to a traditional covered latrine. Proportionally, more IDP households (37.3%) use open field, bushes or sahrahi as their toilet compared to local community households (23.3%) and returnee households (16.2%). The other most important types of toilet are flush latrine and open pit.


Surveyors took note of whether any garbage or pools of stagnant water were observed in close proximity to the households they interviewed. 55.1% of local community households, 75.4% of returnee households and 45.8% of IDP households didn't have any garbage near their dwellings. A further, 36.2% of local community households, 21.1% of returnee households and 50.8% of IDP households had little garbage near their dwellings. Moreover, 8.7% of local community, 3.5% of returnee and 3.4% of IDP households had a lot of garbage near their dwellings. Also, over 93% of all three households didn't have any stagnant water near their dwellings. Approximately 7% of three household types had little stagnant water near their dwellings. A further, 3.9% of local community and 1.4% of returnee households had a lot of stagnant water near their dwellings.

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


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
4.6 Main source of cooking fuel in past 30 days




4.7 Main toilet facility used by HHs

4.9 Observable pools of stagnant water near dwelling by HH type



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
5. LABOUR & LIVELIHOODS

Summary


According to survey findings, 33.7% of IDPs, 33.0% of local community members and 26.4% of returnees are engaged in work for the family. Of those working for the family, 77.9% of returnees, 69.3% of IDPs and 65.7% of local community members are female. A further 16.2% of returnees, 13.1% of local community members and 11.1% of IDPs reported to be working for a salary, with males accounting for over 98.0% in each group. Industry represents the main employment sector for 66.1% of salaried IDPs, 58.0% of returnees and 53.0% of local community members. Proportionally more local community members (27.1%) are working in the service sector compared with returnee (26.0%) and IDP (16.9%) counterparts. Local community members (11.3%) were also more likely to be working in the government sector than both IDPs (6.8%) and returnees (6.5%). Only 1.4% of returnees and 1.0% of local community members reported to be working in agriculture.

Among those aged 12-17 years, 27 returnees, 17 local community members and five IDPs reported to be working. One returnee child aged 5-11 years was also reported to be in work.


5.1 Percentage of household members working




Summary

Income: Average household income in 1390 was USD 2,590 among local community households, USD 2,548 among returnee households and USD 2,291 among IDP households. Wage labour was the primary source of income for 48.2% of returnee households, 44.2% of local community households and 42.4% of IDP households. Proportionally more returnee households (29.2%) relied upon day labour than did IDP (18.6%) and local community (17.6%) households. Similarly, agriculture was a significant source of income for IDP households (25.4%) compared with local community (12.5%) and returnee (4.2%) households.







Average household debt was revealed to be USD 1,622 among returnee households, USD 1,572 among local community households and USD 1,425 among IDP households.

Expenditure: Average household expenditure in the month prior to being surveyed was USD 206 among returnee households, USD 200 among local community households and USD 170 among IDP households. Food supplies constituted the bulk (73.0%-78.0%) of monthly household expenditure for all three groups.

Assets: With regard to ownership of key household assets, 76.4% of returnee households, 71.2% of IDP households and 67.5% of local community households own a stove/gas balloon. A mobile telephone is owned by 92.2% of local community households, 91.9% of returnee households and 86.4% of IDP households. In the region of half of all households own a radio. Proportionally more IDP households (32.3%) own a bicycle than do returnee (28.9%) and local community (22.4%) households, and are also more likely to own a motorcycle. A car is owned by 11.0% of local community households, 6.3% of returnee households and 1.7% of IDP households.



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










Summary

Agriculture: Of surveyed households, 38.5% of local community households, 35.6% of IDP households and 18.3% of returnee households have access to agricultural land. In 1391, on average, 7.6 jeribs of land were cultivated by IDP households, 5.1 jeribs by local community households and 2.8 jeribs by returnee households with access to agricultural land. The main reason for not cultivating more land was a lack of water. Wheat was the most important crop for 96.1% of local community households, 95.2% of IDP households and 84.0% of returnee households. Of the 678 households surveyed, only six local community households and one IDP household have access to a garden plot.







Livestock: Some form of livestock is owned by 67.8% of IDP households, 64.2% of local community households and 37.0% of returnee households. Among households that do, cows are owned by 90.2% of local community households, 82.5% of IDP households and 66.7% of returnee households. In the region of half of all households own chickens. A larger proportion of local community households (54.0%) own cattle than do IDP (45.0%) and returnee households (31.4%). Local community households (18.6%) and returnee households (14.3%) were significantly more like to own oxen than IDP households (2.5%). Similarly, IDP (12.5%) and local community (12.1%) households were more likely to own sheep than returnee households (8.6%). Comparable proportions (14.0%-18.0%) in all three groups own goats.








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


Over 90% of all three household types stated that the Provincial Centre is too far to walk to. In the last three months, the main reasons for travelling to the Provincial Centre for all three household types were to visit a government office or to work. Moreover, over two-quarters (53.1%) of local community and over two-quarters (54.9%) of returnee households stated that the nearest police station is 15-60 minutes away while over two-quarters (54.2%) of IDP households stated that the nearest police station is less than 15 minutes away.

(71.3%) of local community households, 71.1% of returnee and 67.8% of IDP households stated that public health centre is 15-60 minutes away. For the vast majority in all three community groups, the nearest private health clinic is 15-60 minutes away and too far to walk. The nearest hospital is too far to walk for all household types.


Vast majority of all three household types stated their employment area is less than 15 minutes away. Over 80% of all three household types stated their access to transport is less than 15 minutes away.

The nearest primary, secondary and high schools for boys and girls among all three household types are located 15-60 minutes far.






8.1 Average time taken to walk one way to Province Centre










8.2 Average number of times a HH member has travelled to Province Centre in last three months






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9. EDUCATION PROFILE

Summary

Among those aged five years and over, 35.5% of the local community, 38.4% of returnees and 24.7% of IDPs reported to be literate. Of these, 51.2% of local community males, 54.2% of returnee males and 36.7% of IDP males reported to be literate. Similarly, 18.6% of local community females, 20.5% of returnee females and 11.3% of IDP females reported to be literate.

Among adults aged eighteen years and over, 91.2% of local community males, 90.0% of returnee males and 90.9% of IDP males did not achieve any school grade. Similarly, over 98% females across local community and returnee households and all females of returnee households had not achieved any school grade.

Among males aged 6 to 24 years, 52.8% of local community males, 49.6% of returnee males and 32.6% of IDPs males reported to be currently attending school. Among females aged 6 to 24 years, 24.6% of local community females, 23.8% of returnee females and 12.8% of IDP females reported to be currently attending school. The main reason for not attending school given by those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups was because family didn't allow them. Furthermore, 17.7% of local community members, 18.8% of returnee members and 22.5% of IDP members of those aged 6 to 24 years stated that they cannot attend school because they didn't like school or didn't learn enough. A further, 11.5% of those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups didn't attend school because child needed to work to help family.



9.3 Age distribution of literate household members






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
9.10.1 General reasons for not attending school




9.10.2 Specific reasons for not attending school




9.11 Age distribution of males who received education in another province




9.12 Age distribution of females who received education in another province

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

10. HEALTH PROFILE

Summary

34.9% of local community households, 33.8% of returnee and 32.2% of IDP households had between one and two household members admitted to a health facility as an inpatient over the course of the previous month. 65.7% of local community, 72.9% of returnee and 72.9% of IDP households also had at least one member receive care from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without having to stay overnight. The private health facility was visited most by all three household groups, followed by the Regional Hospital and comprehensive health centre. The most common reasons for seeking medical treatment by local community households were infectious problems (36.5%), respiratory problems (18.3%), digestive problems (18.0%) and pregnancy problems (4.3%). Similarly, for returnee households the most common reasons were infectious problems (35.5%), respiratory problems (19.5%), and treatment of digestive problems (11.0%). Among IDP households, the main reasons for seeking medical treatment were infectious diseases (34.4%), digestive problems (14.1%), and treatment of respiratory problems (12.5%).


Of the 1,372 females aged 13-49 years that were included in the survey, a total of 185 were reported to be married among local community households (n=102), returnee households (n=64) and IDP households (n=19). Based on this data, the average number of births stands at 4.7 for local community females, 5.3 for returnee females and 4.6 for IDP females. Correspondingly, the average number of infant/child deaths is 0.3 for local community females, 0.5 for returnee females and 0.2 for IDP females. Of the 172 females aged 13-49 years that have given birth, 70.3% of local community females, 90.5% of returnee and 66.7% of IDP females received antenatal care during their last pregnancy with an average of 4.09 antenatal care visits per mother, and 13.7% had the assistance of a midwife during delivery.

With regard to children under the age of five, 90.5% of local community children, 85.2% of returnee children and 84.0% of IDP children have been registered with the civil authorities. Over the course of the previous month, 94.7% of local community under-fives, 81.1% of returnee under-fives and 96.0% of IDP under-fives have received a Vitamin A capsule, and 11.1% of local community children, 21.3% of returnee children and 4.0% of IDP children have suffered from diarrhea. Furthermore, 1.6% of local community children, 11.5% of returnee children, and 4.0% of IDP children have a persistent cough.




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
10.1.3 Percentage of HHs with at least one member who sought treatment from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without staying overnight




10.1.4 Reasons for seeking treatment




10.2.1 Number of married women who completed survey




10.2.2 Age distribution of married women who completed survey









10.2.3 Percentage of overall number of married women aged 13-49 years who completed survey








Summary

Among local community households, 94.6% have experienced unusually high increases in food prices. Over two-fifths (46.0%) of local community households have been affected by severe winter conditions, two-quarters (48.7%) by reduced drinking water quantity, over one-quarter (28.4%) by death or serious illness of other household member and one-quarter 23.0% by reduced drinking water quality. 95.8% of local community households have responded by decreasing expenditures. A further, two-fifths (39.7%) of local community households received help from others in the community, 29.3% reduced quantity of diet, 29.0% reduced quality of diet and one-quarter (23.9%) took loans in order to cope with shocks faced.


Among returnee households, 89.4% have experienced unusually high increases in food prices. Over two-fifths (48.2%) of returnee households have been affected by severe winter conditions, two-fifths (41.2%) by reduced drinking water quantity, one-quarter (25.4%) by death or serious illness of other household member and one-fifths 21.8% by reduced drinking water quality. 90.5% of returnee households have responded by decreasing expenditures. A further, one-third (33.1%) of returnee households received help from others in the community, 32.0% reduced quantity of diet, over one-third (34.5%) reduced quality of diet and 35.2% took loans in order to cope with shocks faced.

Among IDP households, 83.1% have experienced unusually high increases in food prices. Two-quarters (50.8%) of IDP households have been affected by severe winter conditions, two-fifths (45.8%) by reduced drinking water quantity, one-quarter (23.7%) by death or serious illness of other household member and reduced drinking water quality. 84.7% of IDP households have responded by decreasing expenditures. A further, approximately one-third (30.5%) of IDP households received help from others in the community, over one-third (37.3%) reduced quantity of diet, over one-fifth (22.0%) reduced quality of diet and 28.8% took loans in order to cope with shocks faced.



11.1 General household shocks in 1390

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12. PROTECTION PROFILE

Summary

Of the 678 households surveyed, 78.8% had an adult male aged 18-59 years as head of household. The head of household of two local community households and three returnee households were a male aged 12-17 years. Moreover, two local community households, one returnee household and one IDP household have an adult female aged 18-59 years as head of household. A total of 138 households had an elderly (aged 60+) head of household of whom none were female. Six local community households, four returnee households and two IDP household were headed by a widow or widower.

Four local community males and 11 females, one returnee male and eight females and one IDP male and one female aged 13-17 years was reported to be married. Among married adults, a total of 66 local community females, 36 returnee and six IDP females reported to have been under-18 years of age at the time of marriage.


12.7% of local community, 4.7% of returnee households and 10.5% of IDP households contained more than one wife.

The survey found 227 people living with a disability of which 48.9% were male. The most common disabilities were reported to be either physical (32.6%) or communicable infections (11.5%) in nature. 57.9% of disabled local community, 67.3% of disabled returnees and 62.5% of disabled IDPs were adults aged 18-59 years. 15.9% of disabled people in local community households, 7.6% of disabled people in returnee households and 18.8% of disabled people in IDP households were aged 60 years and over.




12.1.1 Age distribution of male heads of household



12.1.2 Age distribution of female heads of household




12.1.3 Age distribution of widowed heads of household




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


12.2.4 Households with more than one wife

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13. Child Labour


Summary

Among households surveyed, a total of 50 children were reported to be working and include 17 children aged 12-17 years among local community households, 1 child aged 5-11 years and 27 children aged 12-17 years among returnee families, and 5 children aged 12-17 years among IDP families.

Child workers belonging to local community households were reported to be working on average of 8.3 hours per day with 47.1% of them were reported to be day labourers and 35.3% were self-employed. Child workers belonging to returnee households were reported to be working an average of 8.4 hours per day with 53.6% of returnee child workers reported to be day labourers and 21.4% were both salaried workers and self-employed. Child workers of IDP families work an average of 8.8 hours per day and 80.0% were reported to be day labourers and 20.0% were salaried workers.

Vast majority of children of local community and returnee households and all of IDP households were engaged in industry sector. The second most common sector for child workers among local community and returnee households is services sector.

13.2 Distribution of male child workers by age and sector





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
13.4 Average number of hours worked daily by male and female child workers




13.5 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers by economic sector



13.6 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 12-17 years by economic sector




13.7 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 5-11 years by economic sector





14. SAFETY AND SECURITY

Summary

The security situation in the district was described as “moderately secure” by 95.0% or more of households in all three groups.


With regard to safety, almost all households in all three groups either “rarely” or “sometimes” fear for their personal safety and security or that of their family, with proportionally more IDP (6.8%) households “never” fearing for their safety compared with returnee (1.8%) and local community (0.9%) households.

On the subject of policing in the district, 95.0% or more in all three groups are “moderately satisfied” with the police.


Of the 678 households surveyed in Kas Aziz Khan, six local community households and three returnee households had experienced some form of violence in the three months prior to being surveyed.
