





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**1. DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL PROFILE**

*NB: Figures and values in the profile only represent the population surveyed in household survey, not the total Afghanistan population, unless stated otherwise.*


**Summary**

The village of Baimoghly is located 32 km from Maimana City in Faryab Province. Around 400 families from this village sought refuge in Pakistan and Iran two decades ago due to conflict. A further 900 families were internally displaced and settled in the Badghis, Balkh, Herat and Kandahar Provinces.

Of the 511 households surveyed in Baymoghly, 288 (56%) were IDP households, 196 (38%) were local community households and 27 (5%) were returnee households. The households encompass a combined total of 3,446 individuals with a gender ratio of 1.1 males for every female.

The average household size was revealed by the survey to be 6.8 persons among the local community, 6.7 persons among IDPs and 6.3 persons among returnees. Children (0-17 years) represent approximately half the average household size across all three groups with a gender ratio of 1.2 boys for every girl.

The elderly (aged 60+) were found to constitute 5%-6% of the population in all three household types. Approximately 2.5% of the population reported to be widowed with seven times as many widows as widowers.




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**2. MIGRATION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Among the households surveyed, the year 1390 (2011/12) witnessed the largest number of returnee arrivals in HRA with 9 returnee households choosing to settle in Baymoghly. Also, the year 1390 (2011/12) witnessed the largest number of IDP arrivals with 62 IDP households choosing to settle in HRA. Prior to 1390 (2011/12), on average, approximately 2 returnee households per year have chosen to settle in the area. Prior to 1390 (2011/12), an average 19 IDP households per year have chosen to settle in Baymoghly.


Of returnee and IDP households that have settled in Afghanistan in the last two years, all of returnee and 99.3% of IDP households stated that they did so voluntarily. Of these, all of returnee and all of IDP households stated that they intend to remain in the area.

All returnee households had sought asylum in either Pakistan (40.7%) or Iran (59.3%) with 92.6% stating that they did so for safety due to conflict and family reasons. Over one-third also cited economic reasons and one-third cited escaping personal violence. A further, 29.6% of returnee households stated that they sought asylum due to harassment/discrimination reasons.


Among IDP households, approximately three-quarters cited safety reasons due to conflict and three-fifths family reasons as the main reasons for having fled their districts of origin. Over two-quarter also cited harassment/discrimination reasons and over two-fifths cited escaping personal violence as having influenced their decision to move. A further, one-third of households stated that they have fled their districts of origin for economic reasons.

Over four-fifths of households stated that legal difficulties reasons and over three-fifths cited place of origin were the main reasons of returning back to Afghanistan. Further, three-fifths stated economic reasons as having influenced their decision to return. A further two-fifths of households returned to Afghanistan because of harassment/discrimination reasons.


**2.1 Year households settled in current location**



**2.2 Percentage of HHs that settled in last 2 years and intend to remain**



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



**3. HOUSING STATUS PROFILE**

**Summary**





Survey findings reveal that 70% of local community households, 63% of returnee households and 62% of IDP households currently occupy single family homes. A further 24% of local community households, 22% of returnee households and 15% of IDP households were residing in either part of a shared house or in a shared apartment. Tents and temporary shelters/shacks were the main dwelling type for 23% of IDP households, 15% of returnee households and 6% of local community households. With the exception of tents and temporary shelters, all dwelling types were mud-brick or mud constructions with wooden roofs.

Two-room dwellings were revealed to be the most common dwelling type across all three groups, with 48% of returnee households and 45% of both local community and IDP households residing in such dwellings. Three-room dwellings were home to approximately one-third of local community households. Single-room dwellings were found to be the second most common dwelling type among both returnee households (33%) and IDP households (25%).

With regard to cooking facilities, 52% of IDP households, 48% of returnee households and 42% of local community households cook in the open. A further 48% of returnee households have a kitchen that takes up part of a room within the home compared with 14% of local community households and 11% of IDP households. Only 4% of returnee households were found to have a separate kitchen compared with 33% of local community households and 27% of IDP households.



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**4. WATER, ELECTRICITY, FUEL AND SANITATION**

**Summary**

**Water:** Hand pump is the main source of water for 96.9% of local community, all of returnee and 97.2% of IDP households. It is located on average 10 minutes away from both local community and returnee households and 14 minutes away from IDP households. A further, 3.1% of local community households and 2.8% of IDP households have access to open well which is located on average 3 minutes away from local community households and 20 minutes away from IDP households.

**Electricity:** Of the 511 households surveyed, a total of 404 (79.1%) reported to have had access to an electricity supply in the 30 days prior to being surveyed. Electric grid is the main source of electricity for 98.4% of local community households, all of returnee households and 96.9% of IDP households. Solar, government generators and community generator (engine) are also used on small amounts in local community and IDP households.






**Fuel:** During the winter months, animal dung is the most used heating source for 64.8% of local community households, 59.3% of returnee households and 62.5% of IDP households. A further, 11.2% of local community and 18.8% of IDP households use firewood for heating. Proportionally, more returnee households (37.0%) use bushes, twigs/branches and straw compared to local community households (20.9%) and IDP households (15.6%). A further 1.0% of local community, 3.7% of returnee and 1.7% of IDP households have no heating in the house during the winter.

Animal dung provides cooking fuel for 49.0% of local community, 51.9% of returnee and 53.8% of IDP households. Proportionally, local community households (14.8%) use less gas for cooking than returnee households (33.3%) and IDP households (29.9%). On the other hand, more local community households (22.4%) use Bushes, twigs/branches and straw for cooking than returnee households (11.1%) and IDP households (9.7%). Moreover, 13.3% of local community, 3.7% of returnee and 5.6% of IDP households use firewood.





**Sanitation:** 81.6% of local community, 92.6% of returnee households and 63.2% of IDP households use traditional covered latrine. A further 14.8% of local community households, 7.4% of returnee households and 30.2% of IDP use open pit for toilet. The remaining households use open field, bush or sahrahi or improved latrines.

Surveyors took note of whether any garbage or pools of stagnant water were observed in close proximity to the households they interviewed. 60.7% of local community households, 59.3% of returnee households and 68.1% of IDP households didn't have any garbage near their dwellings. A further, 39.3% of local community households, 37.0% of returnee households and 30.2% of IDP households had little garbage near their dwellings. Furthermore, less than 4% of all household types had a lot of garbage near their dwelling. Also, 92.3% of local community households and 88.9% returnee households and 93.8% of IDP households didn't have any stagnant water near their dwellings. In addition, 7.1% of local community households, 11.1% of returnee households and 6.3% of IDP households had little stagnant water near their dwellings. Furthermore, 0.5% of local community had a lot of stagnant water near their dwellings.

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
**5. LABOUR & LIVELIHOODS**


According to survey findings, 34.3% of returnees, 31.9% of local community members and 30.7% of IDPs are engaged in work for the family. Of those working for the family, 73.0% of IDPs, 68.1% of local community members and 67.2% of returnees are female. A further 22.9% of IDPs, 20.5% of local community members and 19.5% of returnees reported to be working for a salary, with males accounting for at least 93.5% in each group. Industry represents the main employment sector for 90.9% of returnees, 71.7% of local community members and 70.3% of IDPs. With regard to agriculture, IDPs (24.7%) were found to be significantly more likely to be working in this sector than local community members (17.6%) and returnees (0.0%). However, proportionally more returnees (3.0%) reported to be working in the government sector compared with local community (1.8%) and IDP (1.4%) counterparts.

Among those aged 12-17 years, 56 IDPs, 19 local community members and five returnees were reported to be in work. Two local community children and two IDP children aged 5-11 years were also reported to be working.


**5.1 Percentage of household members working**




**Summary**

**Income:** Average household income in 1390 was USD 2,074 among local community households, USD 2,008 among returnee households and USD 1,996 among IDP households. Wage labour was the primary source of income for 96.3% of returnee households, 69.8% of IDP households and 64.8% of local community households. Agriculture was also a significant source of income for local community (22.4%) and IDP (21.2%) households.







Average household debt was revealed to be USD 1,487 among returnee households, USD 1,445 among IDP households and USD 1,407 among returnee households.

**Expenditure:** Average household expenditure in the month prior to being surveyed was USD 226 among returnee households, USD 174 among local community households and USD 157 among IDP households. Food supplies constituted the largest single monthly expense (83.0%-90.0%) for all three groups.

**Assets:** With regard to ownership of key household assets, 92.6% of returnee households, 65.3% of local community households and 59.0% of IDP households own a stove/gas balloon. Over 95.0% of all households own a mobile telephone. IDP households were marginally more likely than local community households, and significantly more likely than returnee households, to own a radio and a motorcycle. Local community households were significantly more likely to own a television set than other household types.



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










**Summary**

**Agriculture:** Of surveyed households, 43.4% of local community households, 31.6% of IDP households and 14.8% of returnee households have access to agricultural land. In 1391, on average, 16.3 jeribs of land were cultivated by local community households, 13.6 jeribs by IDP households and 4.3 jeribs by returnee households with access to agricultural land. The main reason for not cultivating more land was a lack of water. Wheat was the most important crop for all returnee households, 85.7% of IDP households and 80.0% of local community households. A garden plot is accessible to 23.5% of local community households, 12.2% of IDP households and 3.7% of returnee households.







**Livestock:** Some form of livestock is owned by 51.0% of local community households, 47.2% of IDP households and 40.7% of returnee households. Among households that do, 86.0% of local community households, 81.8% of returnee households and 64.7% of IDP households own cows. Comparable proportions (72.0% approx.) of both returnee and IDP households own sheep compared with 58.0% of local community households. Proportionally more IDP households (67.6%) own donkeys than do local community (60.0%) and returnee (45.5%) households. IDP households were also significantly more likely to own goats and chickens. Comparable proportions (26.0% approx.) of local community and IDP households own cattle compared with 9.1% of returnee households.










All of three household types stated that the Provincial Centre is too far to walk to. In the last three months, the main reasons for travelling to the Provincial Centre for returnee and IDP households were to visit a government office or to work while for local community households, the main reasons for travelling to Provincial Centre were to visit a government office or to purchase goods or services. Moreover, all three household types stated that the nearest police station is 15-60 minutes away.

Over two-quarters of local community and IDP households stated that public health Centre is too far to walk, must use transport while 55.6% of returnee households stated that public health Centre is 15-60 minutes away. For the vast majority in all three community groups, the nearest private health clinic is 15-60 minutes away or too far to walk. The nearest hospital is too far to walk for all household types.


For two-fifths (40.8%) of local community households, three-fifths (59.3%) of returnee and over two-fifths (46.5%) of IDP households stated their employment area is less than 15 minutes away. Vast majority of all three household types stated their access to transport is 15-60 minutes away.

The nearest primary school for boys and girls among local community households is more than 1 hour away while it is 15-60 minutes away for returnee and IDP households. Furthermore, the nearest secondary school for boys and girls among all three households is 15-60 minutes away. Also the nearest high school for boys and girls among local community and IDP households is too far to walk while more than 1 hour away for returnee households.






**8.1 Average time taken to walk one way to Province Centre**










**8.2 Average number of times a HH member has travelled to Province Centre in last three months**






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**9. EDUCATION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Among those aged five years and over, 15.0% of the local community, 26.6% of returnees and 13.7% of IDPs reported to be literate. Of these, 18.9% of local community males, 24.0% of returnee males and 17.8% of IDP males reported to be literate. Similarly, 10.4% of local community females, 29.7% of returnee females and 9.2% of IDP females reported to be literate.

Among adults aged eighteen years and over, almost all males across all three groups did not achieve any school grade. Similarly, approximately all females across all three households had not achieved any school grade.

Among males aged 6 to 24 years, 27.6% of local community males, 29.8% of returnee males and 24.1% of IDPs males reported to be currently attending school. Among females aged 6 to 24 years, 18.5% of local community females, 43.2% of returnee females and 15.1% of IDP females reported to be currently attending school. The main reason for not attending school given by those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups was because family didn't allow them. Furthermore, 25.3% of local community members, 16.7% of returnee members and 19.2% of IDP members of those aged 6 to 24 years stated that there is no school or it is too far thus they cannot attend school. A further, 15.1% of those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups didn't attend school because of security concerns.



**9.3 Age distribution of literate household members**




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


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
### 9.10.1 General reasons for not attending school




### 9.10.2 Specific reasons for not attending school




### 9.11 Age distribution of males who received education in another province




### 9.12 Age distribution of females who received education in another province

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

**10. HEALTH PROFILE**

**Summary**

5.1% of local community households and 5.9% of IDP households had between one and two household members admitted to a health facility as an inpatient over the course of the previous month. 45.4% of local community, 33.3% of returnee and 52.8% of IDP households also had at least one member receive care from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without having to stay overnight. The private health facility was visited most by all three household groups, followed by the Regional Hospital and district hospital. The most common reasons for seeking medical treatment by local community households were respiratory problems (35.2%), digestive problems (16.7%), cardiovascular problems (11.1%) and psychological problems (10.2%). Similarly, for returnee households the most common reasons were respiratory diseases (66.7%), psychological problems (22.2%), and treatment of cardiovascular problems (11.1%). Among IDP households, the main reasons for seeking medical treatment were respiratory diseases (29.7%), digestive problems (18.2%), and treatment of other communicable problems (12.5%).


Of the 855 females aged 13-49 years that were included in the survey, a total of 131 were reported to be married among local community households (n=62), returnee households (n=6) and IDP households (n=63). Based on this data, the average number of births stands at 3.85 for local community females, 3.0 for returnee females and 4.49 for IDP females. Correspondingly, the average number of infant/child deaths is 0.74 for local community females, 0.33 for returnee females and 0.73 for IDP females. Of the 120 females aged 13-49 years that have given birth, 42.9% of local community females, 20.0% of returnee and 30.5% of IDP females received antenatal care during their last pregnancy with an average of 1.12 antenatal care visits per mother, and 3.9% had the assistance of a midwife during delivery.

With regard to children under the age of five, all of local community children, all of returnee children and 86.6% of IDP children have been registered with the civil authorities. Over the course of the previous month, all of local community under-fives, all of returnee under-fives and 85.4% of IDP under-fives have received a Vitamin A capsule, and 46.5% of local community, 33.3% of returnee children and 35.4% of IDP children have suffered from diarrhea. Furthermore, 25.6% of local community children, none of returnee and 15.9% of IDP children have a persistent cough.




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
**10.1.3 Percentage of HHs with at least one member who sought treatment from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without staying overnight**




**10.1.4 Reasons for seeking treatment**




**10.2.1 Number of married women who completed survey**




**10.2.2 Age distribution of married women who completed survey**









**10.2.3 Percentage of overall number of married women aged 13-49 years who completed survey**








**Summary**

Among local community households, 89.3% were affected by severe winter conditions, over three quarters by reduced drinking water quantity and quality, two-quarters (49.5%) by heavy rains preventing work and 29.6% by reduced agricultural water quality or quantity. 85.7% of local community households decreased expenditures, 55.6% received help from others in the community, two-quarters reduced quality of diet and worked on relief programmes, and one-third (33.2%) reduced quantity of diet in order to cope with shocks faced.


Among returnee households, 88.9% were affected by severe winter conditions, 70.4% by reduced drinking water quantity, 85.2% by reduced drinking water quality, two-quarters (48.1%) by heavy rains preventing work and 14.8% by reduced agricultural water quality or quantity. All of returnee households decreased expenditures, three-quarters (74.1%) received help from others in the community, over two-quarters reduced quality of diet, over three-fifths (63.0%) worked on relief programmes, and one-fifths (22.2%) reduced quantity of diet in order to cope with shocks faced.

Among IDP households, 83.0% were affected by severe winter conditions, four-fifths (80.6%) by reduced drinking water quantity, 77.1% by reduced drinking water quality, over two-quarters (54.2%) by heavy rains preventing work and 18.4% by reduced agricultural water quality or quantity. 90.3% of IDP households decreased expenditures, three-fifths (58.0%) received help from others in the community, over three-fifths reduced quality of diet, over two-quarters (51.0%) worked on relief programmes, and two-fifths (41.3%) reduced quantity of diet in order to cope with shocks faced.






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**11.3 General coping strategies employed in response to household shocks in 1390**

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**12. PROTECTION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Of the 511 households surveyed, 74.3% had an adult male aged 18-59 years as head of household. The head of household of one local community household, one returnee household and seven IDP households were a male aged 12-17 years. Moreover, one local community household and five IDP households have an adult female aged 18-59 years as head of household. A total of 123 households had an elderly (aged 60+) head of household of whom 2.4% were female. None of the households were headed by a widow or widower.

One local community male and five females, one returnee female and one IDP male and 12 IDP females aged 14-17 years was reported to be married. Among married adults, a total of 37 local community females, four returnee and 37 IDP females reported to have been under-18 years of age at the time of marriage.


One local community and returnee households and five IDP households contained more than one wife.

The survey found 52 people living with a disability of which 48.1% were male. The most common disabilities were reported to be either physical (61.5%) or mental disability (11.5%) in nature. 65.2% of disabled local community, 50% of disabled returnees and 59.3% of disabled IDPs were adults aged 18-59 years. 26.1% of disabled people in local community households and 22.2% of disabled people in IDP households were aged 60 years and over.




**12.1.1 Age distribution of male heads of household**



**12.1.2 Age distribution of female heads of household**



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13. Child Labour


**Summary**

Among households surveyed, a total of 84 children were reported to be working and include 2 children aged 5-11 years and 19 children aged 12-17 years among local community households, 5 children aged 12-17 years among returnee families, and 2 children aged 5-11 year and 56 children aged 12-17 years among IDP families.

Child workers belonging to local community households were reported to be working on average of 10.1 hours per day with 71.4% of them were reported to be self-employed and 28.6% were day labourers. Child workers belonging to returnee households were reported to be working an average of 9.2 hours per day with 51.8% of returnee child workers reported to be self-employed and 47.2% were day labourers. Child workers of IDP families work an average of 10.0 hours per day and 53.4% were reported to be self-employed and 46.5% were day labourers.

Among local community households, both industry and agriculture sectors are equal in providing job opportunity. But industry sector is the main sector in returnee and IDP households. Also agriculture sector is the second most common sector among returnee and IDP households.

13.2 Distribution of male child workers by age and sector





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
**13.4 Average number of hours worked daily by male and female child workers**




**13.5 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers by economic sector**



**13.6 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 12-17 years by economic sector**




**13.7 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 5-11 years by economic sector**

**14. SAFETY AND SECURITY**

**Summary**

The security situation in the district was described as “moderately secure” by 44.4% of returnee households, 38.9% of IDP households and 37.2% of local community households. In the region of one quarter in all household types perceive the district to be “not secure, not insecure.” For 35.5% of IDP households, 33.1% of local community households and 25.9% of returnee households, the district is either “moderately insecure” or “very insecure.”


With regard to safety, 46.5% of IDP households, 32.1% of local community households and 29.6% of returnee households “sometimes” fear for their personal safety and security or that of their family. A further 30.6% of local community households, 30.2% of IDP households and 25.9% of returnee households “rarely” do so. However, 37.0% of returnee households, 30.1% of local community households and 17.3% of IDP households reported either “often” or “mostly” fearing for their safety.

On the subject of policing in the district, 70.4% of returnee households, 52.1% of IDP households and 49.0% of local community households are “moderately satisfied” with the police. A further 26.5% of local community households, 22.2% of returnee households and 20.5% of IDP households reported to be “not satisfied, not dissatisfied” with the police. IDP households (20.8%) were marginally more likely to be “moderately dissatisfied” with the police than local community households (19.9%) and significantly more likely than returnee households (3.7%).


Of the 511 households surveyed in Baymoghly, three local community households had experienced some form of violence in the three months prior to being surveyed.
