Iraqis Refugees	 Total registered: 67,648 3,221 registered in 2018 (5% increase in 2018)
Yemeni Refugees	■ Total registered 14,300. 3,598 newly registered in 2018 (33.6% increase in 2018).
Sudanese Refugees	■ 6,019Sudanese registered, 2,219 registered in 2018 (significant increase of 58%)
Somali Refugees	■ 799 Somali, only 38 registered in 2018
Others	■ 1,882 registered, with 756 registered in 2018 (4% increase in 2018)
Syrian Refugees	 Total Registered: 671,650 Syrians (4.3% increase in total population in 2018) Approximately 28,000 newly registered in 2018 of which 1,799 arrived in 2018. Approximately 78,527 in Zaatari, 40,650 in Azraq and 6,926 in EJC.

Berm Updates	 Returns: 42,000 total returns regionally to Syria. IDP's 1.2 million based on OCHA figures. Resettlements: 29,000 in process regionally. The Multi Donor Account/new health policy: The agreement signed between the government of Jordan and Danish and US Donors, to which this account was created to show the solidarity with the Jordanian Government and the MDA reach 14 million USD. Also, it is for efforts to roll back the old health access policy. Positive indicators are seen within discussions. Population is going decreasing, with a total of 30,000-35,000. Situation is political now, clearance to leave area to return to original areas in Syria is underway. No indication of when berm will be diminished. Although, humanitarian partners have planned assistances throughout the first quarter of 2019. There will be discussions after this period. Health is one of the top assistances at the berm, with an average of 200 Syrians accessing the clinics on a daily basis from the other side of the berm receiving primary health care services and medical evacuation services. Since the opening of the clinic in 2016, more than 73,000 individuals accessed the clinic. More than 1,600 individuals have been evacuated to access secondary or tertiary interventions. UN team in Syria is planning 2nd convoy to Rukban, they should be there on the 5th of February if all goes as planned. Over 250

4. Health Sector Achiev	ements and Plans/ PPP by UNHCR
	Purpose: recognize team achievements based on all projects planned and implemented in 2018 from tracking all progresses and realizing gaps for 30 actors with 24 reporting to AcivityInfo.
	 Key achievements on the policy level: Maintained very acceptable level of funding for emergency needs of refugees. More than 70% of funds have been granted. Exceptional access to JHF (7 emergency projects > 2.5M USD) through negotiations with donors to access this funding.

- Raise advocacy level to roll back the old access policy (Brussel conference 2 + MDA).
- Effective coordination mechanisms in place as well as presentation among sectors (inter-sector, sector, sub-sector and donor).

Key achievements with the resilience component:

- Capacity building of human resources at MoH.
- Integrated services within MOH structure (e.g. mental health intervention).
- Provision of essential drugs, vaccines, reproductive health and family planning commodities and critical equipment at MoH hospitals and health centers have been ongoing.

Key Achievements with the Refugee Response:

- Absorb shock from change of policy
- Responding to the immediate health needs of new arrivals and berm population.
- Maintain essential package of health services for camps refugees
- Quality sexual reproductive health services maintained.
- Community health interventions including IYCF maintained.
- Mental health services provided through PHC clinics and community mental health workers.

- JRP/3RP produced and submitted timely

5. Knowledge transfer / ACF

Introduction:

• Action Against Hunger (ACF) is working on the empowerment of Syrian Crisis-Affected and Iraqi internally displaced populations and institutions of neighboring governments through mental health physio social support programs. FCA's objective is to contribute to the strengthening of public services and social resilience for refugees and host communities in Syrian crisis-affected areas of Jordan. FCA is implementing this program in Irbid.

Focus on Health & Nutrition:

- Training introduction on mhGAP, Thinking Healthy and PM+ at Ministry of Health (NCMH) level
- Capacity building trainings:

	 Training in PHCs: mhGAP, Thinking Healthy. Training of health workers to reinforce their skills in providing psychosocial care
	(medical and paramedical). After the training in PHCs, MHPSS will do: on job training supervision, clinical supervising and
	monitoring.
	 Training and support for CBOs: awareness, promotion campaign, and PM+
Achievements:	
	 September 2018: 21 PHCs alongside seven CBOs were reached by Action Against Hunger's MHPSS team. November 2018: National training and workshop that included a variety of topics; World Mental Health Day, depression and suicide presented by an MoH Representative and an introduction to mental health models and methods of intervention. In November-December 2018, and at the beginning of January 2019, Action Against Hunger's MHPSS team conducted health worker trainings (mhGAP IG version 2.0) to health staff (general practitioners, nurses, midwives) from Bani Kinanah and Taybeh Primary Health Centers (PHCs). Action Against Hunger received two translated modules of mhGAP 2.0 from IMC, and Action Against Hunger's MHCP staff translated the remaining modules. The translated slides were used during the training.

6. Health agencies update	
Medair:	
	 Extra fund from German AA donor (Syrians) 1 million for 2019 to use for Cash for Health and Community Health. OCHA expanded funds for 2019 for an amount of 350,000.
IMC:	
	 Regarding the Comprehensive Emergency Obstetric New Born Center in Irbid in the Specialty Hospital, who have been working along MSF France, will be moving out from neonatal component. Ongoing discussions to secure funds and incorporate this activity into the existing IMC facility. This will be determined by end of February. NCD program is duplicated in Za'atari Camp; this led to suboptimal treatment to patients. Discussions need to be taken to ensure information is shared early on between partners to prevent beneficiaries from being treated twice which cause internal ruptures in some cases.

	 Comprehensive clinic in Za'atari Camp that IMC is managing under UNHCR, after discussions, an agreement has bee made to open a level 3 ER close to Moroccan Hospital.
	 WHO: Requirement from INGO's and NGO's to have a letter of approval from a donor is no longer required by MOPIC. Almost all approvals have been obtained related to the Step Survey with tentative data collection dates.
	 JPS has ongoing project activities in support of secondary and tertiary referrals from Syrian refugee camps and the borders for provision of EOC with access to NNC and child care, lifesaving and medical care for the critically ill. JPS received 65 cases in January, including 53 cases from the berm and 8 of their companions provided with medical support (4 NNC, 12 CS, 5 EOC, 4 Ortho, 1 Maxillofacial, 8 Opth, 4 Neuro, 1 Card, 10 Gen Surgery, 6 DC), and 1 pediatric cardiac case from Za'atari. JPS project in support of secondary referrals from Syrian refugee camps has come to an end in January supporting 257 cases since last July (37 LSE, 63 NNC, 26 EOC, 24 DC/ODA, 97 CS, 10 NVD). JPS has received funding from JHF for the same project activities during the allocation round in September, and the project activities shall resume in February.
	 Irbid clinic is operating in full capacity, and providing primary health care services to an average of 200 cases per day Regarding Cash for Health, 3rd cycle of complicated cases to start for Syrian refugees to take place 1st week of February. IRC updates the NCD register in Za'atari Camp.
	 UMR Medical mission has concluded in December and another mission will take place in February (once per 2 months). The cataract surgery mission has concluded in January with a total of 182 surgeries done for eyes. New project has started this month to fund one local organization for a disabled center to provide services to the disabled as well as conduct vocational trainings for them to help them find jobs in the society. UNHCR

RH (UNFPA)	 The meeting took place on January 24th, MFT presented their project on harmonized RH registry in Jordan. This is through having one system for quality data on RH and the advocacy to implement in Mafraq Governorate. Consolations for providing indicators to the build the computerized IT system to capture data on national level for all agencies and all actors conducting RH in order to make substantive decisions. Plan for 2019, includes thematic approaches and areas to focus on such as Adolescence Sexual RH. Also, to document the work that has been done and provided.
Mental Health (IMC/WHO)	 Some organizations working in MH are struggling to reach the 30% Jordanian ratio in their programs. On-going discussions to modify referral strategy and policy that will be happening within the next two months.
Nutrition (Save the Children Jordan/UNICEF)	■ IMC (under funding from UNICEF) will conduct a ToT for IYCF CMAM in February.
Community Health Platform:	■ The next meeting on the 5 th February at IMC.
Action Points	✓ Nutrition (STC and UNICEF): Strategy for 2019 to be shared with group once finalized. Also, Micronutrient survey final update to be provided next meeting.
