**OCHA's Jordan humanitarian fund (JHF)** has been launched. Unfortunately, due to limited funding, all priorities put forward under protection could not be retained (instead protection will likely be prioritized in first call of 2020). PSEA was retained as a priority. Allocation strategy paper was shared with the WG for more details, it is recommended that members consult with sector coordinators on their project prior to submission. Deadline for submissions is the 5<sup>th</sup> of December.

**JRP:** process started in Nov, task force met once and now are prioritizing the vulnerability framework. UNICEF, UNHCR and UN women are supporting MoSD in the secretariat.

This year justice and protection have been brought together. Under protection there are 3 sub-groups:

- 1. Social services
- 2. Social assistance.
- 3. Justice.

Sector specific objectives were presented to the group. PSS sheet has been developed. New PSS sheet was filled in reference to the one from last year. Social services and social assistance have met in 2 groups, and Justice will meet today the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December 2019. Organizations that are part of the task force have been asked to provide their input. MoPIC shared number of assessments that they would like to attach to the template like WFP assessment, VAF survey and there are discussions on UNICEF assessment. The percentage might vary from location to another. The feedback was not complied yet, once done it will be shared with the WG for an input regarding budget and target. Technical language will be used in indicators to show more tangible results.

Regarding the framework of the social protection strategy, percentages will be discussed with Ministries.

Members want to be part in advocating on the percentages. Most of the activities were similar to last year's activities. One of the suggestions is to include PSEA in the JRP.

## IM updates:

IACU provided reporting update on protection sector. The three reporting platforms are JORISS, ActivityInfo and JFT (financial tracking).

Agencies are supposed to submit their projects online on JORISS for the JRP. ActivityInfo is important to track sectoral activities and JFT provides visibility on financial contributions.

Budget gaps were presented, total gap according to the JFT for refugee pillar is 40% and for resilience pillar is 64%.

Minimum expenditure basket for protection	Coordination unit asked all sectors including protection to provide the 2019 MEB.  MEB is an important aspect for refugee families. UNHCR are covering transportation and communication. Considering protection mainstreaming it was proposed to: costs of transportation for 2 visits per month to protection and other services excluding education thus contributing to ensure meaningful access to services and contribution to costs of communication to improve overall well-being of refugees.	•	Members to share their feedback on MEB by the end of the week.
Sector gender focal point	RI presented Gender with Age Marker (GAM) tool for the members of PWG. The Gender with Age Marker was to help understanding how to do better gender equality programming.  Gender markers are tools that are used to integrate how projects are applying gender. There was a development and a new gender with age marker (GAM) was launched. It is more comprehensive as it includes more dimensions. The Aim is to ensure that services are accessible for all men women boys and girls equally. Gam is also used when having a new proposal to check if the project is applying age and gender.
