

# Quantitative Snapshot of UNHCR Serbia Achievements Jan-June 2020

## Population of Concern to UNHCR in Serbia<sup>1</sup>

- 9,222 newly arrived asylum seekers and migrants
- 25,974 refugees
- 186 asylum-seekers in substantive procedures
- 1,901 persons at risk of statelessness
- 196,995 internally displaced persons, of which 68,514 still in need of sustainable solution

As well as for the excellent cooperation from operational partners, which included the Serbian Commissariat for Refugees and Migration (SCRM), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Interior (MOI), Ministry of Labor, Employment, Veteran and Social Affairs (MOLEVSA), Ministry of Public Administration and Local Self-Government (MOPALSG), the Ombudsman, the Roma Coordinators Association, local authorities, European institutions, the OSCE, IOM, UNRCO, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNV and WHO.

Around 20 UNHCR and 100 partner staff conducted regular protection activities in over 30 sites throughout Serbia.

# 1. ASYLUM SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT

## Asylum

- UNHCR supported the Asylum Office with 54 instances of interpretation services in the asylum procedure
- UNHCR and partners provided legal counselling on asylum in over 7,950 instances
- Assisted 1,050 asylum-seekers with registration and transport to government centres
- Represented 92 asylum-seekers in asylum procedure (incl. 8 unaccompanied and separated children (UASC)), of which 5 were granted refugee status and 3 subsidiary protection (incl. 1 UASC)
- Supported 5 asylum seekers to appeal negative decisions with the Commission for Asylum, administrative courts, the Constitutional Court and/or the ECtHR
- Supported analysis of asylum system and trends including a Belgrade Centre for Human Rights (BCHR) Annual Report <u>Right to Asylum in the Republic of Serbia 2019</u> and a Periodic Report <u>Right to Asylum in the Republic of Serbia January-March 2020</u>
- UNHCR partners closely followed and intervened to prevent spreading of growing xenophobic statements on social media

# **Identification and Referrals**

- UNHCR and partners provided over 18,000 translation/cultural mediation and over 15,700 information/ counselling services to asylum seekers
- Profiled over 9,000 new arrivals
- Identified and referred to appropriate services over 1,700 persons with specific needs, including 26 survivors of sexual or gender-based violence
- Conducted over 900 monitoring visits to Asylum Centres (ACs), Reception/Transit Centres (RTCs), Institutions for Accommodation for UASC, transit/border zones and informal gathering sites
- Created Guidelines for Identification and Status Determination of UASC
- Organised Focus Group Discussions to raise awareness on **Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse** with **10** asylum seekers in Pirot RTC
- Five workshops organised in Belgrade for local and refugee youth focusing on concepts of gender equality and SGBV
- Contributed to the Annual LGBTI Enlargement Review <u>ILGA 2019</u> predominately focusing on the position of LGBT+ asylum-seekers and refugees and other persons on the move

## **Unaccompanied and Separated Refugee Children (UASC)**

- UNHCR and partners Identified, assisted, counselled and/or referred 1,041 UASC (incl. 9 girls)
- Provided guardians to 89 UASC
- Provided individual psychological support and socio-educative support to 113 UASC, including peer educators
- Provided legal counselling to 59 UASC
- Provided legal representation in asylum procedures to 8 UASC
- Submitted criminal complaint and informed the Ombudsperson of physical abuse of children in Bogovađa AC by the security staff, resulting in their dismissal
- Organised 8 workshops for 6 UASC peer educators within the framework of Community-Based Protection of the Rights of UASC and Preventing SGBV Project
- Provided expert support to guardians and outreach workers of the Centres for Social Welfare in UASC protection

## **Psychosocial**

- UNHCR and partners provided mental health & psychosocial support in:
  - 561 individual/group psychological counselling sessions
  - 415 psychosocial/creative/recreational etc. workshops
  - Monitoring of 170 vulnerable cases (incl. 47 UASC) in constant need of psychological support and 72 children from single-parent households
  - **120** immediate first psychological interventions
  - 4 psychological assessments/reports for asylum procedures
  - **25** community-based support group meetings
  - 33 visits to specialized institutions for mental health
  - 52 advocacy interventions regarding provision of psychiatric services during coronavirus pandemic
- Created and shared the materials which helped beneficiaries feel more secure during the Covid-related state of emergency and lowered the risk of them developing psychological difficulties

# **Education**

- UNHCR and partners provided 167 educational workshops, 117 recreational/occupational workshops and 37 workshops and group counselling sessions for asylum-seeker parents
- Provided 288 classes of Serbian language and 85 English workshops in 5 RTCs for 425 adults and children



- Successful launch of Serbian Language e-platform with 24 active learners
- Assisted 50 asylum-seeker children with homework and better understanding of school subjects
- Provided 19 asylum-seeker and refugee children with distance learning equipment and enhanced Internet connection; also provided 8 children with schoolbags, sportswear and learning materials
- Provided 12 computers to child protection institutions and asylum centres providing accommodation of UASC to facilitate their online learning
- Provided over 30 cultural mediation services as well as Pashtu literacy & calligraphy classes to UASC at Branko Pešić School and Vodovodska Centre

## Reception

- Regularly updated and posted online <u>Joint Assessment</u> with the SCRM of governmental Asylum, Reception and Transit Centres against applicable UN, EU and national reception standards
- Supported SCRM and institutions accommodating UASC with over 127,000 non-food relief and hygiene items (clothing & hygiene parcels, shoes, blankets and sleeping bags, towels and quilts, gloves, masks, diapers, hand sanitizing gels, liquid soap, contactless thermometers, etc.), also in view of Covid-19 response/assistance
- Supported **institutions accommodating UASC** and vulnerable children with hygiene packages, food procurements (during Ramadan), and other items for leisure activities
- Engaged 6 cleaners in Bujanovac and Preševo RTCs for a period of two months to enhance hygienic measures in view of Covid-19 epidemic
- Created Guidelines for Protection of UASC from Abuse in Reception Institutions

## **Coordination and Communication**

- Under the Refugee Coordination Model, UNHCR co-chaired:
  - 5 Refugee and Migrant Theme Group meetings of the UN Country Team and
  - $\circ \qquad \textbf{1} \textbf{ Refugee Protection Working Group } meeting, as well as$
  - o a number of sectoral coordination meetings
- Contributed to the Socio-Economic Impact Assessment of Covid-19 of the Public Investment Management Office of the Government of Serbia with assessment concerning refugees, asylum seekers and stateless persons
- Undertook **Cross Border Missions** with Croatia and virtual tripartite Croatia-Bosnia and Herzegovina-Serbia mission as well as with colleagues in Priština
- Produced leaflets with information regarding COVID-19 for persons accommodated in government centres in English, Arabic, Persian, Pashto and Kurdish and leaflets on advice for COVID-19 protection based on WHO recommendations for persons accommodated privately in English, Farsi and Arabic; created a micro-website <u>Let's stop the pandemic</u> with information regarding COVID-19
- Produced over 50 updates on the UNHCR programme in Serbia, and contributed to 14 UNCT Covid SitReps
- Issued <u>12 Covid-related press releases</u>, both HQ and local ones, in addition to the <u>Global Trends</u> and <u>World</u> <u>Refugee Day (WRD) press releases</u>
- Published 3 human interest <u>stories</u>, including one on the global <u>UNHCR website</u>
- Maintained social media presence, including 5,400 <u>Facebook followers</u>, 33,270 visits/107,358 page views to the UNHCR Serbia website as well as 40 interviews to electronic and print media
- On World Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development 21 May, UNHCR partner produced a <u>public</u> <u>statement/video</u> on tolerance, cultural diversity and peaceful communication
- On International Children's Day 1 June, UNHCR partners published a <u>statement concerning the rights of UASC</u> and their exposure to maltreatment, exploitation, human trafficking, neglect, sexual harassment and discrimination
- On the occasion of **World Refugee Day** (WRD) 20 June, UNHCR partners issued a <u>press release</u> and started two public campaigns entitled <u>#StanimoJedniUzDruge</u> [Let's stand by one another] and <u>#BetterSideOfTheWorld</u>; in the period 18-22 June, local and global WRD video clips were broadcasted three times per hour on screens in central public squares of Belgrade and Niš and on two major TV stations; partner BCHR gave two WRD-related interviews to N1 TV and Radio Belgrade and partner Psychosocial Innovation Network (PIN) brought refugee teachers and students together to mark WRD; the Representative and Comms Associate gave five WRD interviews: three on national TVs RTS, N1, Nova S morning programmes and two for the daily newspaper Politika
- Produced a video on "Peer Educators" project
- In view of Covid-19 epidemic, established Facebook pages <u>Information about Covid-19 for refugees in Serbia</u> and <u>Online Counselling for Refugees and Asylum-Seekers</u>



# 2. SOLUTIONS FOR REFUGEES

## **Free Legal Aid**

• UNHCR and partners provided free legal counselling and legal aid to 5,550 refugees

## **Local Integration**

- UNHCR and partners, provided **511 Serbian language lessons** to **34** refugees and asylum-seekers, incl. those privately accommodated; another **24** users benefitted from learning Serbian through an <u>online platform</u> managed by a partner NGO
- Eight families (14 children) received distance learning equipment during the Covid-related State of Emergency 7 children benefitted from tailored learning support; 8 UASC and their guardians and friends from the local community attended a week's winter camp in Kopaonik mountain, with UNHCR covering the costs and equipping the children with winter outfits
- Refugees provided 83 free online lessons in Persian and Kurdish languages to the members of the local community
- Supported the local integration of 225 refugees and asylum-seekers
- Supported 83 refugees with financial assistance, and another 2 with one-off grants
- Supported 167 refugees in obtaining documents
- Supported 87 asylum-seekers and refugees through workshops in search for employment; supported asylumseekers in the integration process i.a. through 2 Integration Workshops in Krnjača and Banja Koviljača ACs
- Four asylum-seekers self-employed as wall painter, graphic designer, masseur and art gallerist, received assistance in equipment and coverage of fees for participating in sales events; 2 benefitted from driving courses and 3 were supported in having their foreign driving licences recognized in Serbia
- The joint UNHCR/SCRM Local Integration Team continued to update governmental and UNHCR records on refugees and ensuring that all have individual integration plans
- Facilitated participation of 32 asylum-seekers children (incl. UASC) in 6 joint events with local population
- Provided support for one asylum-seeker in presenting her handmade Persian jewellery and other handicrafts during *Belgrade Night Market* event in June
- Engaged 6 UASC in football training and 3 UASC in a kick-box club, 4 UASC in a public discussion on hate speech and 9 UASC in First Aid training
- On World Refugee Day (20 June), organised <u>workshops "Box of Wishes" and "Messages for refugees"</u> for children and parents in Preševo and Vranje RTCs
- Supported the Government in implementing pledges related to the <u>Global Refugee Compact</u>

# **Regional Housing programme (RHP)**

- In Serbia, over 8,800 beneficiary families have been selected i.e. found eligible to benefit from RHP so far. The number of processed eligible applicants is greater than the number of housing solutions offered in all SRB sub-projects together. To date 4,800 solutions have been delivered and this number is increasing daily, progressing towards delivery of a total of 7,537 housing solutions currently approved for Serbia.
- Assisted 281 refugees on housing in Countries of Origin, through legal advice, power of attorney for acquisition of documents, compiling of documents and submitting demands for housing care, etc.
- Supported vulnerable refugees to obtain 122 documents free of charge
- Assisted **78** Roma refugees to access labour, social, status and other rights
- Supported 49 Roma refugees to access to RHP or other housing programmes

## Resettlement

• Due to Covid-19 situation and the related State of Emergency in Serbia, there were no successful resettlements or submissions for resettlement in the first six months of 2020

# 3. PREVENTION AND REDUCTION OF STATELESSNESS

## **Free Legal Aid**

- Close monitoring of implementation of the new Law on Free Legal Aid and its impact on persons of concern
- Supported 56 administrative/court procedures, including 2 through cross-boundary cooperation
- Followed up on 137 procedures initiated in 2019 or earlier but not yet completed
- Supported 50 persons in having their nationality granted/confirmed

# **Advocacy**

- With the onset of Covid-19 epidemic, advocated with government bodies and local institutions to include persons at risk of statelessness in the existing assistance programmes (delivery of food and hygiene parcels, access to soup kitchens, social welfare, etc.)
- Intervened directly on behalf of 75 families with nearly 360 members for inclusion in aid schemes



# 4. SUPPORT FOR INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS (IDP)

#### **Free Legal Aid**

• UNHCR and partners provided 311 IDPs with free legal aid

#### **Voluntary Return**

• UNHCR and partners organised 4 return-informative meetings and registered 10 families for return to Kosovo<sup>2</sup>, while continuing daily cross-boundary cooperation on returns

#### **Local Integration**

• Distributed food and hygiene parcels to 230 vulnerable **IDP households** during the State of Emergency introduced with Covid-19 epidemic

## Advocacy & Capacity Building

- Participated in the <u>Skopje Initiative for Durable Solutions for Internally Displaced Persons from Kosovo<sup>3</sup></u> with the OSCE and relevant institutions from Priština, Belgrade, Skopje and Podgorica
- Continued close cooperation with the Ministry for Public Administration and Local Self-Government and Ombudsperson office on realization of the MoU signed in October 2019 aiming on reducing and preventing statelessness. Operational Group meeting, as well as 2 meetings of the signatory parties' representatives were organised in the first half of 2020.
- **Twenty** young Roma women and men were selected through a Call for Applications, and trained in 6 online workshops to influence social and political processes related to Roma inclusion, following which they were employed as **UNVs for 6 months in local-self-governments and local organizations**
- Supported networking of 65 young Roma volunteers from 2018, 2019 and 2020 projects
- Supported activities of A11 which enabled access to drinking water to IDPs in "Čukarička šuma" informal settlement
- Conducted 12 stakeholder interviews in order to collect data on implementation of National Strategy for Resolving the Issues of Refugees and IDPs

## Inclusion of Roma IDP children

- Supported partner Indigo to sign 7 cooperation agreements with educational institutions in Novi Pazar, Kraljevo
  and Bela Palanka, educating Roma IDP children; engaged 24 volunteer teachers and associates who provided
  support with homework and study, schoolbooks and materials, monthly bus tickets, referrals to health
  institutions and centres for social welfare
- Supported 231 Roma children with improved quality of education and greater inclusion, also food and hygiene parcels in view of Covid-19 epidemic
- During the State of Emergency when authorities organised online/TV learning, out of 198 Roma primary schoolchildren involved in the project, 106 did not have the means of accessing distance learning and were supported by supply of printed relevant materials and support by phone
- An orphaned Roma IDP girl received a laptop and Internet connection as support to continuing education and distance learning
- All 198 primary schoolchildren involved in the project successfully passed their final school exams




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

#### Observed new arrivals - demographics and country of transit





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## Reported collective expulsions into Serbia




#### Reported irregular movements from Serbia to North Macedonia


Irregular movements to N. Macedonia - Jan-Jun 2020: Irregular movements to N. Macedonia - Jul-Dec 2019:
