


Access to health care




Everyone should have access to free functioning health facilities and services without discrimination.

Restriction of movement





Restrictions on movement cannot be used as an opportunity to harass, ill-treat or extort people.

Leaving no one behind





Everyone must be allowed to receive information and access to services.

Targeted measures to persons with disabilities




Information should be shared in accessible language and format to all.

Special measures for people in detention




To decongest detention facilities, alternatives to detention should be adopted.

No hate speech! No stigma!






The right to seek safety from persecution




Anyone seeking safety from persecution must continue to have access to territory and asylum.

Women and girls must be protected





Support services for survivors of gender-based violence need to continue.
