





ARRIVALS TO EUROPE

Consistent with seasonal trends, some 9,300 refugees and migrants arrived in Europe via the Mediterranean and Canary Islands routes in June, slightly fewer than in May. Of these, some 2,600 arrived in Spain, a small decrease compared to May. Arrivals in Italy and Greece in June increased by 3% and 13%, respectively, compared to last month.

Over 600 refugees and migrants arrived in Greece this month, 13% increase compared to May. At the same time, arrivals to Greece in the first half of 2021 decreased by 64% compared to the same period last year, as allegations of pushbacks at land and sea borders continued. Turkish authorities reported rescuing or intercepting some 1,650 refugees and migrants in the Aegean in June, nearly double the number in May.

Of the 5,800 refugees and migrants arriving in Italy in June, 52% had departed from Libya and 22% from Tunisia. The number of arrivals in Italy from Libya in June declined by 30% compared to May. Separately, some 4,500° refugees and migrants who departed from Libya in June were intercepted or rescued by Libyan authorities and disembarked in Libya, 25% more than in May. According to available data, most people departing from Libya so far this year were from Bangladesh, Eritrea and Egypt. People arriving in Italy from Tunisia this year originated mainly from Tunisia, Côte d'Ivoire and Guinea.

Of the 2,6007 refugees and migrants who arrived in Spain in June, half arrived through the Mediterranean route, and the other half in the Canary Islands. Arrivals in the Canary Islands in June increased by nearly 50% compared to May. Overall, the number of arrivals in Spain in the first half of 2021 both through the Western Mediterranean and Canary Islands routes was 57% higher than in the same period last year.

SOUTH EASTERN EUROPE⁸

In June, some 3,000 people arrived in or transited through the subregion as part of mixed movements, 30% more than in May (2,104), and 45% fewer than in June 2020. In the first half of 2021, 13,400 people arrived in or transited through the subregion, 35% fewer than in the same period in 2020.

Eighty-nine persons submitted an asylum application in June, a 17% increase compared to May (76). Of these, the main countries of origin were the Syrian Arab Republic (16%), Afghanistan (15%), Iraq (12%), Libya (10%) and Pakistan (10%). In June, 18% of asylum applications were lodged by children, of which 1% were unaccompanied or separated.

Thirty asylum interviews were conducted in June, and three positive first-instance decisions were issued (two refugee status and one subsidiary protection status), while fifteen applications were rejected and fifty were closed, as the applicants were no longer present in the country of application.
