

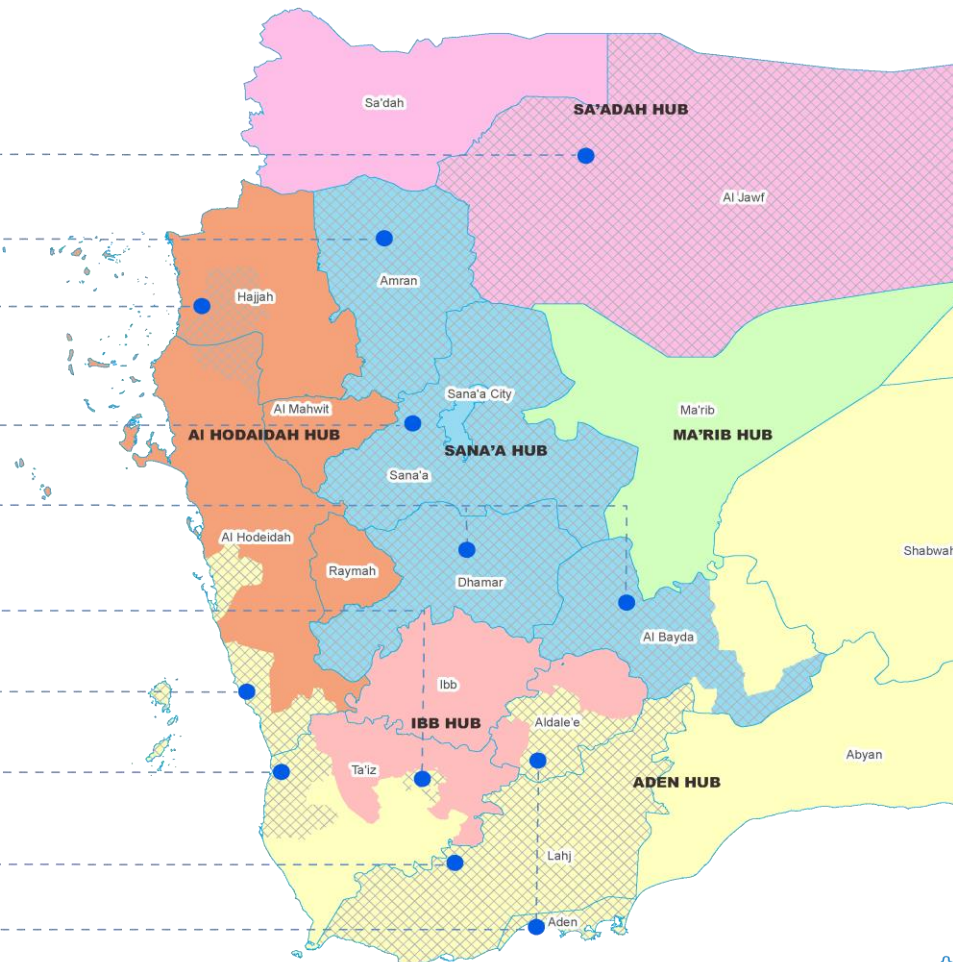

## ❑ **CCCM priorities;**

- Identifying, tracking, advocating covering sectors' needs or gap-filling, evictions, HLP issues as well.
- Strengthening & facilitating safe access to multi sectorial services within sites.
- Expanding CCCM services to uncovered IDP sites.
- Covering critical wash & Shelter gaps as the last resort through site maintenance projects.
- Reducing fire incidents within sites by installing friendly cooking stoves through CFW.
- Mitigating impacts of expected floods by upkeeping sites' facilities and infrastructures through CFW.
- Strengthen sites' IDPs mobilization and participation.

## ❑ **Inter-cluster priorities.**

- Strengthening coordination between clusters' partners & CCCM partners.
- Covering food, health & education gaps within IDP sites

During last period, we have managed to cover the following gaps in close coordination with relevant SNCCs and partners.

## - New displacements in sites:

On 18 Sep, SCMCHA reported 53 families were forced to flee their homes due to escalation in AIMotaynah area in AITuhayta district to settle in Al Masilah sub-district, where no CCCM presence, in Al-Jarai district. JAAHD-Shelter team has conducted needs assessment for these families. So far, UNHCR has distributed ESKs and NFIs to those families.

## - Current cluster coverage VS uncovered:

According to July's CCCM Master list, there are 760 IDP hosting sites in Hodeida, Hajjah and Raymah governorates; only 149 sites are managed by CCCM partners (RADF, JAAHD, and DRC) while the remaining sites are not yet. For future CCCM coverage plans, YGUSSWP is supposed to manage 35 IDP sites in Hajjah under YHF once their sub-agreement gets signed from SCMCHA, as well as JAAHD is going to expand their target to include 17 IDP sites (8 sites in Raymah- they are registered in the master list, and 9 sites in Al-Mahweet- they will be added into the master list).



## - Capacity building done in September and planned for October:

We will be conducting training for SCMCHA focal points at the end of Oct, starting with Hodeida branch.

## - Key recommendations for CCCM partners:

-Ensure building strong relationship with service providers and SCMCHA through conducting effective coordination meetings to highlight identified gaps.

-Conducting workshops and training sessions for CCCM community committees members to ensure refreshing their knowledge on provided humanitarian assistance and its criteria

- #298 IDPs HHs new arrivals reported in Al-jawf and other 200 IDPs are under assessment , due to conflict in the area and frontlines.
- At Al-Jawf governorate #51 IDPs site have SMC partners presence, while around 39 IDPs sites still not covered by SMC partners. And for Sa'adah governorate #16 IDPs sites only have SMC partner presence while remaining sites are with no SMC partners, and it's given us challenge to assess those sites leading to lack of service at the uncovered sites.
- Ongoing multi-sectoral need assessment through UNHCR CCCM partners YDF at (11 IDPs sites in Sa'adah).
- UNHCR - SMC partner YARD distributed NFIs to 1037 HHs in AL-Khalaq district of AL-Jawf Gove and 1000 ESK kits in Rajuzah.
- UNHCR partner YDF distributed NFIs targeting 1000 HHs in Ad Dhaher district of Sa'ada Gov.
- Under the supervision of YARD SMC team, Community committees has conducted awareness sessions for 210 HHs on Covid-19 precaution measurement, fire prevention and safety at sites, and on personal hygiene.
- 42 HHs been assisted with 42 EESKS by YARD ( UNHCR shelter partner), the families was affected by flood and through coordination with shelter cluster, assistance delivered and distributed for these families.
- Coordination meetings held with local authorities and CCs at managed IDPs sites.
- Arrangements are ongoing to support 24 fire incident affected families in AL-Jawf with CRIs from Sa'ada RCT stock.
- A capacity building training conduct for 24 members of CCs at IDPs site in Al-Jawf, on their roles and responsibilities, and on assessment & reporting tools.

## Recommendation for CCCM partners:



- Important to build and maintain updated master registration database at HHs level for all IDPs sites, with tracking newly arrivals, departures, delivered assistance, and gaps per HH.
- CCCM partners shall have **1-2 CCs member per 100 HHs**, while it noticed at IDPs site only two CCs per site how ever the size of site.
- shall endorsed a **timely or weekly site monitoring tools** for partners managing IDPs sites, to maintain on track for site issues, referral, and movement or assistance delivered.

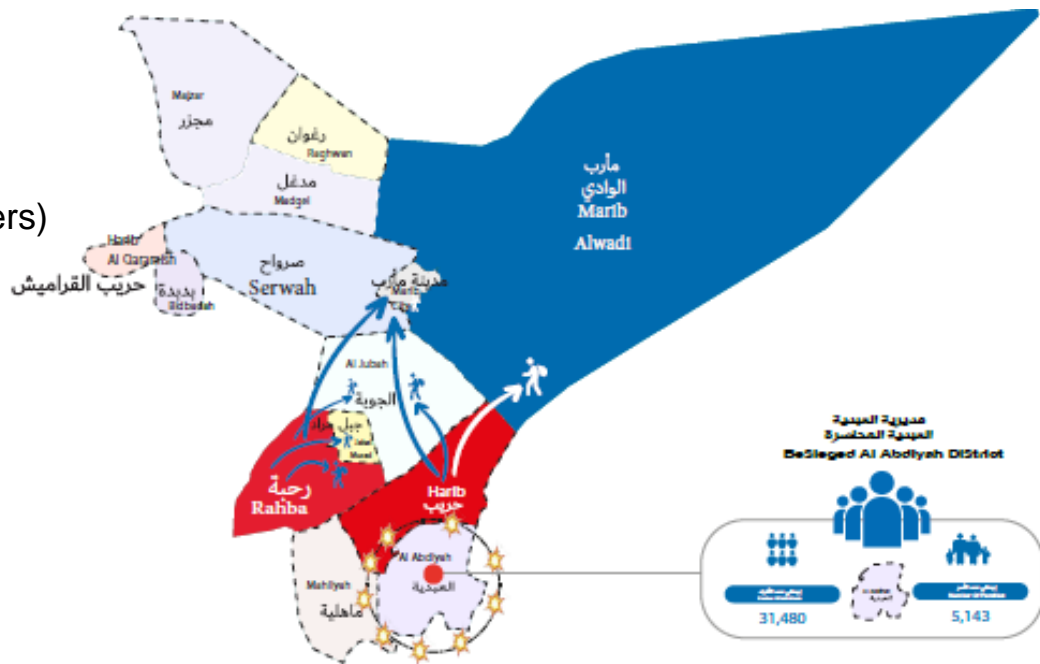


## Displacement Overview

**New Displacement wave:** since 1<sup>st</sup> Sep 2021  
1546 HHs (Ex U) / 445 HHs (DTM and other partners)

IDPs moving from Rahabah and Hareeb districts to Jabal Murad, Aljubah, Rahabah out skirts, Maib city and Marib districts. **The largest number** are in Marib city with up to 840 HHs.

A number of 5143 HHs, 31480 individuals are been **sieged in Alabdiyah** district by surrounding military forces, with no access to basic needs and living utilities.

## Difficulties

- IDPs situation are not stable, they are on the move and not located in one specific location.
- Access constrains in Rahbah and Hareeb districts.
- Distance and harsh environment in IDP sites settlements in some areas.
- Lack of emergency response capacity with partners. (emergency stock)

## Current cluster coverage VS uncovered

DRC is extending their CCCM coverage to **14 sub-sites in Al Hodaida**; 3 in Attuhitah, 1 in Alkhwkha, 10 in Hayes. **Plus 3 sites in Lahj**, all under the YHF SA1.

NRC to expand coverage to **4 sites in Al Hodaida and 4 sites in Abyan** - 3 under YHF SA1, and 1 under ECHO, currently under assessment phase

IOM is extending coverage to **9 sub-sites** in Al Hodaida in WC.

BCFHD started to work in **10 new sites** Salah district, Taiz.

ACTED, will resume their activities in Aden and Addaleah (Addhalea and Sanah), Time Not communicated yet..

## Highlights on cluster achievements

1. In partnership with Reach Initiative and with support of the Ex.U and cluster members and partners, the CCCM Cluster **conducted the 2nd round of the IDP Site Reporting Exercise**, between the period April to August 2021. Through this exercise, the CCCM Cluster reached a total number of 675 IDP hosting sites. As of end-Septemnr, CCCM cluster partners are covering 134 out of the total 675 under Aden AoR with **coverage of 93 & 41 IDP sites under Aden Hub and Marib Hub** respectively.
2. After receiving regular complaints about the IDP sites figures, and the neglection of group of IDPs in some adjacent subsites. **Sites consolidation exercise where done** for IDP site in some governorates, where it yield a clear boarders for IDP sites in a way it is unified amongst SMCs, and ExU.
3. Cluster is leading a **joint inter-cluster advocacy** before the ExU regarding the land issues.
4. Thanks to GWQ and their efforts in relocating Al Nyabah IDPs who were under building collapse threat, glad to announce that **Al Nyabah IDPs will be relocated end of this week**

## Capacity building done in September and planned for October

1. In September, the CCCM Cluster organized a **HLP workshop** aimed at building capacities of the Executive Unit representatives in dealing with land ownership issues and eviction threats in IDP hosting sites. The training was attended by 29 Executive Unit staff at site, district and governorate levels across Aden AoR. Topics covered community mediation and community-based resolution mechanism on how to address HLP issues in a displacement context, a round table on security of tenure and forced evictions in the south, as well as a joint inter-cluster session on Land Suitability Assessments, delivered by CCCM, Protection, Shelter/NFI and WASH Clusters.
2. BCFHD is planning to do a **CCCM capacity building**

## Key Challenges for CCCM partners

1. **Abyan remains a gap specially with renewed eviction threats**, the new identified land is ready and agreed upon by the MSMC team but still waiting for NRC to manage the site which will accommodate some of these sites under eminent threat of eviction.
2. SMC partners are doing well, when it comes to the communication with their counterparts, however these **relationships should be promoted** and maintained through regular meetings, appreciate if cluster is in copy if a communication with governorate FP is made, and no response is received.
3. Good to know that **ACTED is resuming their activities in Aden and Adhalea**, as service delivery in both governorate sites are very week.
4. CCCM Cluster still needs to **consider IDP sites reported by ExU in Hajah**, and fulling under AI Hodidah SN CCCM cluster.

## ❖ Highlights on cluster achievements:

Through the intensive coordination at the hub level:

- ❑ WASH partner "YDN: is covering 29 sites through water trucking. They missed 4 sites under our direct management in which the following up is still ongoing to cover.
- ❑ WASH partner YDN planned to cover 418 latrines in 39 sites in Taizz. We raised the gaps in IBB and Al Dhalea and the following up is still ongoing.
- ❑ WASH SNCC planned to cover all sites with hygiene promotion awareness and Hygiene kits.
- ❑ Food covered 85% of the managed sites while the rest are ongoing following up.
- ❑ Nutrition covered all sites.
- ❑ Health covered around 60%. While most IDPs are still complaining about the lack of services.
- ❑ the CCCM partners identified the Education gaps and the following up is still ongoing.
- ❑ CCCM team identifies the protection gaps and refer them to the community centers.
- ❑ CCCM identifies the shelter & NFIs gaps and refers to the shelter partners while the gaps are still huge.

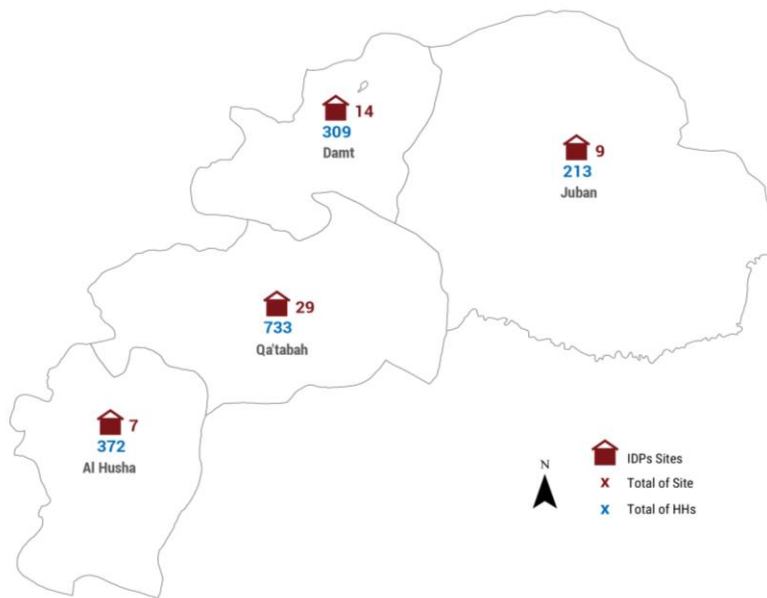

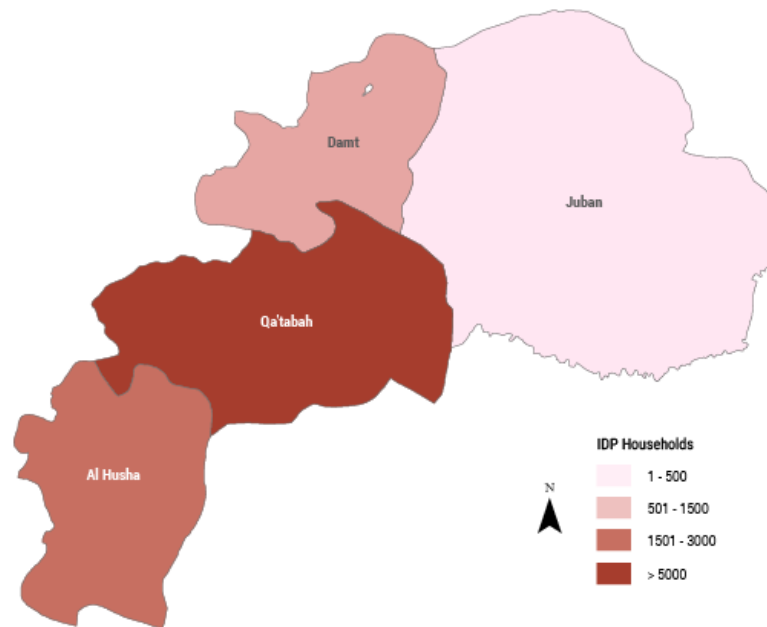
- ❑ Update the site profile.

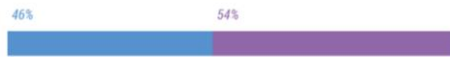

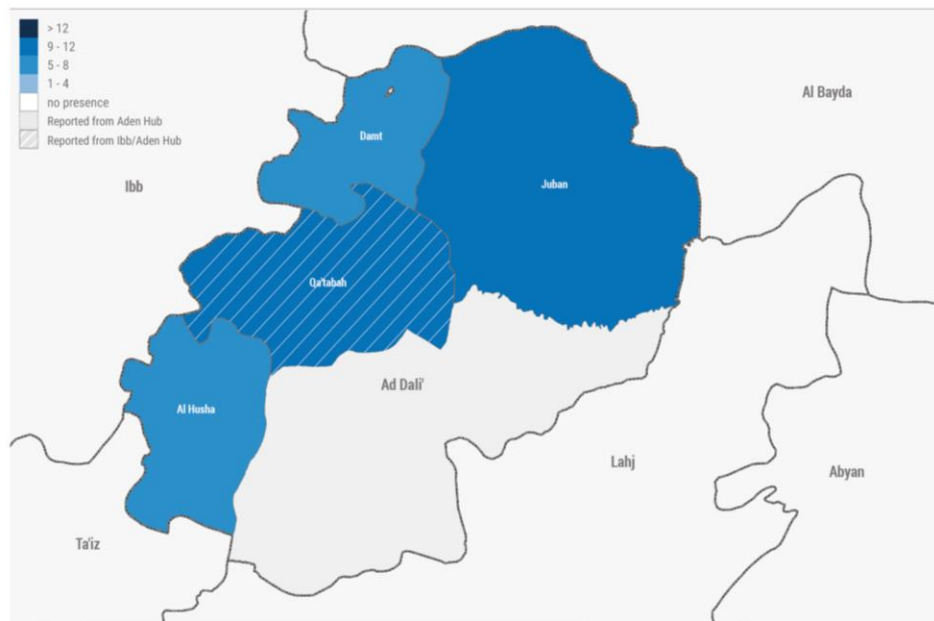
