

CCCM Cluster Somalia Dashboard

as of May 2022

General Updates

HIGHLIGHT: Site monitoring activities occurred in 710 IDP sites covering 26 districts with 14 agencies administering this activity. 271 of these sites have received new arrivals within the last month compared to 192 sites in the previous month of April.

Site Verification Assessments: #6 site verification assessments were conducted in #6 districts (Kismayu, Afmadow, Dhobley, Elwaak, Garowe, Wanlaweyn districts) which verified 221 IDP sites hosting a total of 39,721 households (244,131 individuals) Further comprehensive reports for each district updated on the populations with Sex and Age Disaggregated Data were circulated to partners and respective authorities.

Capacity Building: Partners trained 430 community members including CMCs. A safety audit training was also conducted in Hargeisa targeting IDP women leaders with an aim of enhancing their participation and engagement to mitigate protection risks and strengthen their capacity and knowledge on GBV safety audits and develop concrete action plans to reduce GBV risks and vulnerabilities. CCCM, Shelter and HLP AoR collaborated in conducting an inter-cluster training on prevention of evictions and each of the cluster prerequisite roles in evictions' prevention of both new and old caseloads of the PoCs

Coordination Meetings: Partners conducted several site level coordination meeting with Local Authorities and service providers and discussed enhancing Responses to drought displaced new arrivals in sites and ways to enhance advocacy on service delivery; further, partners engaged with DCs and district social affairs focal points in Dollow and Luuq and discussed on CCCM main activities and requested authorizations to start implementation of planned CCCM activities.

Service Monitoring: Site monitoring activities occurred in 710 IDP sites covering 26 districts with 14 agencies administering this activity. Access to water in CCCM managed IDP sites continues to improve nationally with 66% of IDP sites having access to water in May, up from April's levels of 56%. In May, 50% of sites had access to educational facilities compared to April's rate of 51% of sites, and March's rate of 56% of sites. Within the 710 IDP sites (1,000,000 individuals) monitored in May, there were 255 recorded mortalities of individuals under the age of 5 and 256 mortalities of individuals aged 5 and above. (*mortality tracking is reliant on a key informant methodology which may reduce the accuracy of this data*). Access to nutrition services rose from 58% of all IDP sites being able to access nutrition services in April to 59% in May. 84% of surveyed sites consist of emergency shelter types with 12% of sites having transitional shelters and 4% of sites having permanent shelters. 12% of IDP households have received cash or food assistance within the last 6 months which is a decrease from April rate of 15%. 40% of monitored sites feature children that are not living with their usual caretaker which is an increase compare to April's figure of 34% while 54% of monitored IDP sites have GBV referral pathways in place while 50% of IDP sites have Child Protection referral pathways in place. Communication with Communities: During the reporting period, partners constructed a multipurpose community center in IDP sites in Berdale. Several partners including Islamic Relief, GREDO, ARD, MARDO & Local authorities used the new space for community consultations and meetings to improve accountability to affected population. UNHCR through southwest commission for IDPz and refugees conducted COVID-19 prevention awareness in 52 IDP sites in Baidoa, Hudur, Afgoye and Diinsor districts and reached about 1,420 individuals in a door-to-door awareness campaign.

Cash Based Intervention (CBI)/ Cash for Work (CfW): Partners enrolled conditional cash distribution to 200 most vulnerable households that were unable to purchase necessary food and domestic items. 5 IDP sites in Dhusamareb received the 1st payment, each beneficiary received \$100, and the cash transfer is expected to continue for 5 Months.

Complaint and Feedback Mechanism (CFM): May featured 4,488 complaints raised which represented an increase of (13%) of recorded issues compared to the number of complaints raised in the month of April which had 3,903 issues filled. Consistent with previous months, the majority of the complaints raised in May were from the Food Security and Livelihood (FSL) where 1,967 (44%) Shelter 1, 109(25%) and WASH making 628 (14%) of the recorded issues. This is consistent with the ongoing drought needs where most of the highlighted needs through the CCCM New Arrival Tracker are recorded under the FSL needs alongside the other two sectors. Constraints were also recorded across all other sectors including health and nutrition albeit in low numbers across the districts where CCCM CFM were recorded.

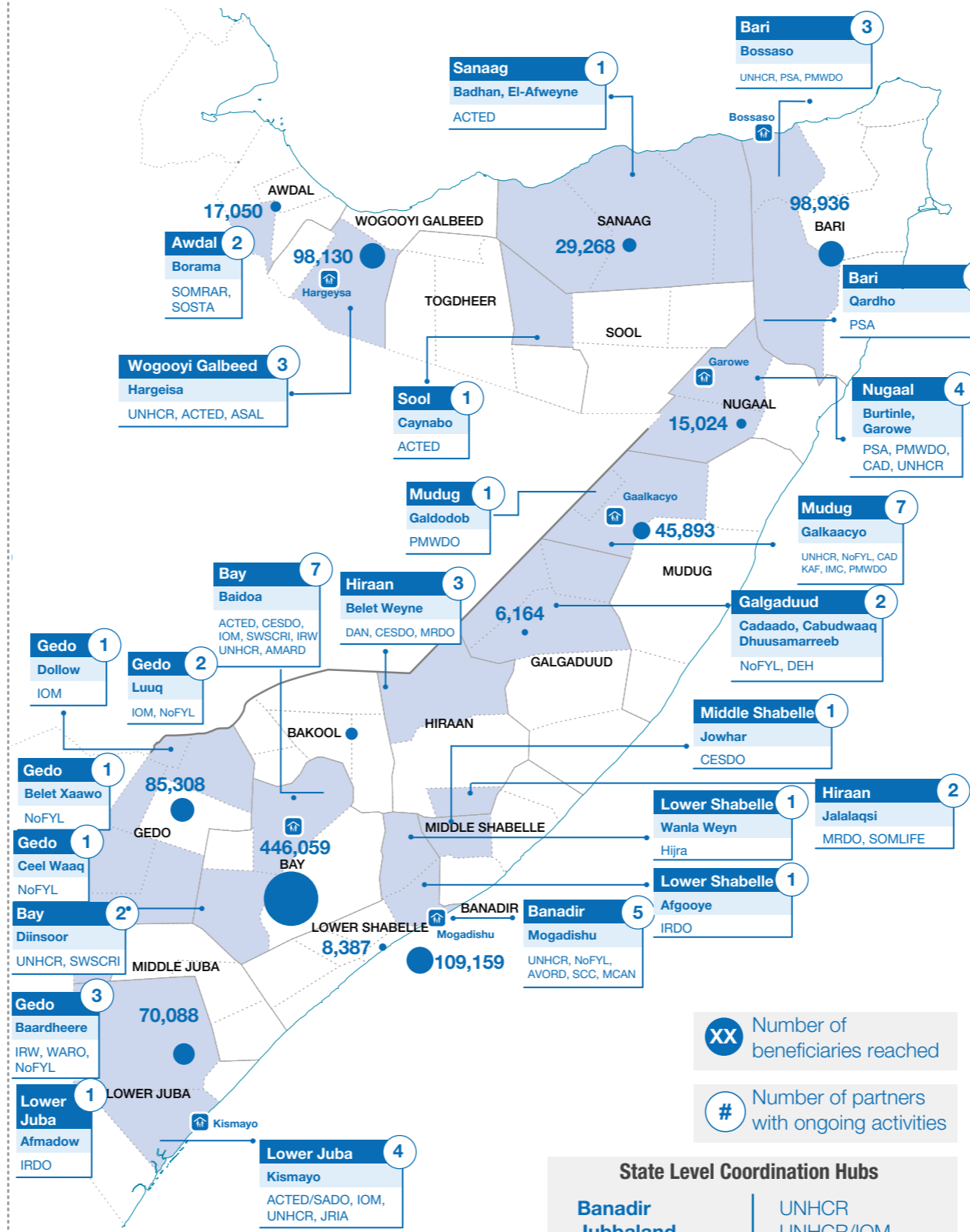

Site improvement activities: During the reporting period, Partners engaged site maintenance committee for maintenance and improvement of site infrastructure in close cooperation with CMCs using vulnerabilities criteria and basic skills. Over 200 cash for work beneficiaries (40 skilled and 160 unskilled) in Hargeisa, Badhan, Erigavo and El-Afweyn have been selected for implementing the site improvement activities. Partners conducted garbage collection campaign in IDP sites in Bossaso, Qardho and Garowe through cash for work (CFW) approach benefitting, a total of 246 individuals participated and earned incentive to improve daily living.

New Arrivals: CCCM Partners continue recording numbers of displaced populations arriving in CCCM managed sites through the CCCM New Arrival Tracker Tool. In the month of May, at least 44,041 new arrivals were received in 311 IDP sites across 23 districts.

Operational presence of cluster partners



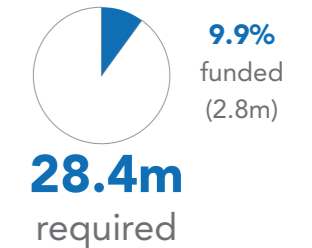

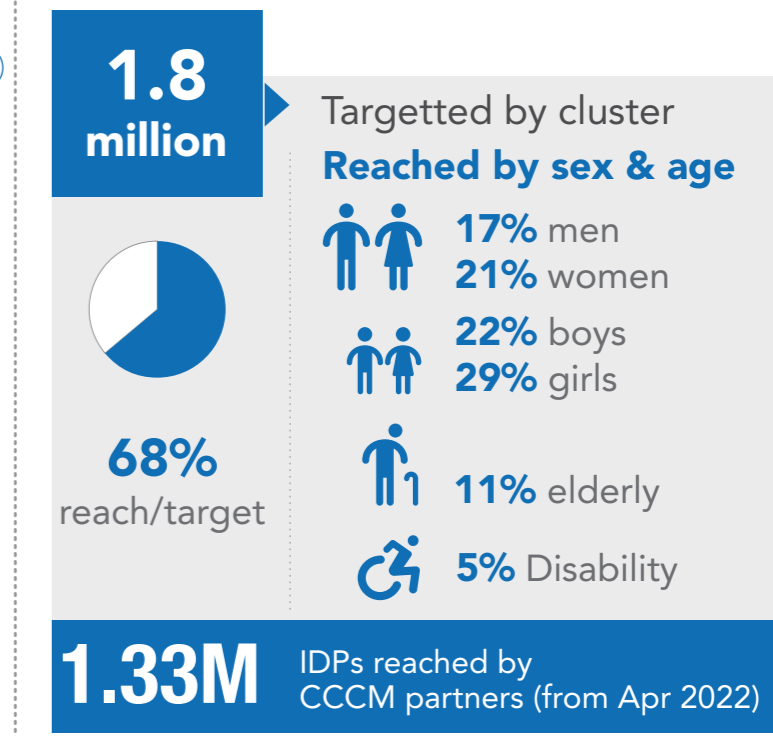
Overall Objective
