UNHCR Delivery Updates

OPERATIONAL CONTEXT:

- Intense fighting continued in hotspots in Luhanska and Doneska oblasts in eastern Ukraine while daily airstrikes took place across the country. Scheduled power cuts continue in eight regions of Ukraine, with about **4.5 million people** remaining without access to electricity.
- As of 27 October, [IOM estimates](#) **6.5 million people** are internally displaced across Ukraine. This represents a slight increase compared to 6.2 million at the end of September. **450,000** have been newly displaced within the last 30 days.
- Humanitarian needs continue to grow as people are feeling the compounding impacts of the war and the cold weather. UNHCR's top priorities are to **deliver the winterization response and critical assistance to people living in the newly retaken areas.**
- UNHCR is working closely with local and national actors and joined the [coordination meeting with the Prime Minister of Ukraine](#) to align on priorities for the winter period. UNHCR aims to implement our assistance programmes in a way that **reinforce national ownership and sustainability** and **supports the recovery and durable solutions** of IDPs, returnees and conflict-affected people.



UNHCR contributes to the second UN Convoy to the newly retaken areas in Khersonska oblast

People in Khersonska oblast have been living under relentless hostilities and shelling since the start of the war, in isolation, and without access to basic services.

On 4 November, UNHCR joined an inter-agency convoy to reach communities in Novovorontsovka, Novooleksandrivka and Vysokopillia in Khersonska oblast where the Government has recently regained control.

Nearly 7,500 people were reached with essential items, including winterized items such as thermal blankets, solar lamps and sleeping bags. The Governor of Khersonska oblast [joined](#) the humanitarian convoy in Novovorontsovka.

NFI Essential Items & Housing/Shelter

- 60 people in the newly retaken village of Hoptivka in Kharkivska oblast were supported with essential items such as hygiene kits and solar lamps.
- On 2 November, UNHCR's local partner Proliska provided 2,000 tarpaulins to the Lyman Town Council, one of the newly retaken areas in Donetsk oblast, to support the repairs of 33 schools that provide education to 5,700 children.
- 101 conflict affected families in Mykolaivska oblast received Emergency Shelter Kits for quick repairs of damaged homes ahead of the winter, which will help create a thermal envelope from the cold.
- UNHCR is working on light and medium repairs for as many damaged homes as possible before the winter sets in. To date, 1,300 houses were repaired in Chernihivska and Kyivska oblasts through UNHCR's shelter programme.
- More than 56,000 people across the the country were assisted with NFIs such as mattresses, solar lamps, kitchen sets, and bed-linen sets as well as with winterized items including sleeping bags, thermoses and warm clothes during the past week.

Equipping heating points with oblast authorities as winter approaches

Generators for heating points remain a priority ask for support from Oblast authorities.

To date, UNHCR has delivered more than 20 generators to Donetsk, Kharkivska, Kyivska and Sumska oblasts to be installed in heating points which are identified by local authorities and include sanatoriums, dormitories, schools, and hospital buildings. UNHCR is assessing the possibility to deliver more generators to oblast authorities as winter approaches.

Protection


- UNHCR partners observed an increase in the number of IDPs coming to Zakarpatska and Ivano-Frankivska oblasts. Almost 90% are women with children. Partners continued to provide specialized protection services and assisted over 1,000 IDPs with protection counselling, legal assistance, and referrals to public services during the past week.
- From 31 October to 6 November, 67 monitoring visits were conducted to the border crossing points with Poland, Slovakia, Hungary, Romania and Moldova. During the monitoring visits, 271 people were provided with protection counselling, 47 with legal assistance, and 33 with social accompaniment.
- From 1 to 3 November, six focus group discussions (FGD) were conducted with 83 conflict affected people in Sumska oblast dedicated to the 16 Days against GBV campaign. Lack of information on mechanisms for raising complaints and giving feedback on handling of GBV cases were the main

issues identified during the FGD which will feed into UNHCR's response.

- UNHCR partners as part of the CCCM programme held several events for IDP children and youth residing in collective sites such as first aid training and sessions on psychological relief.
- On 2 November, UNHCR handed over 10 laptops to three district Departments of Social Protection of Ternopil'ska oblast in order to increase their capacity to register and provide timely services to IDPs.


Cash Assistance

- With the Ministry of Regional Development (MoRD), UNHCR supports families who are hosting IDPs under the Prykhystok programme. As agreed with the Ministry, UNHCR has disbursed one-off cash support to over 39,000 households hosting IDPs to help meet additional expenses incurred (*final assistance figure is provisional and subject to end of year reconciliation reports.) WINTERIZATION RESPONSE

UNHCR is prioritizing programmes that will enable IDPs, conflict-affected persons and returnees to access safe, warm and dignified accommodation during the winter months through shelter interventions, distribution of winterized items and cash to cover winter needs.



Winter cash assistance is aimed to support vulnerable families to cover increased costs associated with the winter period.


Ganna, displaced from Kherson together with her daughters, heard about UNHCR's cash registration in the Vinnytsia Center for Provision of Admin Service and sought for support. She is relieved to be able to use the assistance to pay for utilities during the heating period, which has started a week ago.

To date, more than 200,000 conflict-affected people in a vulnerable situation have been supported with winter cash assistance by UNHCR.
