Agenda Point 1	<p>New partner introduction</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gregor, liaison officer at the emergency response coordination centre • Agron Gashi, recently joined UNICEF regional office. • Eva Sano (IOM), regional vaccination support officer. esano@iom.int • Malgorzata Zawadzka: I'm the coordinator of the project "Mentally Equal". We aim to improve wellbeing in Poland and have been able to provide 3400 MHPSS consultation to refugees. We provide training to teachers in schools and support Ukrainian school children.
Agenda Point 2	<p>EMTCC – Medevac Hub Update</p> <p>Tienna Phan, EMTCC (WHO POL CO)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This week we are seeing low numbers of ICU patients, and in general the profiles are consistent. • There have been quite a few oncology cases that has been referred onward to specialist facilities throughout Europe • Generally, we are seeing a quite low stream of patients compared to other weeks since September. This is partly due to the bed capacity and the organization on the European side. • We are looking into the regional referral system, as there were some questions on this last week. <p>Michal Chelstowski, Humanosh</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We now have more activities outside of the European Union, such as MedEvacs to Mexico. • We have had an increase in electricity access, with less need to use generators. • Next week we go for another mission in Easter Ukraine, providing basic health care. • We are looking to increase the possibility to offer dental care and gynaecological care, so if any partners would like to team up on this let us know.

The Government ensures that refugees from Ukraine have free and equal access to the national health system, which has put additional demands on the Polish health care infrastructure. The Health Sector's priority activities in support of the government – notably the Ministry of Health – and local authorities are:

- Addressing the needs of vulnerable people, particularly older people and people with disabilities.
- Improving access to quality health care services by raising awareness and knowledge about the Polish health system and services and establishing collaborative and efficient referral pathways.
- Ensuring that older people and the chronically ill have equal access to treatment and essential medications and ensuring proper care for pregnant women and newborns.
- Increasing vaccination coverage, especially among children, older persons, persons with disabilities and persons with chronic illnesses by supporting the Ministry of Health and local authorities with information campaigns and risk communication and community engagement (RCCE) messaging.
- Ensuring adequate preparation and response for ongoing and new emergencies.
- Ensuring the possibility of safe relocation from Poland to the other EU Member States for Ukrainian patients on a needs-basis.

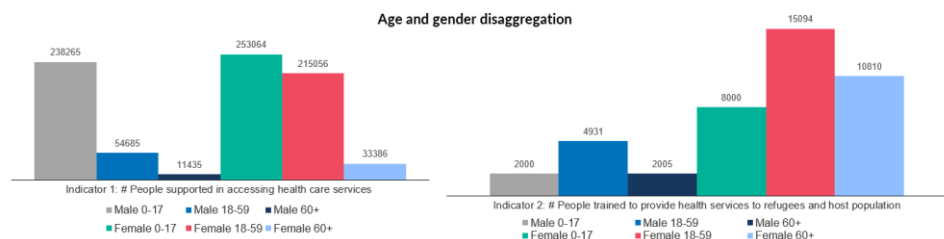

So, they don't have to request access?</p> <p><u>A. Ilia Markowski, UNHCR</u>: Yes, that is correct.</p> <p><u>Q. Silvia Gatscher, WHO POL CO</u>: Can you tell something about the reporting frequency?</p> <p><u>A. Ilia Markowski, UNHCR</u>: Activity reporting it will take place on monthly basis and funding reporting will take place on quarter basis. We will explain all this a bit more during our trainings</p> <p><u>Q. Rai Buenaventura, UNFPA</u>: Is there going to be a point where we review the indicators, and perhaps adjust them, against the RRP? Or are they set in stone until the end of the year?</p> <p><u>A. Silvia Gatscher, WHO POL CO</u>: The indicators have been agreed upon not only on a country level, but on a Euro level as well, which makes them tricky to adjust. But there might still be valuable to review them further down the lane.</p>
<p>Agenda Point 4</p>	<p>Partners updates</p> <p>Karolina Witek (German Embassy Warsaw): Due to legislative changes in Poland come March, refugees will need to cover half their costs. I would love to hear any thought or reflections on this from the NGOs who might have input on this. What effects or consequences do you foresee that this will have?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Kasia Skopiec (Humanosh): The only response option that NGOs have is to set up support panels for people. I can support anyone interested in the process of setting up a support panel.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Silvia Gatscher (WHO POL CO): The protection sector is also following up on this and is also providing some support. If need be, we can also provide linkage between health partners and the protection sectors if health partners also encounter Ukrainians who needs the support. • Olga Volik (PUI): I can only add that it creates a lot of confusion and anxieties among the affected people, so it impacts their mental health and especially elderly people, who have started to look into their Ukrainian pension, and many have realized they need to choose between paying for accommodation or for food. I think it has a multi-layer impact. <p>Olga (PUI): PUI will end their activities at the end of February. We will shortly present our activities and hand over next week. Here is the PUI email that can provide you with the profiles of psychologist and MHPSS supervisor available since the 1st of March in Warsaw: pol.finco@premiere-urgence.org</p> <p>Magdalena Ankiersztej-Bartczak: Everything that has to do with HIV for refugees. All funding/grants related to this is coming to an end by the end of this month. We have received no additional grants.</p> <p>We would like to provide training for facilities on how to accommodate patients who are HIV positive. Where to refer them and how to overcome stigma.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Silvia Gatscher (WHO POL CO): we will reach out to you bilaterally; I think this is an area where we might be able to support you.

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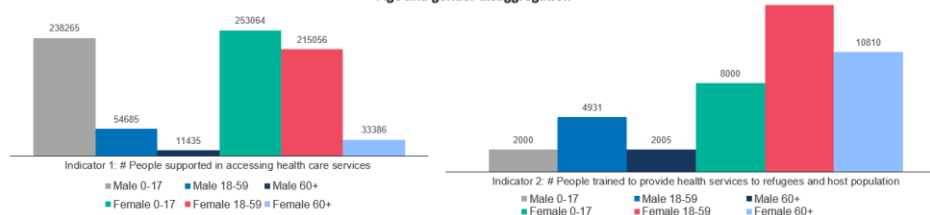

Silvia Gatscher, WHO POL CO</u>: Wskaźniki zostały uzgodnione nie tylko na poziomie kraju, ale także na poziomie euro, co sprawia, że trudno je dostosować. <p>Punkt planu 4</p>	<p>Partners updates</p> <p>Karolina Witek (Ambasada Niemiec w Warszawie): W związku ze zmianami legislacyjnymi w Polsce w marcu uchodźcy będą musieli pokryć połowę swoich kosztów. Chciałabym usłyszeć wszelkie przemyślenia i refleksje na ten temat od organizacji pozarządowych, które mogą mieć w tym swój udział. Jakie skutki lub konsekwencje przewidujesz, że to będzie miało?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Kasia Skopiec (Humanosh): Jedyną opcją odpowiedzi, jaką mają organizacje pozarządowe, jest tworzenie paneli wsparcia dla ludzi. Mogę wesprzeć każdego zainteresowanego w procesie tworzenia panelu wsparcia. • Silvia Gatscher (WHO POL CO): Sektor ochrony również śledzi tę sprawę i również udziela pewnego wsparcia. W razie potrzeby możemy również zapewnić połączenie między partnerami z sektora zdrowia a sektorami ochrony, jeśli partnerzy z sektora zdrowia również spotkają Ukraińców, którzy potrzebują wsparcia. • Olga Volik (PUI): Mogę tylko dodać, że powoduje to wiele zamieszania i niepokoju wśród dotkniętych tym problemem osób, więc wpływa na ich zdrowie psychiczne, a zwłaszcza osób starszych, które zaczęły przyglądać się swojej ukraińskiej emeryturze, a wiele z nich zdało sobie sprawę, że muszą wybierać między płaceniem za mieszkanie a za jedzenie. Myślę, że ma to wielowarstwowy wpływ. <p>Olga (PUI): PUI zakończy swoją działalność z końcem lutego. My krótko przedstawimy nasze działania i prześlemy je w przyszłym tygodniu. 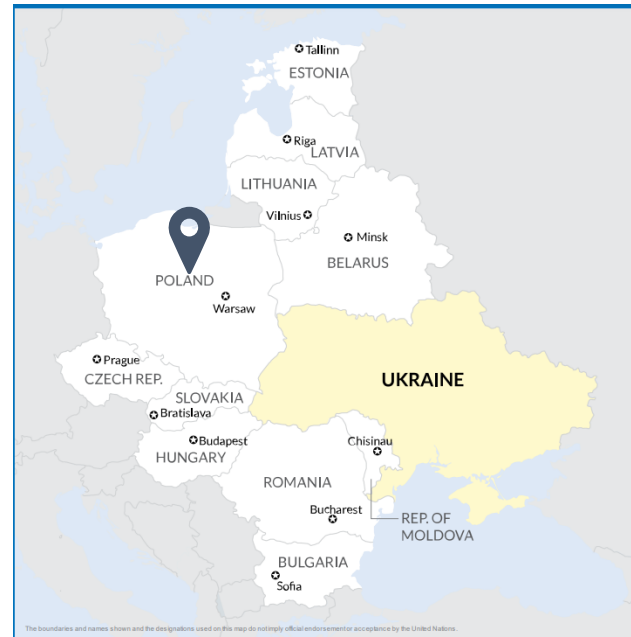

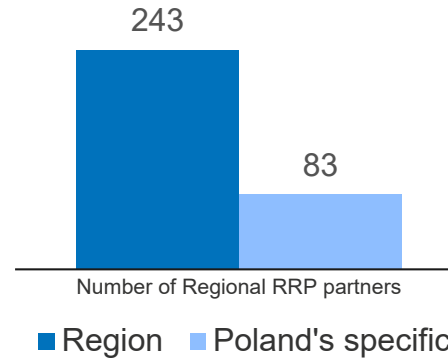

Regional Refugee Response Plan - Poland January – December 2023



Four Country Strategic Objectives:

1. Ensure refugees' access to protection status and rights on a non-discriminatory basis
2. Pave the way toward solutions and expand access to social and economic opportunities to facilitate inclusion through a whole-of-society approach and in line with the Global Compact on Refugees, recognizing the critical role played by national and local actors, including NGOs and RLOs
3. Ensure that refugees with specific needs continue to have access to targeted support and assistance, while also engaging with and strengthening community-level protective mechanisms
4. Advance social cohesion between refugee and host communities through targeted interventions

Regional Refugee Response Plan – Poland (Health&Nutrition) January – December 2023



The Government ensures that refugees from Ukraine have free and equal access to the national health system, which has put additional demands on the Polish health care infrastructure. The Health Sector's priority activities in support of the government – notably the Ministry of Health – and local authorities are:

- Addressing **the needs of vulnerable people**, particularly older people and people with disabilities.
- Improving **access to quality health care services** by raising awareness and knowledge about the Polish health system and services and establishing collaborative and efficient referral pathways.
- Ensuring that **older people and the chronically ill have equal access to treatment and essential medications** and ensuring proper care for pregnant women and newborns.
- **Increasing vaccination coverage**, especially among children, older persons, persons with disabilities and persons with chronic illnesses by supporting the Ministry of Health and local authorities with information campaigns and risk communication and community engagement (RCCE) messaging.
- Ensuring **adequate preparation and response for ongoing and new emergencies**.
- Ensuring the possibility of **safe relocation from Poland to the other EU Member States for Ukrainian patients on a needs-basis**.

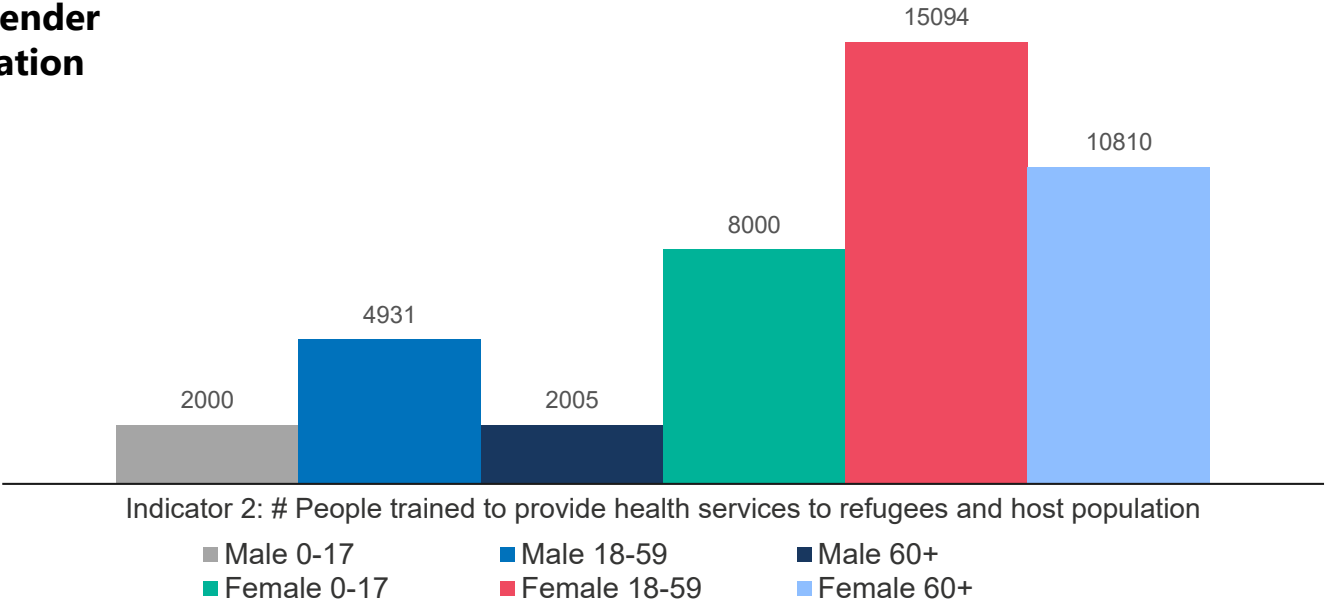
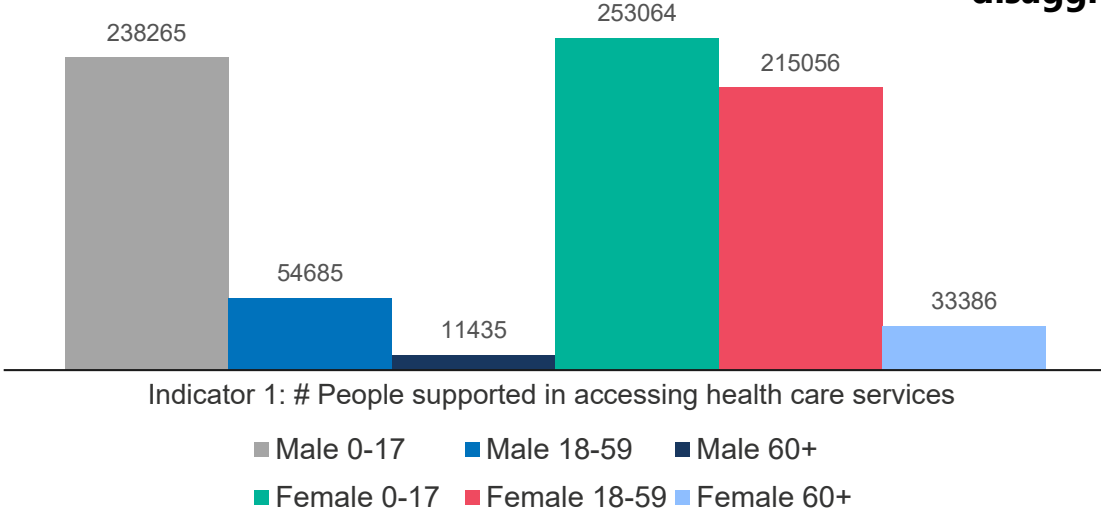

4. When: At what moment was the support delivered?
5. Whom: How many people, what type of people was assisted?

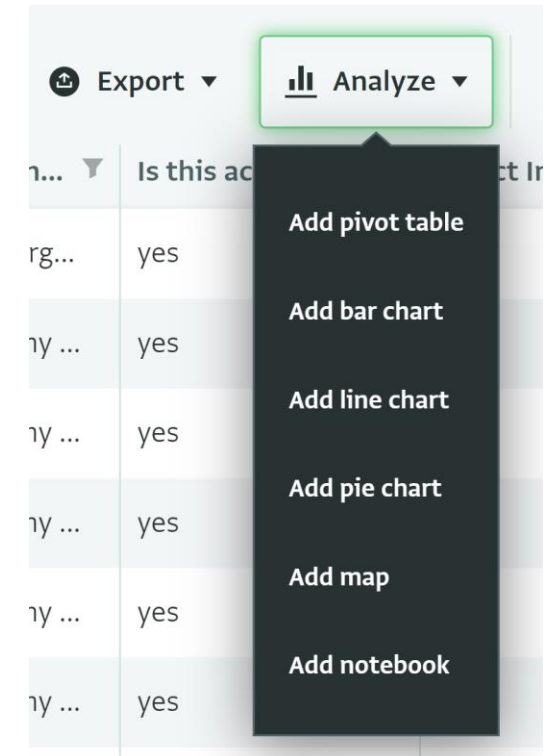
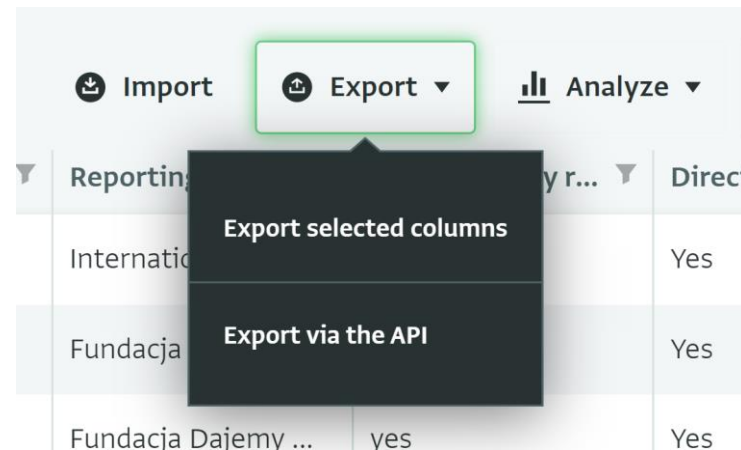

Reporting in RRP – Activity Info

1. Activity Info is an online tool for reporting of activities and results
2. Used by UNHCR and its partners in over 30 countries
3. Possible to report as well as analyze data (Possibility to Export data in XLS or link database to Power Bi via API)
4. Replaces 5W reporting in Excel format
