Uganda Refugee Response Plan (RRP) 2022 - 2023

January - March 2023

Overview


The food security sector contributes to Strategic Development Goal 2.1 by improving access to nutritious food among refugees and asylum seekers in the 13 refugee settlements. Furthermore, the sector promotes the self-reliance of refugee communities through complementary activities.

Despite operational constraints, WFP and partners assisted 1.32 million beneficiaries in all the refugee settlements through the provision of food and unrestricted cash transfers. A total of 795,374 beneficiaries received cash transfers, and 531,642 beneficiaries received in-kind food.

The indicators for the moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) treatment programme remained above the threshold of 75 percent. This can be attributed to health systems strengthening efforts through the training of village health teams as well as mother care groups in feeding practices hence promoting recovery of malnourished children within the respective communities.

Digital cash transfer mechanisms through agent banking continued to be scaled up, with cash beneficiaries owning bank accounts increasing from 36 percent to 41 percent by the end of Q1. To complement cash assistance, WFP provided financial literacy training to cash beneficiaries. By the end of Q1, WFP and partners had reached 25,784 beneficiaries across all 13 settlements.

In July 2023, within the constraints of available resources, WFP will roll out a progressive shift to needs-based targeting of all relief food and cash assistance to refugees in Uganda. The prioritisation exercise will ensure that the most vulnerable refugees and new arrivals receive the highest food ration possible based on available resources, the moderately vulnerable receive a reduced ration, and possible livelihood support, while the least vulnerable, self-reliant households will be transitioned from monthly humanitarian food assistance.




