

3RP 2023 Q2 Update

Funding and Implementation

1 January – 30 June 2023

We are observing a decreasing trend in funding for the refugee response through the 3RP. Despite the persistently high needs, the funding for the refugee response in Türkiye has decreased. While the 3RP partners have received over \$5.8 billion since the start of the Syrian refugee crisis, the amount received per year has reduced annually. In contrast, direct funding to government institutions and development actors has increased. As of Quarter 2 2023, the 29 3RP partners have only received \$208 million against the total request of \$896 million, which is only around 23%. In comparison, in the same period of 2022, the 3RP partners received \$299 million, which made 26% of the total request.

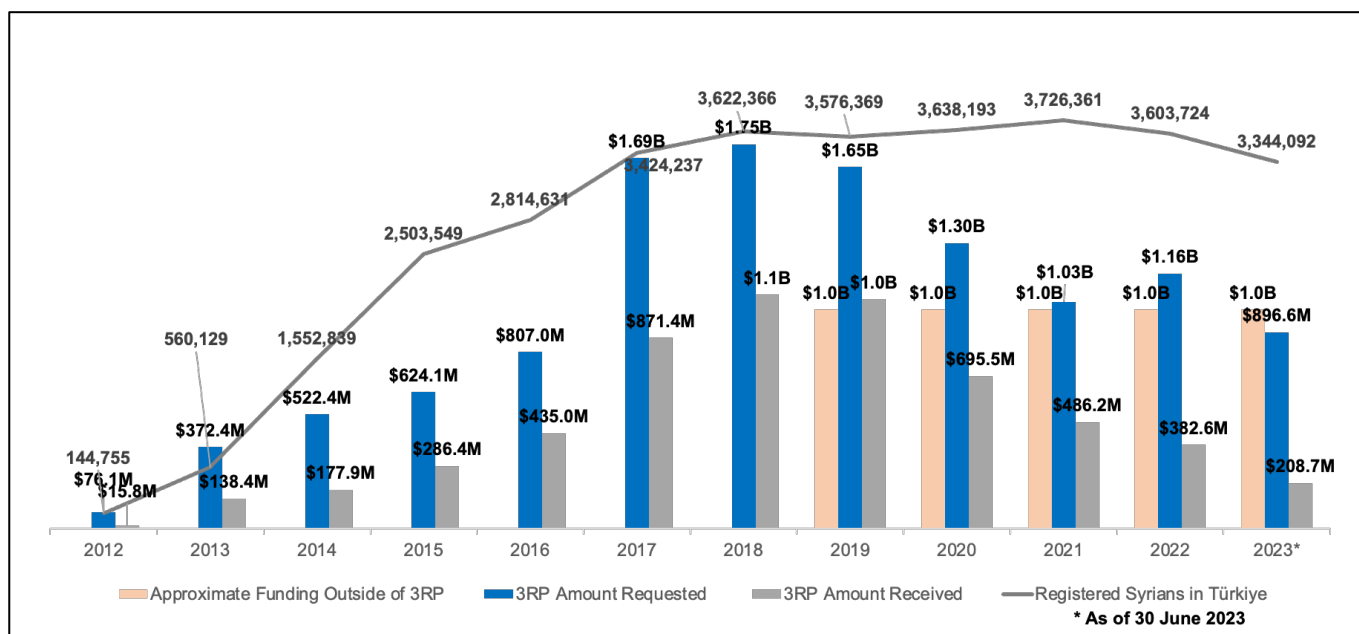


Table 1 Türkiye's Refugee Response: 2012-2023

The sectoral breakdown shows that the Economic Empowerment sector funded \$60M, the Protection Sector received \$38M, the Basic Needs sector received \$22M, the Education Sector received \$13M, and the Health sector received \$3M. There is also a \$73M unallocated amount, mostly received by UNHCR – \$60M and UNICEF reported \$12M.

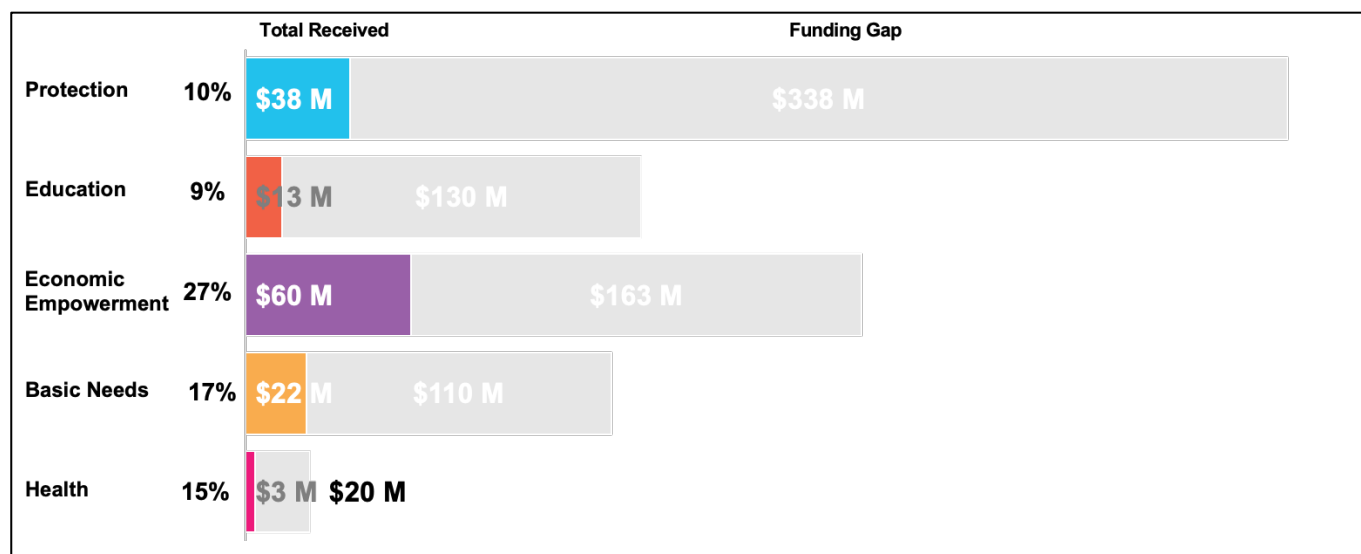


Table 2 3RP Funding Received by Sector

The overall reporting of the activities shows that there is an improvement in the implementation of activities compared to Q1. A total of 1.3 million individuals were assisted by 65 3RP partners with the funding received under the 3RP as of Q2 2023, including 600,000 under regular programming and an additional 700,000 in response to needs arising due to the earthquakes. Of those assisted by the 3RP partners, 735,000 beneficiaries were Syrians, 500,000 were Turkish citizens (of which 330,000 of host community members were supported by the 3RP partners due to their needs resulting from the earthquakes) and 74,000 were from other nationalities.

The Protection Sector members are the most active, with 36 different organisations implementing activities, which include individual protection interventions (identification, assessment, and referrals), psychosocial support, holistic GBV and CP support, legal support, awareness raising and holistic capacity development activities. In total, 750,000 individuals were reached by the sector members. As of Q2, 424,000 individuals benefitted from individual protection interventions, 110,000 individuals were identified with protection needs, 100,000 individuals were referred to specialised services, 62,000 individuals received psychosocial support, and 25,000 benefitted from cash for protection activities.

The Basic Needs sector partners have focused on cash-based intervention activities, food assistance, and the distribution of hygiene kits. In the first half of the year, 7 partners reached 430K individuals in total. 170,000 individuals benefitted from cash-based interventions, 51,000 individuals benefitted from food assistance, and 210,000 individuals received hygiene kits.

18 organisations implemented activities under the Education Sector, which focused mostly on education programmes in informal and nonformal settings, case-based support to increase access to education opportunities, transportation assistance, capacity development programmes for education personnel and scholarships for higher education programmes, reaching 210k individuals. In 2023, the sector has supported close to 150,000 children to benefit from education



in formal, informal and nonformal settings, including early childhood education, 30,000 children with transportation assistance, trained 150,000 education personnel and provided scholarships to 2,000 individuals for higher education.

Under the Economic Empowerment sector, the 11 implementing partners focused on job placement, job creation, self-employment and vocational and agricultural capacity-building activities. The sector has also continued working with cooperatives and other social entrepreneurship, reaching 2,000 individuals. In 2023, 418 individuals were supported with job placements, and 680 women benefited from self-employment opportunities.

The Health Sector partners focused mostly on sexual and reproductive health (SRH) activities, providing Mental health and psychosocial support and awareness raising on health information services and STIs, including HIV. 5 implementing partners of the sector reached 44,000 individuals with SRH services, 1,300 individuals with MHPSS consultations and 12,500 with health-related targeted awareness raising activities.

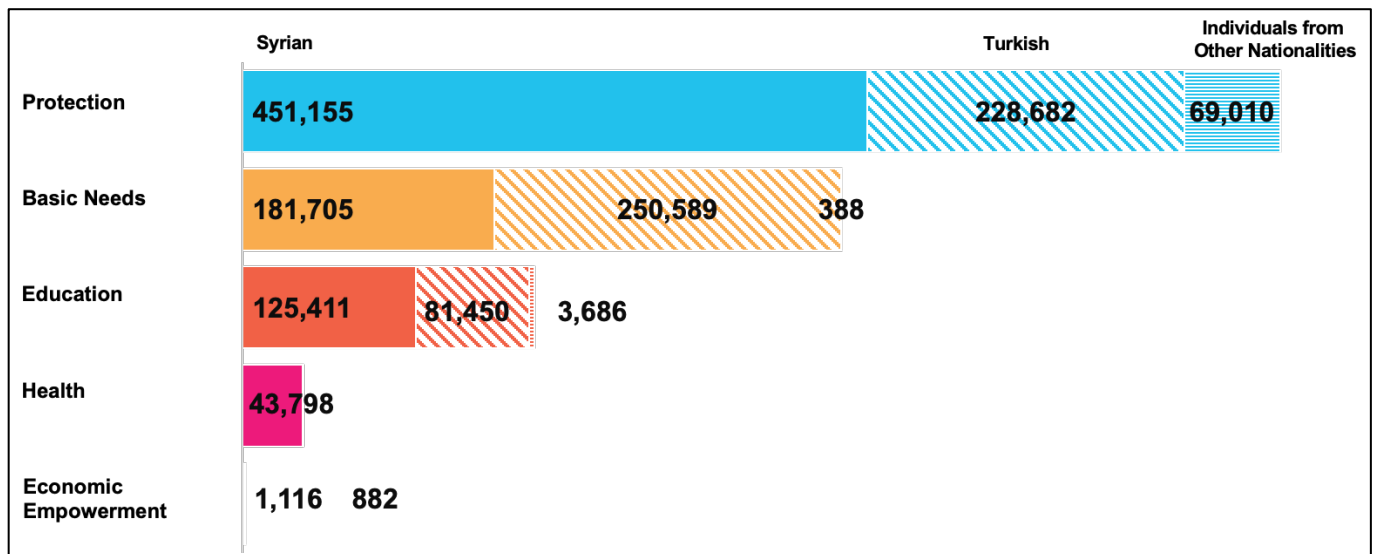


Table 3 Nationality Breakdown of Beneficiaries by Sector
