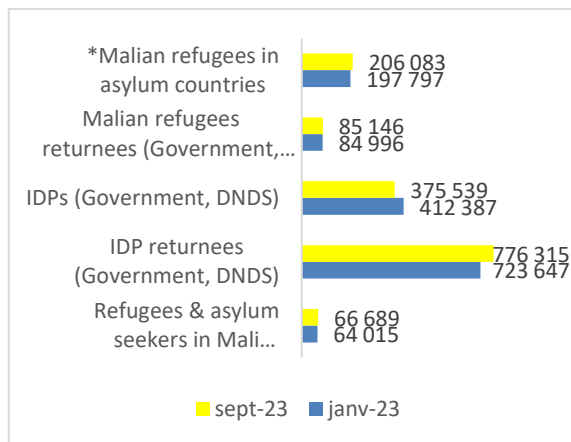
732 refugee households benefit from a distribution of non-food items (NFI) kits in the Sikasso region.

A household of **02** people was resettled in France.

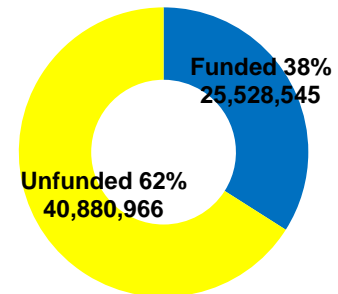
5,350 IDPs in Mopti received emergency shelters using monetary transfers.

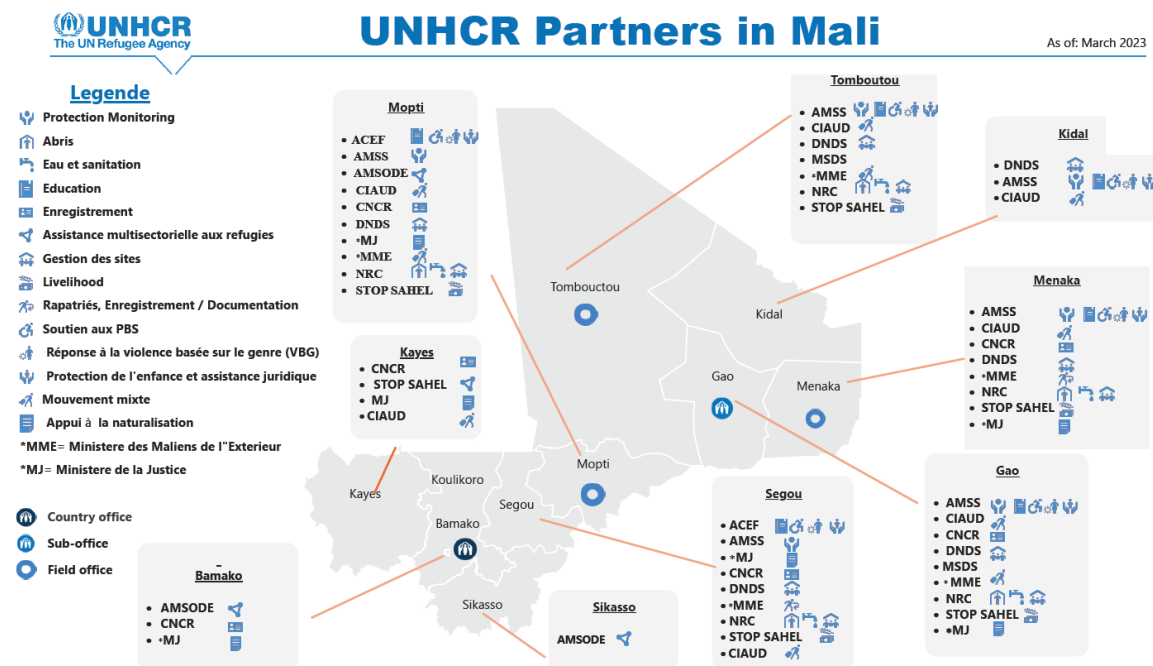

MAIN ACTIVITIES

PROTECTION

Legal protection

- During September, 08 refugees (06 men and 02 women) and 05 asylum seekers (04 men and one woman) were received, advised, and guided on questions related to resettlement, documentation, health, AGRs, and the procedure of asylum.
- Monitoring of 05 cases of asylum application procedure with the National Commission for Refugees (CNCR) was to identify progress and difficulties with a view to appropriate guidance for the asylum seekers concerned.

Mixed Movements:

- In September, monitoring activities for mixed movements made it possible to register 1,325 people including 791 men, 361 women, 110 boys, and 63 girls. Which represents 299 people (18.41%) fewer than the previous month. Among these 1,325 people, 848 are entrants and 477 are exiters, mainly in the Timbuktu, Mopti, Gao, and Ségou regions.
- During September, several awareness sessions were conducted in several regions of the country. The themes covered different subjects including the consequences of irregular migration, the asylum application procedure as well and the importance of civil documentation. A total of 7 sessions took place in the regions of Gao and Kidal which reached 97 people including 65 men and 32 women. In the Ménaka region, 10 awareness sessions took place, reaching 75 people including 47 men and 28 women. 23 awareness sessions covered the regions of Mopti and Ségou and reached 404 people (128 women, 160 men, 37 girls, and 79 boys).
- A total of 36 additional sessions took place in the regions of Timbuktu, Kayes, Nara, Sikasso, and Koutiala and reached a total of 666 people.

Durables solutions:

Resettlement:

- As part of family reunification, UNHCR organized the departure to France of the refugee household of 02 persons for resettlement.
- In September UNHCR continued to inform and advise refugees on the resettlement process, fraud related issues to manage their expectations.

SHELTER & NON-FOOD-ITEMS (NFIs) & WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH)

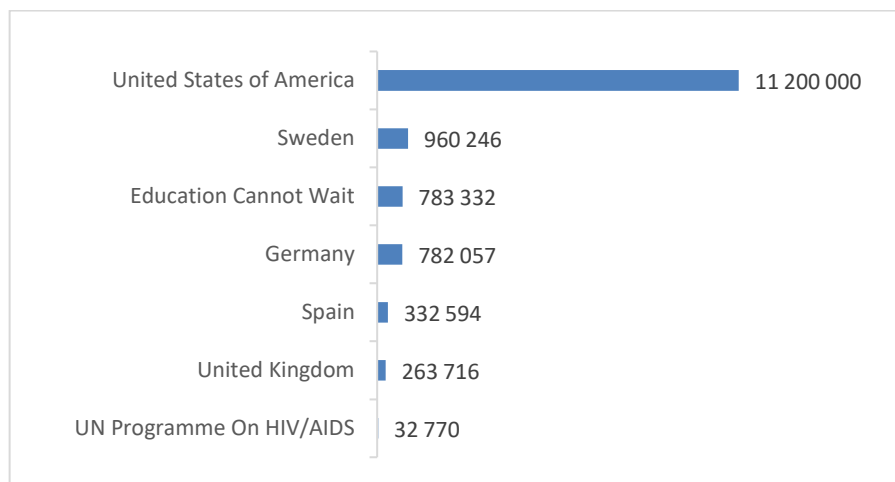
- In September, In Mopti, UNHCR carried out a response in emergency shelters using monetary transfers. This response was able to cover 851 households of 5,350 IDPs.
- In the Gao region, UNHCR assisted with non-food items for the benefit of vulnerable households affected by the effects of seasonal hazards. This Response covered a total of 1464 assisted households including 534 refugee families and 50 from the host community in Gao City; and 830 refugee families and 50 from the host community in Ansongo.
- In September, in the Sikasso region, distribution of non-food items (NFIs) kits benefited 732 refugee households, including 190 in Sikasso, 470 in Bazanso, and 72 on spontaneous sites. The basket of NFI kits is made up of sleeping mats, mosquito nets, blankets, kitchen kits, rechargeable solar lamps, buckets, and cans. This response was implemented following the influx of Burkinabè refugees.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

UNHCR is grateful for the critical support provided by donors who have contributed to this operation as well as those who have contributed to UNHCR programs with unearmarked and broadly earmarked funds.
