Funding Situation

Highlight

The Inter-Agency Coordination platform conducted a funding analysis of the Refugee Response Plan (RRP) partners to assess the current level of funding for the refugee response. The finding of this exercise revealed that out of a total appeal of US\$117.2 million in 2024, RRP partners received US\$14 million until the end of March, which increased to US\$34 million by the end of June representing 29 per cent against the total appeal. All sectors continue to face significant funding shortfalls. Alarmingly, livelihoods and socio-economic inclusion activities face the most severe funding gap, with only \$1.6 million received against an appeal of \$18.3 million, representing just 9 per cent of its requested funds. In addition, 23 organisations (out of the 37 RRP partners), including 14 National NGOs, 5 International NGOs, and 4 UN agencies participated in a Programme Criticality Survey to assess the funding effect on programming, identify RRP sectors and activities that are most affected by the decreasing funding, and re-prioritise programming across sectors based on the funding levels.

Since 1 April 2024, following Romania's accession to the Schengen area through air or seaports, the number of refugees present in the country can no longer be calculated due to the freedom of movement within the Schengen area. While UNHCR will continue monitoring the border movements in Romania and adjust its programmes accordingly, a new reporting method has been set to align with the numbers reported by the Government of Romania, Eurostat and the reporting methodologies of the other neighbouring countries hosting refugees from Ukraine. The two key figures available to UNHCR are (1) the cumulative number of temporary protection permits issued: 172,043 (as of 28 July), and (2) the number of unique individuals that have been issued temporary protection: 162,045 as of 30 June.

Response

Last week, UNHCR, in collaboration with its partners, conducted several Participatory Sânnicolau Assessments in Mare, Buzau, Galati, Constanta. and Bucharest. Nearly sixty refugees Ukraine from participated in the Focus Group discussion on livelihoods and economic inclusion, access to documentation and social protection, and child protection.

Informative presentations on the legal provisions of the new Governmental Programme for Ukrainians, and other services were also conducted.

On 5 August, the UNHCR conducted an awareness-raising session in Bucharest focusing on child protection, the Convention on the Rights of the Child, and the child protection services available through the national system. Eight teenage participants (5 female and 3 male) participated in discussions addressing risks and challenges and sharing their experiences. The session, hosted by partner Terre des Hommes, highlighted the pressing need for enhanced resources dedicated to professional education and skill development for young adults.
