Injil District is in the Southern part of Herat Province. It covers an area of approximately 1,814 Km<sup>2</sup>. The district is bordered by Adraskan District to the West, Ghorian District to the East, and Guzara District to the North. The population of Injil District consists primarily of Pashtuns, with smaller communities of Tajiks and other ethnic groups. The district is predominantly rural, with agriculture being the primary source of livelihood for the local population. Agriculture is the primary economic activity in Injil District. The district has fertile agricultural land, and crops such as wheat, barley, corn, cotton, and various fruits and vegetables are cultivated. Livestock farming, including sheep, goats, and cattle, is also an important economic activity in the district. Injil District benefits from its proximity to Herat City, which offers market access and trade opportunities for agricultural produce and other goods. Injil District has seen some improvements in infrastructure and services in recent years. The district is connected to major roads, allowing for transportation of goods and access to neighbouring areas. The community has schools and healthcare facilities, although they may be limited in capacity and resources compared to urban centres. Access to basic facilities such as electricity and clean water can vary across different parts of the district.
