# Aegean Islands Weekly Snapshot

### Sea arrivals

This week, the Aegean islands saw 1,849 arrivals, a decrease from last week's 1,885. The average of the daily arrivals on the Aegean islands for this week is 264.



### Population in the CCACs

Currently, 9,532 refugees and migrants reside in the Closed Controlled Access Center(s).

Most of them are from Syria (53%), Afghanistan (15%) and Egypt (8%). Men account for 58% of the population, women for 16% and children for 26%.



### Population on the Islands

There are 10,811 refugees and migrants on the Aegean islands. Out of this total, 9,532 reside at the CCACs and 535 are hosted in other facilities. UNHCR estimates that there are also 744 self-accommodated in the islands.

This week, Lesvos saw 290 arrivals, an increase from last week's 238.

The average of the daily arrivals on Lesvos for this week is 41.

### Population in the CCAC

Currently, 1,436 refugees and migrants reside in the Closed Controlled Access Center.

Most of them are from Afghanistan (36%), Syria (30%) and Egypt (10%). Men account for 49% of the population, women for 19% and children for 32%.



### Population on the Island

There are 1,868 refugees and migrants on Lesvos. Out of this total, 1,436 reside at the CCAC and 213 are hosted in other facilities. UNHCR identified 219 self-accommodated refugees in the island up to this date.





### Departures

This week, 186 refugees and migrants departed from Lesvos to the mainland.

Most of them are from Syria (55%), Afghanistan (18%) and Somalia (11%). Men account for 56% of the population, women for 18% and children for 26%.



### Population on the Island

There are 1,051 refugees and migrants on Chios island. Out of this total, 933 reside at the CCAC and 14 are hosted in other facilities. UNHCR estimates that there are also 104 self-accommodated in the island.

### Sea arrivals

This week, the Dodecanese islands saw 706 arrivals, a decrease from last week's 842.

The average of the daily arrivals on the Dodecanese islands for this week is 101.

### Population in Kos CCAC and Leros CCAC

Currently, 3,489 refugees and migrants reside in Kos CCAC and Leros CCAC.

Most of them are from Syria (61%), Afghanistan (10%) and Stateless (9%). Men account for 62% of the population, women for 15% and children for 23%.



### Population on the Dodecanese Islands

There are 3,806 refugees and migrants on the Dodecanese islands. Out of this total, 1,430 reside at the CCAC in Kos, and 2,059 at the CCAC Leros. In Kos, an estimated 240 people are self-accommodated and an additional 27 are hosted in other facilities, while in Leros, an estimated 50 people are self-accommodated, with an additional 0 being hosted in other facilities.



### Departures

This week,  $691\ refugees$  and migrants departed from the Dodecanese islands to the mainland.
