

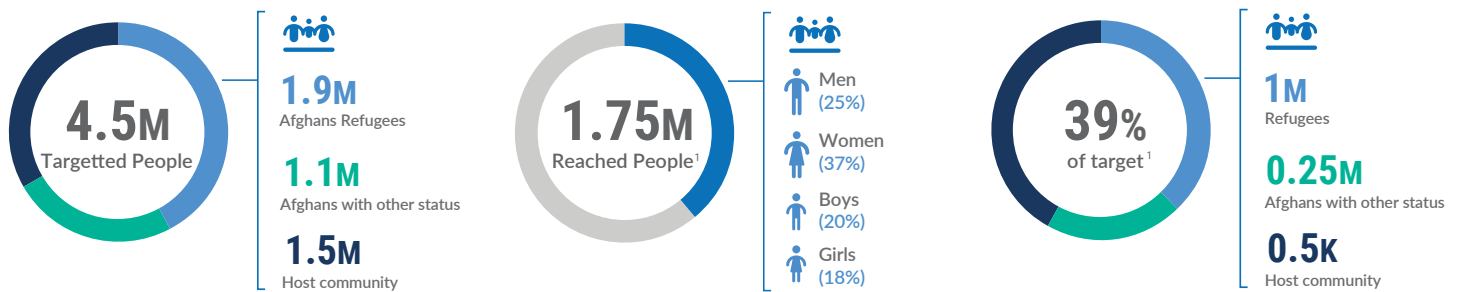


## SITUATION UPDATE

Pakistan has been generously hosting millions of Afghans for over 40 years with significant movements of Afghans across the border. Currently, Pakistan hosted over 2.8 million Afghans in 2024. The majority of refugees have exercised their freedom of movement and 69% of refugees live outside refugee villages. Given that most Afghan refugees and other Afghan nationals in Pakistan live in urban or semi-urban areas and their daily lives intersect with members of the host community, many of whom are also from the most vulnerable social strata, this response plan targeted 3 million Afghan refugees and Afghans of other status, and 1.5 million host community members.

In view of the significant presence of Afghan refugees and other Afghan nationals in Pakistan, the RRP 2024, which was the outcome of interagency consultations and discussions with the Government of Pakistan, sought to increase support to the Government's ongoing efforts and people of Pakistan with an aim to safeguard the protection and build the self-reliance of the Afghan communities, as well as to further assist host communities. Existing and new programmes focusing on protection, health interventions, education, livelihoods, food security, water and sanitation, and provisions of green energy, were encompassed in this multi-sectoral plan in a manner that bridged humanitarian and development assistance.

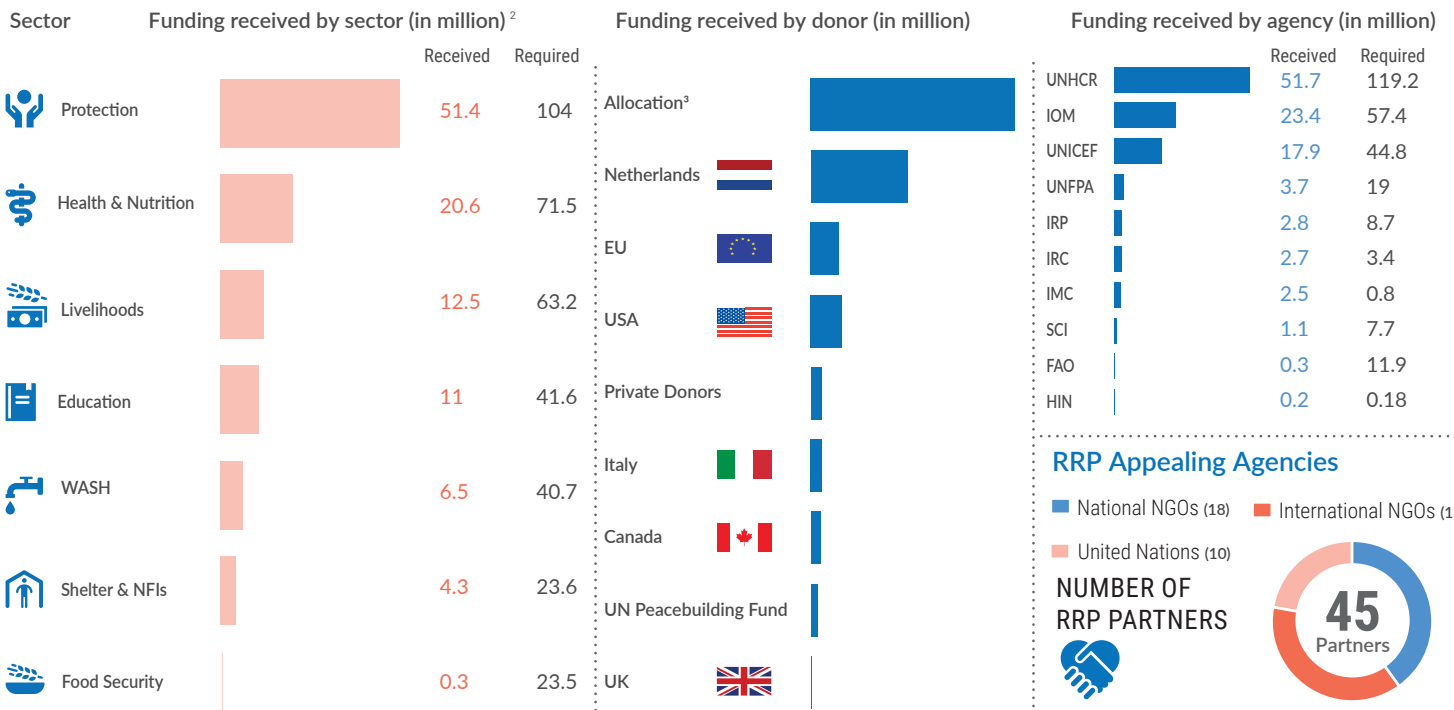

While 29% of the persons targeted under the 2024 RRP were assisted at least once, many of these beneficiaries had additional unmet needs.

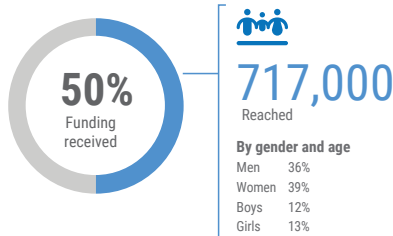

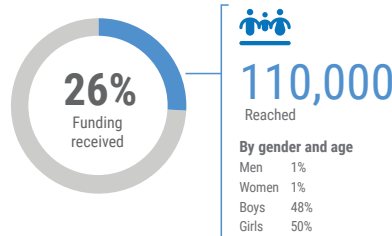

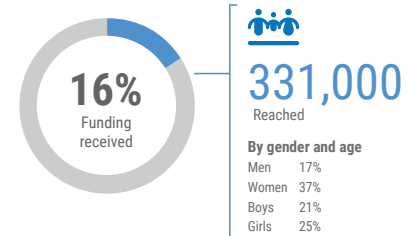

### Education



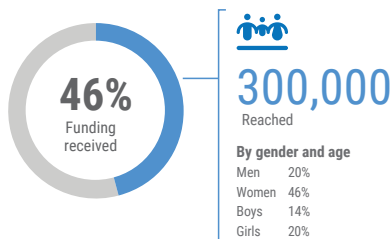
- 54,135** Children supported with access to primary education

- 3,364** Students benefited from the provision of WASH installations

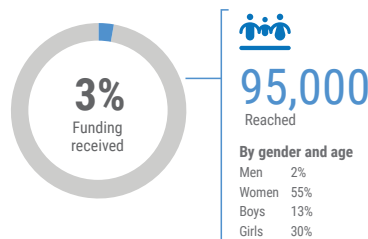

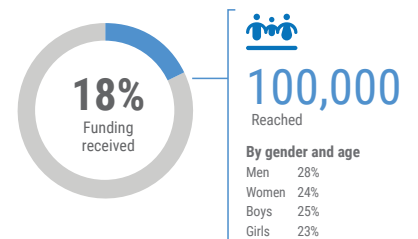

### Nutrition



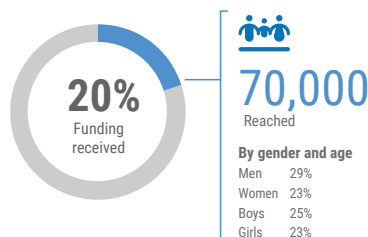
- 37,174** PLWs provided with IFAs/MNT<sup>(2)</sup>

- 3,975** Individuals provided with core relief items

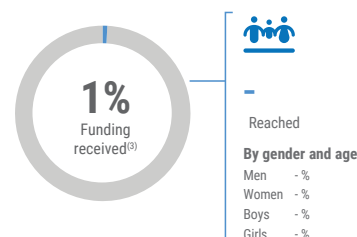

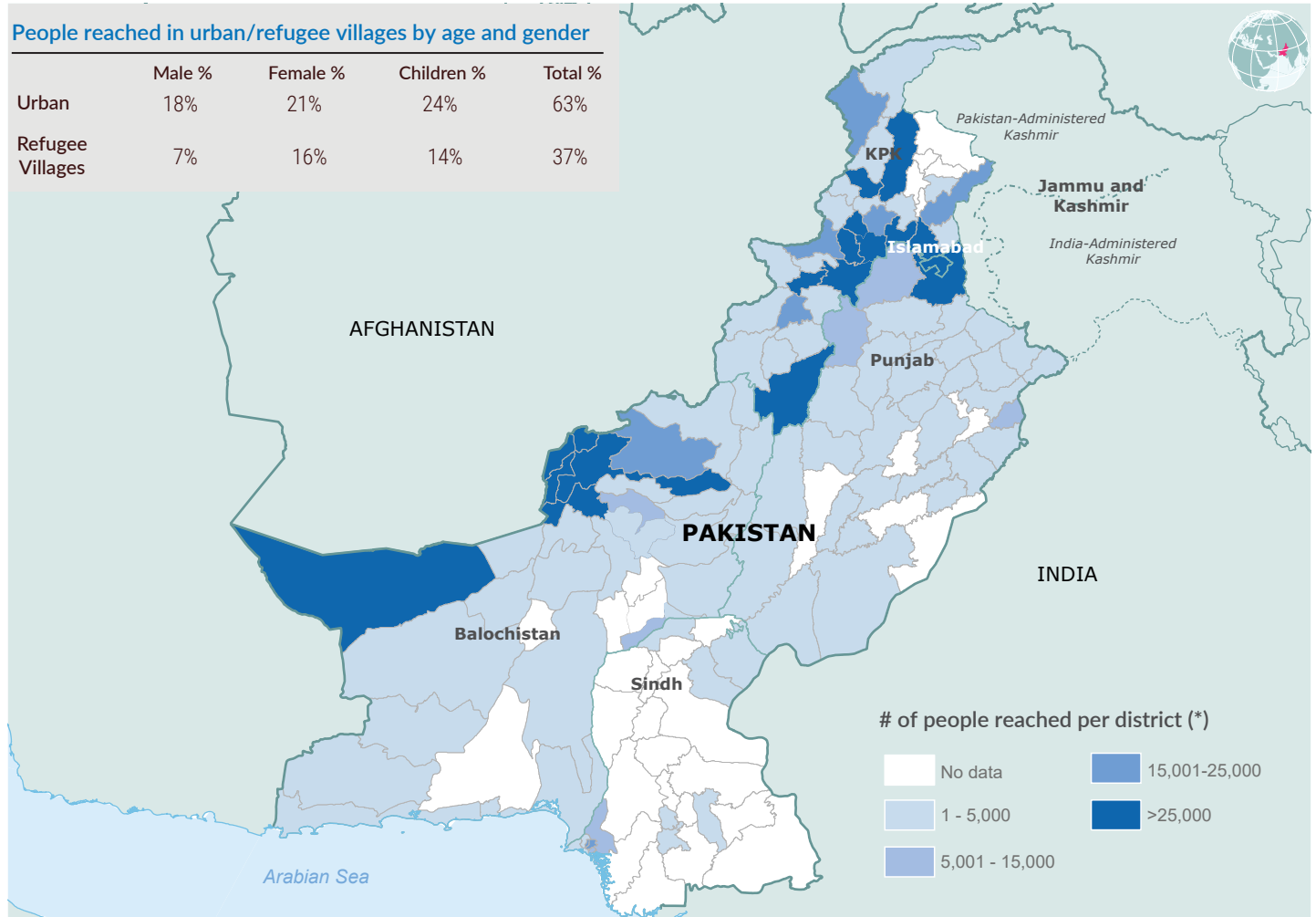
