OVERVIEW



The Settlement Planning, Shelter, and Infrastructure sector plays a vital role in enhancing resilience and socioeconomic development for refugees and host communities by improving access to shelter, infrastructure, and services. Through strategic interventions such as plot allocation, emergency shelter kits, road rehabilitation, and the construction of communal facilities like schools and health centres, the sector fosters integration and self-reliance. The shelter strategy empowers refugees to build their own homes using sustainable materials and culturally appropriate designs, promoting skills development and environmental stewardship. The adoption of the master plan approach ensures efficient land use and better spatial organization, while ongoing advocacy supports a revised strategy focused on sustainability and adaptability.

Results Analysis:

- 100% of new arrivals received emergency shelter kits and Non Food Items (NFIs) through cash-based interventions (CBI) improving the living condition of new arrivals.
- 33,760 households were supported with emergency shelter kits upon plot allocation in the second quarter indicating 39% increase from Q1 and 134% overall achievement against the total target of 24,812 planned households in the settlement, improving living conditions of refugees.
- 241 Persons with Specific Needs (PSN) households in Kyangwali received semi-permanent shelters via partner support.
- Cash-based interventions (CBI) was provided for shelter materials to enhance flexibility and dignity in shelter provision though it requires routine updates of local market prices and availability of shelter materials to ensure cash values remain adequate, it will also require post distribution monitoring systems to ensure funds are used appropriately.

The Key Challenges/Opportunities:

- Critical funding gaps: Only 4% of the \$52M required was received leading to inadequate shelter coverage and affecting maintenance plan for aging facilities like schools, health centres, roads hence compromising access to life saving services and increasing safety risks.
- Scarcity of construction materials causing environmental strain and tension with host communities.
- Termite infestations and damp floors has reduced shelter durability.
- Disparate land leasing by livelihood partners has limited availability of land for settling new arrivals.

The Sector Priorities:

- Systematic plot demarcation to support sustainable shelter and livelihood development.
- Develop spatial planning guidelines to enhance optimal land use and service delivery.
- Strategic review of land utilization policies in light of ongoing refugee inflows and limited land resources.



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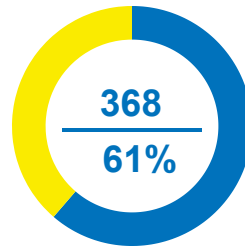
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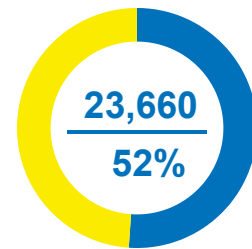

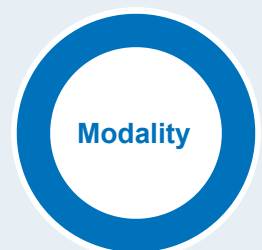

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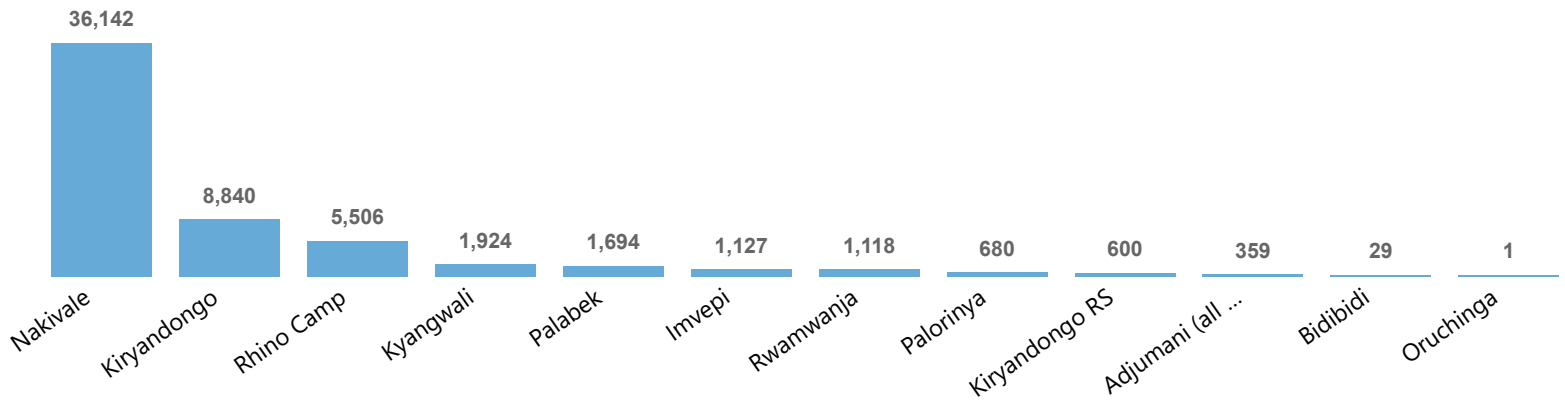
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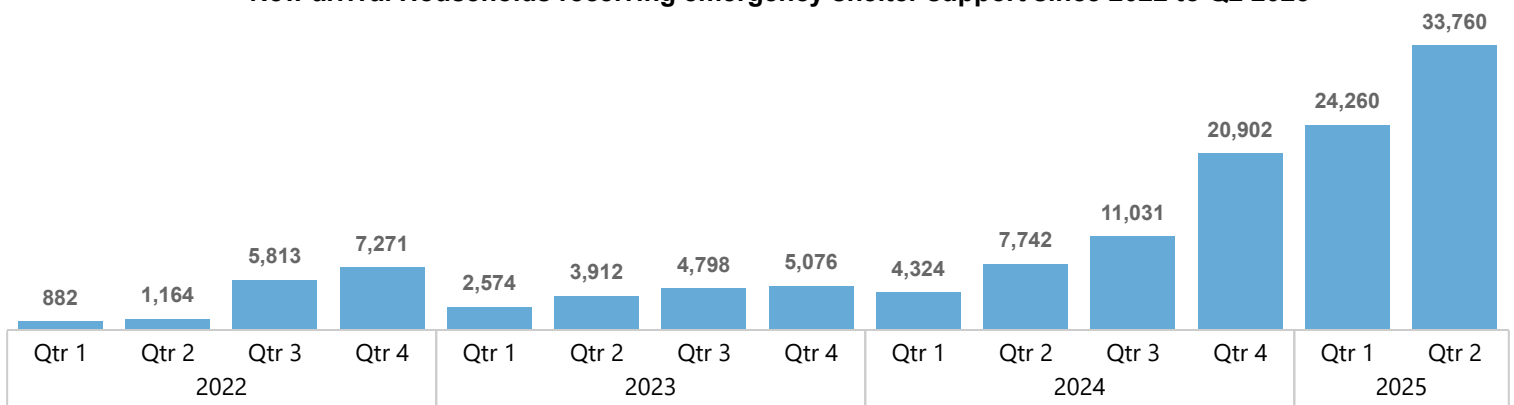
New arrival Households receiving emergency shelter support



New arrival Households receiving emergency shelter support by settlement

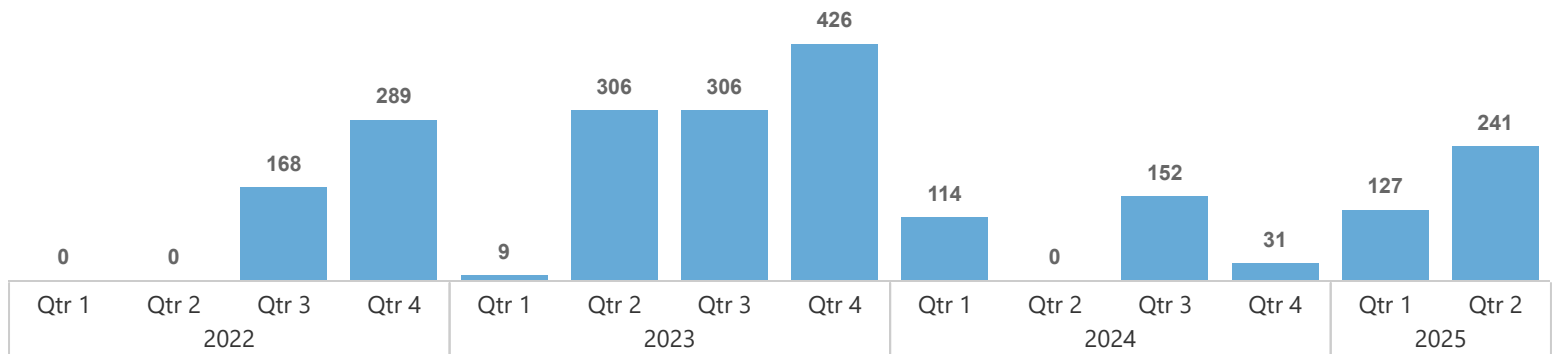


New arrival Households receiving emergency shelter support since 2022 to Q2 2025

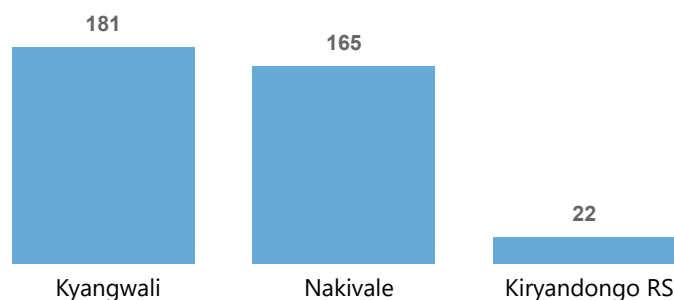

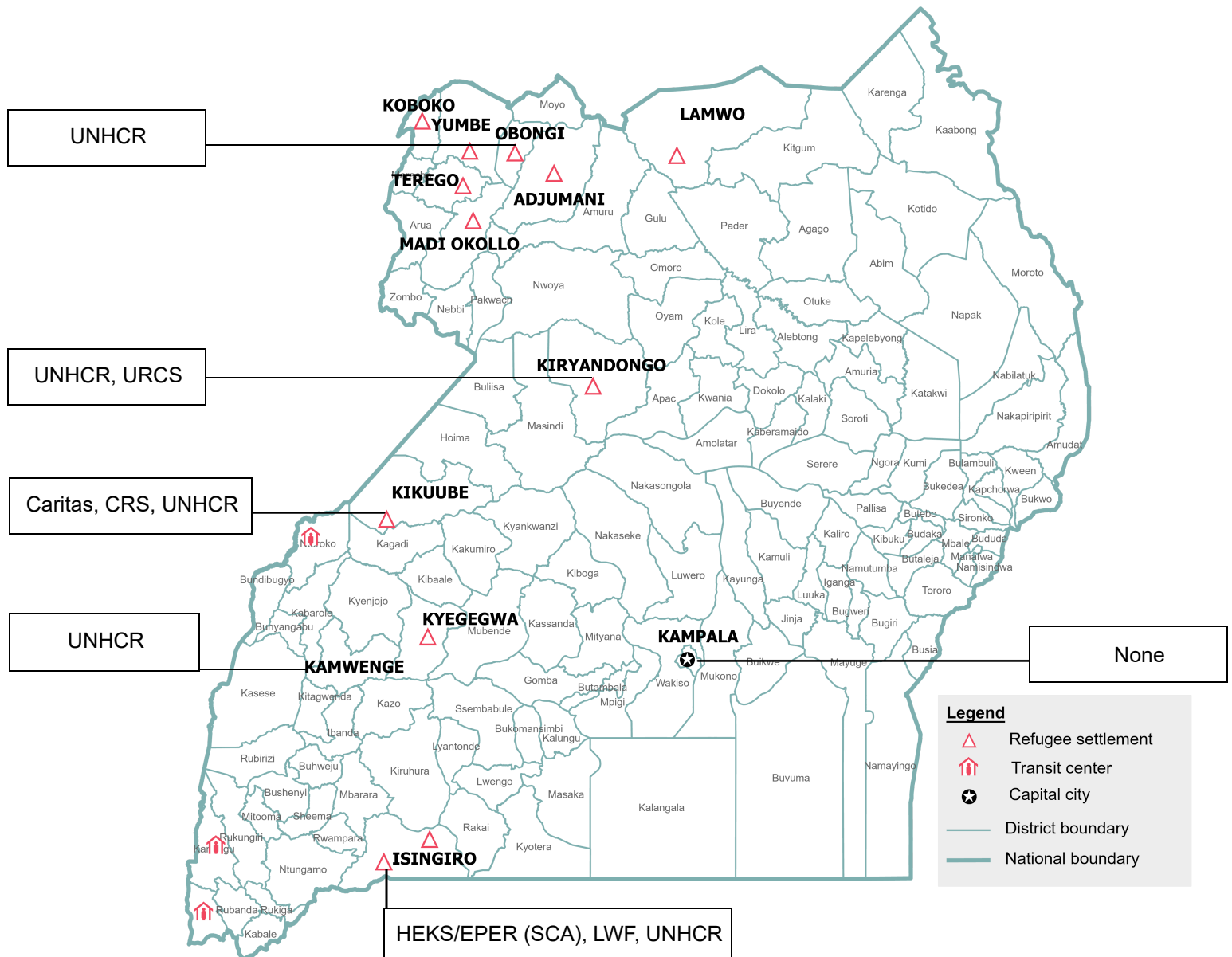

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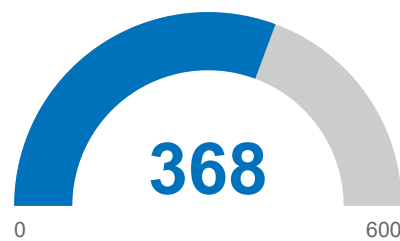

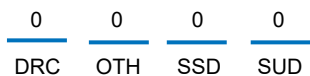


of PSN HHs assisted with construction of semi-permanent shelter

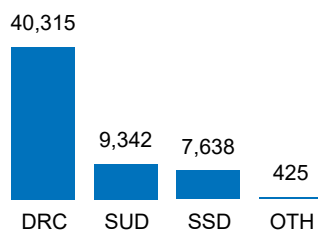

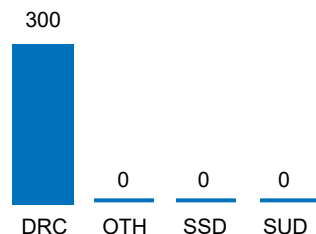
of HHs receiving emergency shelter-earmarked cash assistance



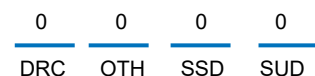
of new arrival HHs provided with emergency shelter kits
