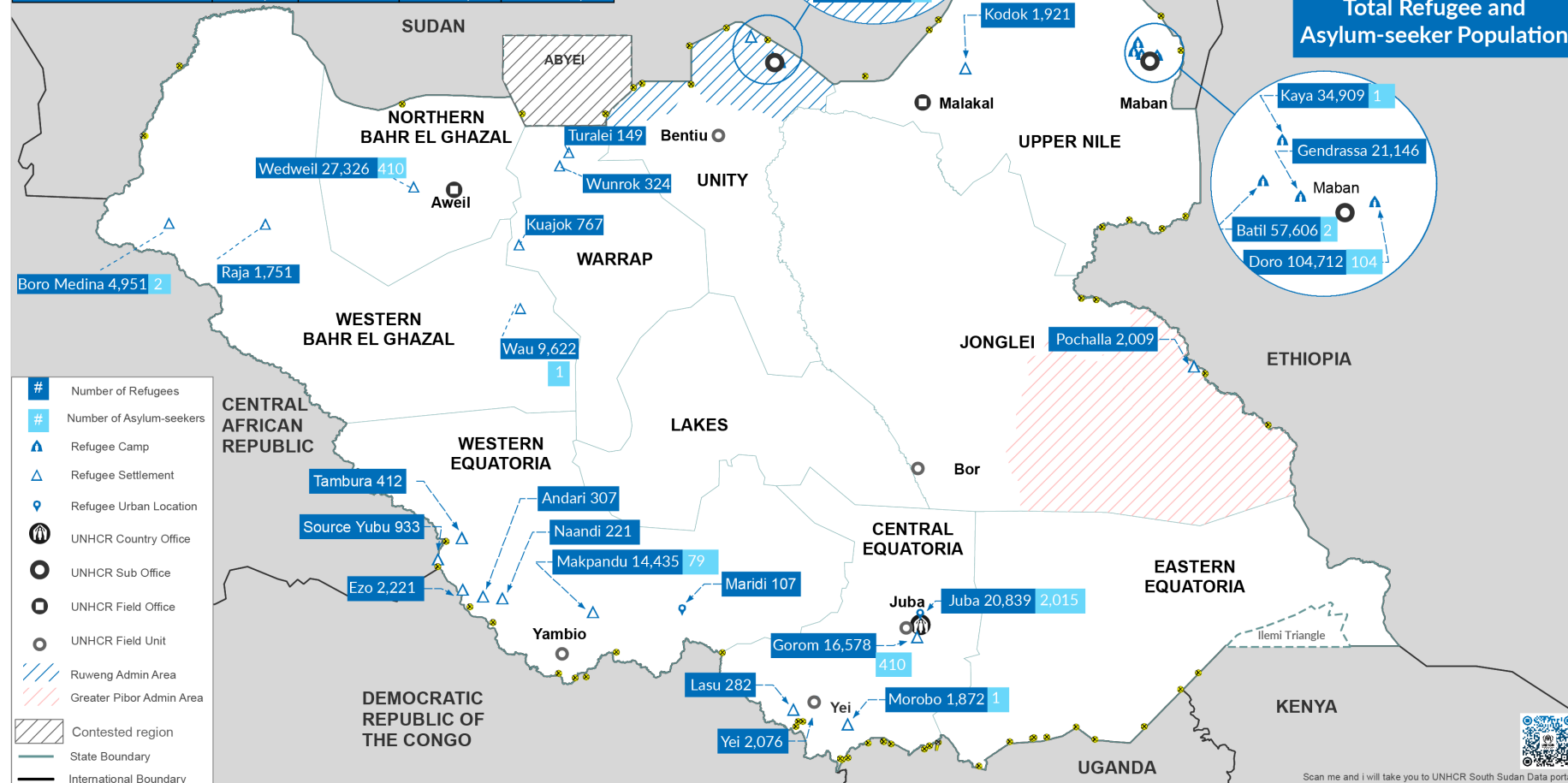

As of the end of December 2025, South Sudan hosts 605,062 refugees and asylum-seekers across 161,400 households, settled in 29 locations nationwide. This includes 601,814 registered refugees and 3,248 asylum-seekers. The vast majority: 95% (571,066 individuals), are Sudanese refugees, followed by 14,647 (2%) from the Democratic Republic of Congo, 6,578 from Ethiopia, 5,083 from Eritrea and 4,440 from other nationalities.

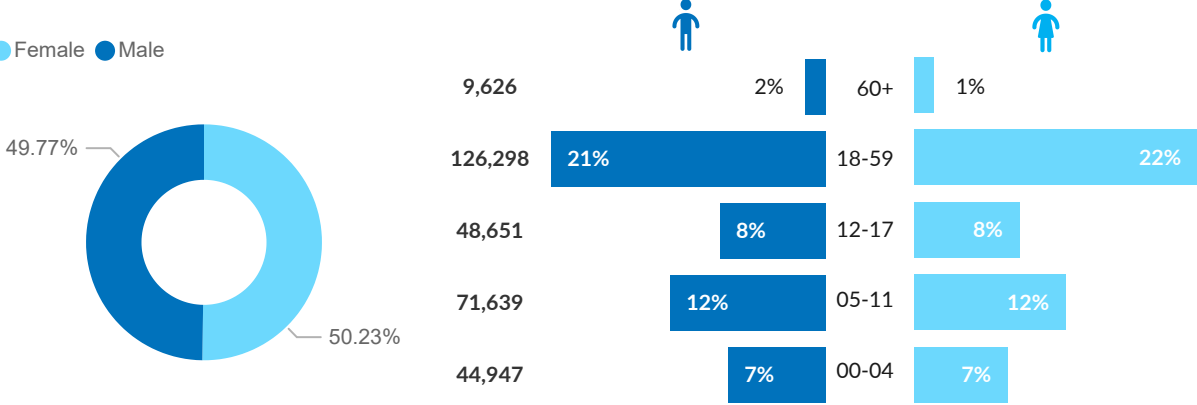
In response to the ongoing conflict in Sudan, the Government of South Sudan continues to grant prima facie refugee status to those fleeing the country. Among the refugees, 49% are female aged 0-59 years, and 76% are female and children combined. The asylum-seeker population is smaller and has a distinct demographic profile. Ethiopians and Eritreans each account for 37 % of the total, forming the two largest groups, followed by Burundians (9%), Ugandans (7%) and (9%) other nationalities

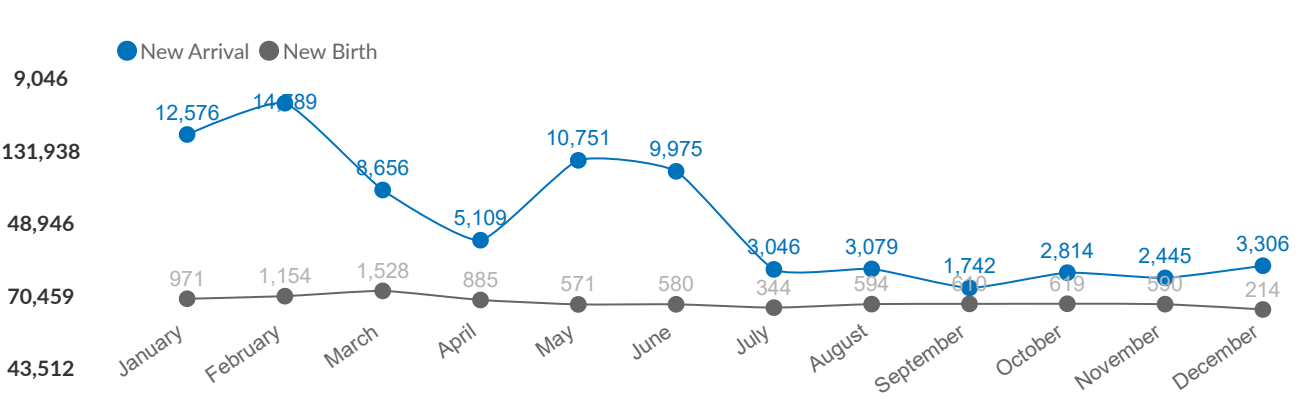

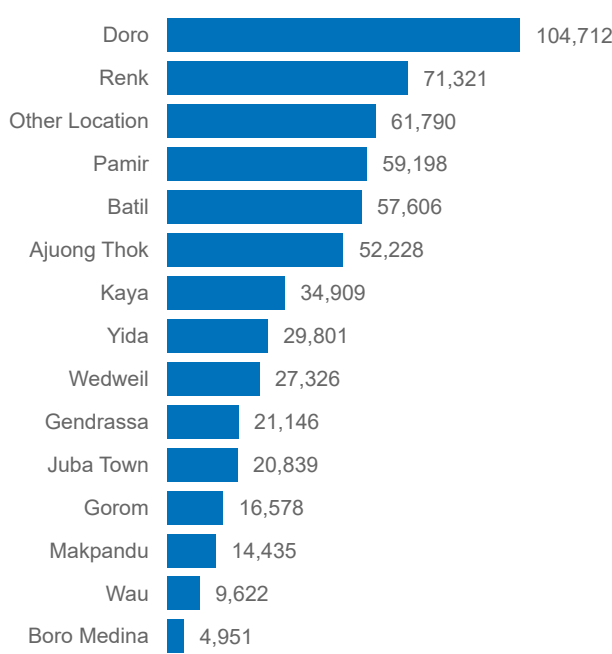

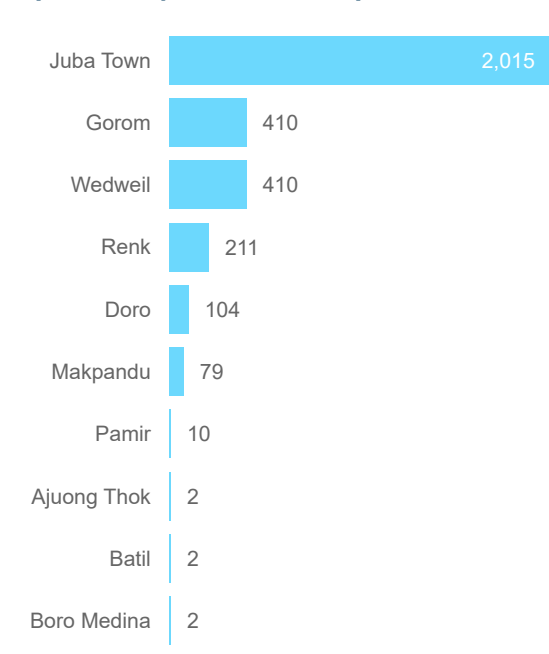
New Registration Trend for the year 2025



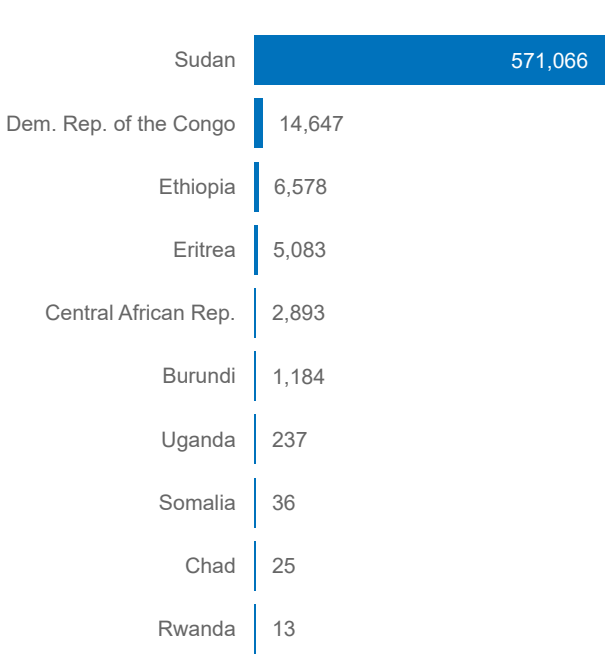
Top (15) Refugees per Location



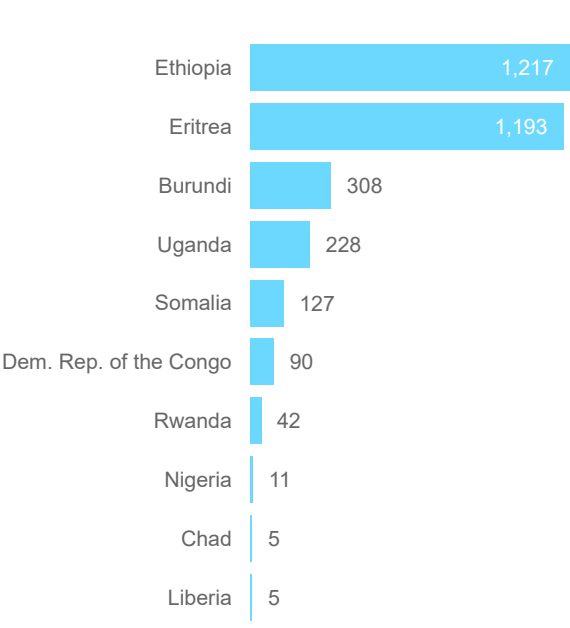
Top (10) Asylum-seekers per Location



Top (10) Refugees by Country of Origin



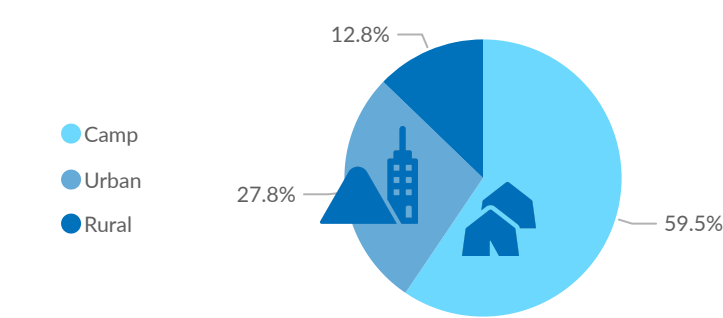
Top (10) Asylum-seekers by Country of Origin



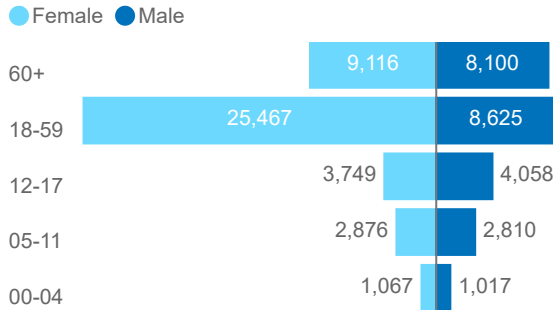
Socio-economic background

Based on the 605,062 refugees and asylum-seekers registered, men outnumber women, most holding secondary education yet struggling to find work beyond subsistent farming and field labor. Young adults stand as the majority, grappling with the challenges of unemployment and single parenthood.

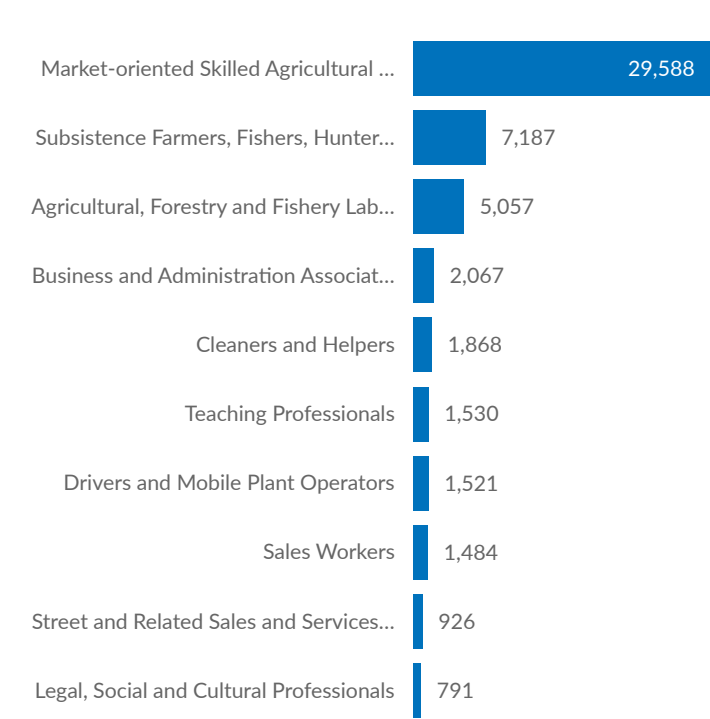
Population per Location Type



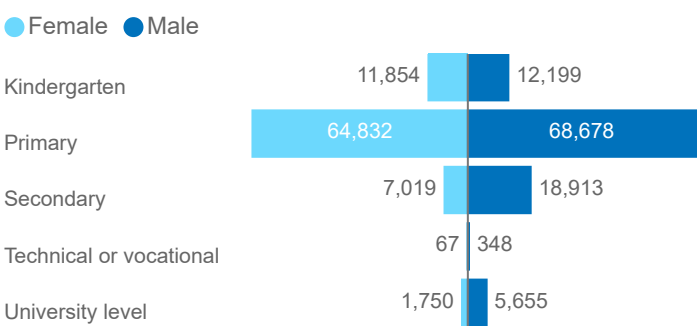
Specific Need by Age and Gender Breakdown



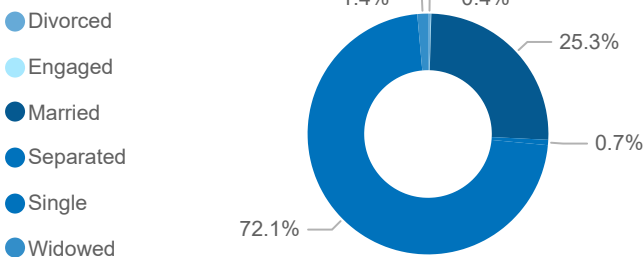
Top (10) Professional Skills



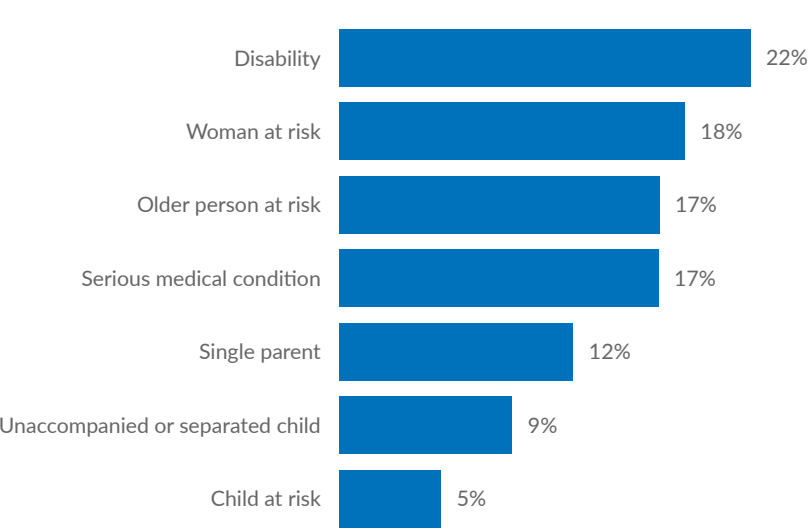
Education Level
