

**Key Gaps and Priorities:**  
**Blue Nile State:** Health services are currently available only during daytime hours, leaving the population without access to essential medical care during the evening and night. Humanitarian activities are largely concentrated in Karama 5, 6, 8, and 9, while Karama 1-4 remain underserved despite documented needs in: Non Food Items (NFIs), Food assistance and Health services. No food distribution has taken place since November.

**Context**

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. Over **288,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **79,700 South Sudanese**, most of whom (42%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (24%), South Kordofan (14%), West Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (6%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages. Movements at Joda remain spontaneous and without major incidents.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **209,000 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile and White Nile States. An increase in new arrivals was observed during January, primarily due to the deteriorating security situation and flooding in South Sudan, which continue to trigger cross border population movements. Upon arrival, new arrivals received initial medical assistance, while individuals requiring psychosocial support were referred to partners for further support. The Ministry of Health (MoH) continues to provide routine medical screening services at the Joda border through a fixed service delivery point integrated with immigration services.
