




New arrivals, by sex and COO

A total of **42,151** new arrivals have been registered since the start of 2014; with 822 arriving from Burundi, 1 from Cameroon, 3 from Congo Brazzaville, 746 from Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), 5 from Eritrea, 450 from Ethiopia, 1 from Pakistan, 1 from Russia, 49 from Rwanda, 920 from Somalia, 37,721 from South Sudan, 1,324 from Sudan, 85 from Uganda and 1 from Yemen. In addition, the Sub-Office has received **801** South Sudanese 'returnees' and their records reactivated; bringing the total arrivals figure to **42,952**.


The total new born babies so far registered in 2014 is **2,938**.

435 individuals were registered during the Thirty sixth week of 2014 [31st Aug - 06th Sept 2014]; 51 from Burundi, 33 from Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), 25 from Ethiopia, 1 from Rwanda, 37 from Somalia, 271 from South Sudan, 15 from Sudan and 2 from Uganda. As at 25th August 2014, the overall registered population in Kakuma Refugee Camp stands at **173,858**.


The average family size registered during the reporting period stood at **3.4** individuals. Family size 1 households represented **41.9%** of all newly registered households.

Additionally, we have so far received approximately **42,689** individuals arriving from South Sudan *en masse* as a result of the ongoing conflict.


Households, by Family Size

NB: This report reflects registration trends. In addition to new arrivals reported here, the overall population in Kakuma also increases through new births, in-situ registration (of persons who arrived in a previous period but reported for registration later), family reunification, and various other data adjustments. Analysis and projections are based on actual persons registered in the UNHCR registration database (proGres)
